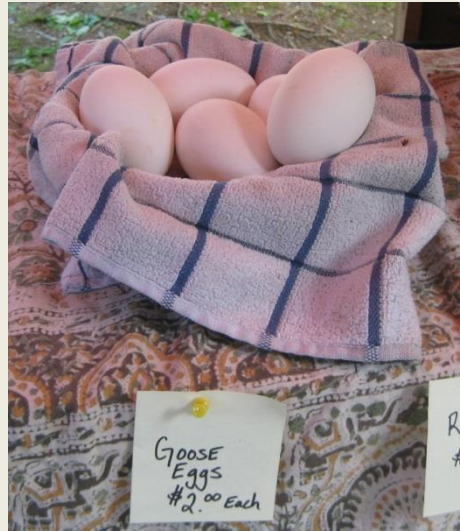

**NH DEPT OF REVENUE ADMINISTRATION -
ANNUAL LOW & MODERATE INCOME
HOMEOWNERS PROPERTY TAX RELIEF**

New Hampshire residents who own a homestead subject to the State Education Property Tax, resided in the homestead as of April 1, 2013 and have a total household income of \$20,000 or less if a single person (or \$40,000 or less if married or head of household) may apply for property tax relief during the filing period after May 1, 2014, but no later than June 30, 2014. Libraries throughout the state of New Hampshire offer a variety of entertainment and educational materials to taxpayers at a very economical rate.

The average NH taxpayer contributes about \$33 in taxes per year to fund public libraries and their services. But how much would they need to pay out-of-pocket if they purchased their books, movies and other library services in stores?

Use the library use calculator to find out!

- Enter in the left hand column the number of times per month you and your family use each service.
- The estimated retail value of each service will be calculated on the right.
- The total value of their library use is shown at the bottom of the worksheet.

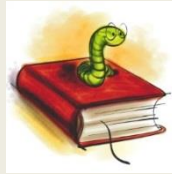

1894
