SIGNAGE REMINDER

We would like to remind residents that it is unlawful to place signs upon utility poles, street signs, markers, posts etc. If you do put signs out for yards sales etc., please make sure that they are free standing, not blocking the view of traffic, not on town property, and, if on private property that you have the land owner's permission and that you remove them once the event is over. Signs that are left behind generally end up blowing away and become trash. Thank you!



NH DRA'S ANNUAL LOW & MODERATE HOMEOWNERS PROPERTY TAX RELIEF PROGRAM

The Low and Moderate Income Homeowners Property Tax Relief provisions are designed to lessen the economic burden of the State Education Property Tax on certain taxpayers. NH residents who own a homestead subject to the State Education Property Tax, resided in the homestead as of April 1st of the year for which the claim for relief is being made, and have a total household income of \$20,000 or less if a single person (or \$40,000 or less if married or head of household) may apply for property tax relief during the filing period - after May 1, 2018, but no later than June 30, 2018. June 5th is the last day to change your party affiliation before the September 11th State Primary according to NH election law. Now is the time to be sure you are registered in the party of your choice. If you are registered Undeclared, you must choose a party at the primary. You then remain in that party until you submit a request to return to Undeclared. This can easily be done as you leave the polls after voting on primary day. The easiest way to check how you are currently registered is to go online to http://sos.nh.gov/VoteInforLook.aspx. Or look at the checklist that is located at the Town Clerk's Office and at the Lee Public Library. You may change your party affiliation up until Tuesday, June 5th at the clerk's office or at the above mentioned session.

If you have not yet registered to vote at all, you may do so up to 10 days before the election (at the clerk's office or at a supervisor session) or on Election Day. Applicants should bring proof of identity, age, citizenship, and domicile when they come to register (driver's license, passport, birth certificate, mail, etc.). Qualified applicants who do not possess proof or who do not bring proof with them may register if they sign an affidavit attesting to their qualifications for identity, age, and citizenship. More than 30 days before an election, applicants without proof of domicile will be asked to retrieve proof and return to register. Within 30 days of an election and on Election Day, applicants without proof of domicile may register to vote if they sign an affidavit attesting to their domicile and either agreeing to bring or send in proof or attesting that they are not aware of possessing proof of domicile.

On May 21, 2018 the Lee Select Board authorized the formation of a Solid Waste Advisory Committee to consist of 5 Lee residents to work with Town staff and outside agencies to consider the following: review the actual volume and handling, transportation, and disposal costs associated with bulky items and make recommendations to the Select Board regarding an appropriate fee structure; research new waste disposal technologies, new or changed governmental regulations, changes in the local and worldwide demand for recycled materials and make recommendations for possible new approaches for disposal and recycling markets based on the findings; and develop a program to educate the public on solid waste disposal costs and recycling.

THE LIFE AQUATIC: INTERESTING CREATURES IN A TOWN FOREST VERNAL POOL

With enough of a breeze to keep the bugs off, the ten participants at last Saturday's Tadpole Stroll had perfect weather for encountering some of the denizens that frequent vernal pools. Barb

Wauchope got things off to a terrific start by bringing a small mass of salamander eggs that she'd scooped from her backyard pond. While we waited for the 10:00 a.m. start time, we used hand lenses and a loupe and flashlight to look at the larvae in their eggs, and one which had already emerged - it was wonderfully spotted and its lovely golden eyes and feathery gills were easily observed.

The walk through the woods and along the edge of

the bog was beautiful, with a well-tuned catbird singing us along as we made our way to the pool. Also heard, and very briefly seen, was a gorgeous yellow throat warbler.

At the pool, each person took a clear plastic dipping container and used it to scoop into the water at the pool's edge. Whenever something interesting was caught, the



container was brought to the viewing station, where hand lenses and field guides helped to identify a particular critter.

Among the vertebrates were wood frog tadpoles,

salamander tadpoles (top, left), a spring peeper tadpole (middle, left), and a clutch of spotted salamander eggs whose larvae were just about ready to hatch - individuals could be seen moving within their eggs, and their gills could be seen through the algae-tinged jelly.

An enormous female bullfrog (bottom, right) (Bill Humm suggested that perhaps cowfrog would be a more appropriate term) was briefly scooped up - filling the entire scoop, before making a great leap out of the cup and into the pool.

Equally fascinating were the invertebrates that were found. Among those scooped and identified at the viewing station were caddisfly larvae in their intricate cases, phantom midge larvae,

predaceous diving beetle larvae (middle, left), damselfly larvae, mosquito larvae, and one hideously awesome hellgrammite (middle, right), which is the larvae of the dobsonfly.

A good collection for an hour's worth of dipping, and well worth the damp feet on our return trip through the forest!

WORLD CULTURES CLASS - OYSTER RIVER HIGH SCHOOL POWER OF ONE PROJECT BY SILAS FARWELL

My name is Silas Farwell and I'm a freshman at ORHS and for my World Cultures class final I am doing a Power of One project where I've chosen to research the benefits of composting. As part of my investigation, I reached out to the manager of the transfer station and researched numerous articles in science journals and other materials. I have come to the conclusion that composting is not only beneficial to homeowners but also saves the town money. Among the findings in my research, Lee currently spends around \$65-\$70 per ton to send trash to the landfill. It is estimated that 15% of garbage is compostable and any effort to encourage composting in our town will have positive benefits. COMPOSTING AT HOME By Dean Rubine, LSC





Composting is natural recycling in which organic matter is decomposed to yield soil rich in nutrients. Much of our trash is food waste which can be composted instead of discarded. If we do this, we can avoid tax increases since China no longer accepts recycling waste. Our family collects waste in a compost bucket in the kitchen. We line it with a sheet of newspaper which keeps it nicer. Egg shells, fruit rinds, old vegetables, coffee grounds (and paper filter), stale baked goods, lobster shells, napkins, etc. are collected. When full or smelly, the contents are transferred outside to the compost pile. In the eighties we looped chicken wire to hold our compost pile, but I recommend a sturdy, cubic-meter compost bin with a latching cover. Find a spot a bit out of sight or in the garden, away but not too far from the house.

To use:

- Layer brown matter, high in carbon (dried leaves, wood chips, newspaper...).
- Layer green matter, high in nitrogen (food, green clippings, chicken litter).
- More brown: the proper mix is 30 carbons for each nitrogen.
- Add water. (Not too much; if the pile is slimy add dry brown.)
- Aerate the pile (turn it a bit with a turner, mulching fork or pitchfork).
- · Latch the cover.
- Repeat: Add food and yard waste as needed, turn and add brown weekly or so.
- When it's ready, remove finished compost from the sides if your bin affords this.
- If not, lift the bottomless bin off the full pile and start again next to it.
- Cooking compost is warm; finished compost is cool and looks like rich soil.

Use your finished compost in the garden, give it to your gardener friends, spread it on the ground or toss it in the woods. Feel good about all the trash you didn't throw away.

We run most of our food waste through our chickens so we get eggs and compost. A couple times per season we transfer the nitrogen laden wood shavings from the coop into the compost pile. The chickens like to turn the compost pile for us so we often leave it open.

The old advice is to avoid composting meat and oily stuff to avoid attracting rats and other vermin. We ignore that and compost everything now except bones and pet waste. Even with no meat raccoons will be interested so latch that cover. We don't have a problem because we feed the chickens anything a raccoon might like and chicken litter doesn't appeal to raccoons.
