

# PULL THE PLUG on aquatic hitchhikers!

Before leaving any boat launch area:

CLEAN all mud, plants, animals, and debris off your boat, trailer, and equipment and dispose away from the waterbody where it won't wash back into the water.

DRAIN

the boat motor, live wells, bait wells, ballast bags and tanks, and bilge areas away from the waterbody where it won't flow directly back into the water - avoid draining while on the ramp incline.\* draining while on the ramp incline.

(Commercial Enterprises & Emergency Response Vehicles: See special exemptions below.)

DRY

anything that came in contact with the water. Rinse and towel-dry all equipment or allow for 5 days drying time.



Canoes, Kayaks and Paddleboards:

Clean, Drain, and Dry these, too!

## NEW STATE LAW EFECTIVE JANUARY 1, 2017

When transporting boats between waterbodies:

- ALL hitchhiking fragments of vegetation and animals must be removed before leaving the launch area.
- ALL drain plugs must be REMOVED or in the OPEN position.

\*SPECIAL EXEMPTIONS: Commercial enterprises transporting boats for off-site storage, maintenance, or repairs, and emergency response vehicles and equipment DO NOT need to be drained before leaving the launch area but DO NEED to be drained BEFORE being launched into another waterbody.

(NH RSA 487:16-d)

## TRASH PILE REMOVED FROM TOWN FOREST

After a snowstorm this winter, students from classes at Mast Way School were following coyote tracks when they discovered a large pile of junk and the remnants of a fire at an off trail site in the Town Forest. The students wanted to do something to clean up the mess, so they made note of the junk pile's location and made plans to return in the spring in order to remove the junk and bring it to the Transfer Station.

Last Thursday, students from Mr. McCormick's class returned with wheelbarrows and carted out three bicycles, a rusted wheelbarrow, a fire extinguisher, a large can of roofing cement, a sheet of galvanized metal and various rusted cans. There was enough trash to fill two wheelbarrows, and with help from Mr. McCormick and Ms. Fisher, it was all carted out of the woods and brought to the recycling center. The children left the extinguisher and roofing cement can with Mr. Rice and (with great gusto) tossed the rest of the junk into the big red recycling bin. The Conservation Commission commends these students for their good work and would like to take this opportunity to remind everyone that both campfires and dumping trash are prohibited in the Town Forest.



#### TRANSFER STATION MANAGER POSITION

The Town of Lee, NH is accepting applications for the position of Transfer Station Manager. This position is responsible for the day-to-day operations of the Transfer Station and oversight of 1 FT and 4 PT employees and assists the public in disposal of materials, including separation and recycling materials, and supervises the collection and storage of useable, recyclable solid waste, and investigates markets and methods for their disposal. Attendance at some night meetings is required. Applicants should have at least 5 years of experience in solid waste disposal operations supplemented by some technical training, at least two years of supervisory experience, and certification from the State of New Hampshire as Solid Waste Facility Operator, Level III. Salary commensurate with experience, excellent benefit package.

The Heritage Commission is happy to report that a site visit and analysis of the historic Lee Archives was done on May 15, 2017 by specialists from the Northeast Document Conservation Center. We expect their report by the end of June, which will give us specific recommendations for how to organize and protect Lee's historic documents in their new archive space at the Lee Public Safety Complex. This work will not only protect the collection, but eventually make it possible to give researcher's access to the archives. This work is being made possible due to a preservation Moose Plate Grant awarded to the Lee Heritage Commission last summer.

Answer to Last Week's Lee Trivia Question: The first three selectmen elected to serve the Town of Lee were Robert Thompson, Ely Clark, and Nicholas Duba.

The office of selectman, unlike some other offices in colonial America, was not imported from England, but gradually evolved in New England. From the beginning, the selectmen exercised the general power to superintend the concerns of the town. Originally, they only implemented the decisions of the frequent town meetings which were held to decide nearly every detail of town business. As town meetings became more formal and were held at less frequent intervals, the selectmen acquired more discretionary power. Many of the important duties exercised by selectmen today originated in the seventeenth century.




## WILKINSON FOOD PANTRY Lee Church Congregational 17 Mast Rd


