NH DRA'S ANNUAL LOW & MODERATE HOMEOWNERS PROPERTY TAX RELIEF PROGRAM

The Low and Moderate Income Homeowners Property Tax Relief provisions are designed to lessen the economic burden of the State Education Property Tax on certain taxpayers. NH residents who own a homestead subject to the State Education Property Tax, resided in the homestead as of April 1st of the year for which the claim for relief is being made, and have a total household income of \$20,000 or less if a single person (or \$40,000 or less if married or head of household) may apply for property tax relief during the filing period - after May 1, 2018, but no later than June 30, 2018. On May 21, 2018 the Lee Select Board authorized the formation of a Solid Waste Advisory Committee to consist of 5 Lee residents to work with Town staff and outside agencies to consider the following: review the actual volume and handling, transportation, and disposal costs associated with bulky items and make recommendations to the Select Board regarding an appropriate fee structure; research new waste disposal technologies, new or changed governmental regulations, changes in the local and worldwide demand for recycled materials and make recommendations for possible new approaches for disposal and recycling markets based on the findings; and develop a program to educate the public on solid waste disposal costs and recycling.



RECYCLING NEWS!

CONGRATULATIONS LEE ON A GREAT JOB RECYCLING! BUT WE NEED TO DO MORE!

The Town still receives revenue from recycling these items:

- Corrugated Cardboard Please remember to keep all cardboard clean and separate. This means pizza boxes! Please empty the boxes and discard pizza, paper and soiled cardboard.
- Aluminum For a number of years, the Town has had to pay to dispose of glass but still receives revenue from aluminum, so if at all possible purchase items in Aluminum containers instead of glass!

HIGHWAY DEPARTMENT UPDATE

- The paving schedule has been modified. Originally Lamprey Lane, Packers Falls Road, Garrity Road and Pinkham Roads were to be paver shimmed under the Phase 1 plan. Now Packers Falls and Garrity Roads will be paver shimmed and a 1" thick hot top overlay done at the same time under Phase 1. Amongst other advantages this will allow the department to get all of the striping done on the 8 miles of roads that are applicable as soon as Phase 1 paving is completed. This will also allow more time to get the roads ready under the Phase 2 paving plan. GMI Paving is expected to pave these two roads in a couple of weeks.
- The Department has cleaned the ditches on all of Pinkham Road West and about 1/3 of Garrity Road. The department has also cut brush and hanging limbs on about 1/3 of Garrity Road.
- As of this writing the crew is getting set up to excavate 3" deep on the three culvert trenches on Lamprey Lane and hot top them.
- The department's main emphasis the next two weeks will be in cleaning ditches, and brush/hanging limb removal on Packers Falls and Garrity Roads and preparing those two roads for paving.
- The department is slowly making progress on constructing a replacement town dock. The wood has been obtained, dried, cut and has one coat of paint.

COME WALK WITH THE CONSERVATION COMMISSION TO SEE CONSERVED LANDS IN LEE! EVERY WEDNESDAY MORNING

Residents are invited to join members of the Conservation Commission any Wednesday morning while they conduct site walks on the Town's conserved properties. Some of these lands are owned by the Town, but most of them are privately owned and protected in perpetuity with a conservation easement. If you'd like to participate, call the Town Secretary, Denise Duval, at 659-5414. We meet in the Town Hall parking lot at 8:45 am, dressed for walking in the woods. Standard precautions for ticks & mosquitoes are advised. Walks take 1½-2 hrs.

THE LIFE AQUATIC: INTERESTING CREATURES IN A TOWN FOREST VERNAL POOL

With enough of a breeze to keep the bugs off, the ten participants at Saturday, May 26^{th'}s Tadpole Stroll had perfect weather for encountering some of the denizens that frequent vernal pools. Barb Wauchope got things off to a terrific start by bringing a small mass of salamander eggs that she'd scooped from her backyard pond. While we waited for the 10:00 a.m. start time, we used hand lenses and a loupe and flashlight to look at the larvae in their eggs, and one which had already emerged - it was wonderfully spotted and its lovely golden eyes and feathery gills were easily observed.

The walk through the woods and along the edge of the bog was beautiful, with a well-tuned catbird singing us along as we made our way to the pool. Also heard, and very briefly seen, was a gorgeous yellow throat warbler.

At the pool, each person took a clear plastic dipping container and used it to scoop into the water at



the pool's edge. Whenever something interesting was caught, the container was brought to the viewing station, where hand lenses and field guides helped to identify a particular critter. Among the vertebrates were wood frog tadpoles, salamander tadpoles (top,

left), a spring peeper tadpole (middle, left), and a clutch of spotted salamander eggs whose larvae were just about ready to hatch - individuals could be

seen moving within their eggs, and their gills could be seen through the algaetinged jelly.

An enormous female bullfrog (bottom, right) (Bill Humm suggested that perhaps cowfrog would be a more appropriate term) was briefly scooped up - filling the entire scoop, before making a great leap out of the cup and into the pool.



Equally fascinating were the invertebrates that were found. Among those scooped

and identified at the viewing station were caddisfly larvae in their intricate cases, phantom midge larvae, predaceous

diving beetle larvae (middle, left), damselfly larvae, mosquito larvae, and one hideously awesome hellgrammite (middle, right), which is the larvae of the dobsonfly.

A good collection for an hour's worth of dipping, and well worth the damp feet on our return trip through the forest!




