# NH DRA'S ANNUAL LOW & MODERATE HOMEOWNERS PROPERTY TAX RELIEF PROGRAM

The Low and Moderate Income Homeowners Property Tax Relief provisions are designed to lessen the economic burden of the State Education Property Tax on certain taxpayers. NH residents who own a homestead subject to the State Education Property Tax, resided in the homestead as of April 1<sup>st</sup> of the year for which the claim for relief is being made, and have a total household income of \$20,000 or less if a single person (or \$40,000 or less if married or head of household) may apply for property tax relief during the filing period - after May 1, 2018, but no later than June 30, 2018. # A LEE FIRE & PLANNING AND ZONING DEPARTMENT REMINDER TO ALL HOMEOWNERS AND BUSINESSES IN THE TOWN OF LEE

A Building Permit is required for all tents that are 400 square feet and over per the International Building Code adopted by NH and the Town of Lee. #### **ATTENTION**

Yard Sale season is upon us which brings up an issue of signs being posted improperly. Please remember that advertisements of any kind need to be posted on "free standing" posts not on telephone poles, street signs, markers, posts, etc. If you do put signs out for yards sales etc., please make sure that they do not

block the view of traffic, are not on town property, and, if on private property that you have the land owner's permission and that you remove them once the event is over. Signs that are left behind generally end up blowing away and become trash. Thank you!

#### **CHAPTER 236**

#### HIGHWAY REGULATION, PROTECTION AND CONTROL REGULATIONS

**Outdoor Advertising - Section 236:75** 

236:75 No Advertisements of Any Kind Upon Certain Objects. —Notwithstanding any provisions of the law to the contrary, it shall be unlawful to affix, attach or display any advertisement upon any object of nature, utility pole, telephone booth, or highway sign, directly in such a manner that the object of nature, utility pole, telephone booth, or highway sign, is utilized as an integral part of the sign's support as distinguished from being only incidentally a support to the sign, such as the earth or ground upon which a sign is affixed. This prohibition shall extend to all primary and secondary highways and roads of and within the state without exception for any type of advertising. The owner of an object upon which an advertisement is placed in violation of this section shall be entitled to remove and destroy the advertisement and the advertisement owner shall not be entitled to damages or compensation therefor. The object owner shall be entitled to collect the costs associated with the removal and destruction from the advertisement owner or the person who is responsible for placing the advertisement on the object in violation of this section.

#### HIGHWAY DEPARTMENT UPDATE

- Mowing Due to the unusual dry period the grass has not grown too much. The department will be doing limited mowing until there is a significant rain event.
- The department installed the steel roof on the new swap shop building this week.
- A second coat of paint has been put on all of the pieces of lumber for the town dock and the crew is hoping to put it all together soon.
- The department cut brush and low hanging limbs on Packers Falls Road from Jenkins Road to Mast Road (Route 155A). Also the crew cleaned ditches from Jenkins Road to the Durham town line on Packers Falls Road.
- Paving is tentatively scheduled for Packers Falls and Garrity Roads Friday, June 22<sup>nd</sup>. If not that day it will be done sometime the week after.
- The department will continue cutting brush and cleaning a few more ditches on Garrity Road and prepping for paving next week.
- Wetland permits have been submitted to DES for the replacement of two culverts on Thompson Mill Road. Hopefully, there will be no problem with the permits and the culverts can be replaced in July.
- FEMA has approved funding for helping out with the cost of the March 13<sup>th</sup> and 14<sup>th</sup> snow storm. Potentially the town will get some funding from that.

# Notes on Composting from the Gasowski Family by Paul Gasowski



Our household is participating in the Low Carbon Diet, a program



aimed at reducing our carbon footprint. The four-part workshop, which is being co-sponsored by Low Carbon Diet-Seacoast NH and the Lee Sustainability and Energy Committees, is being facilitated by Jen Messeder, a town resident. Among the many 'Lifestyle Practices' that one may adopt, reducing our household waste stream and the volume of waste that we take to our

transfer station is one of the featured actions. There are many ways to accomplish this, one of which is composting. I suspect that many people in Lee compost at home; it might be interesting to find out how many compost and to compare notes.



In the thirty-three years that our family has lived in Lee, we have always composted, refining our approaches and techniques over time. Our formal composting set-up at the Gasowski home utilizes a triple bin composter that is joined by an 'Earth Machine' and a 'custom-built' 55 gallon rotating drum. Yard waste, some leaves, rotted wood and some garden waste rotate through the three bays in the triple bin unit. We get a small amount of compost out of the second and third bins each year. On the food waste side, material is collected in two one-gallon totes and added to either the Earth Machine or the 55 gallon drum. We blend grass clippings and yard and garden waste to our suitable food waste in both units. While the Earth Machine was purchased at our recycling center a few years back, the 55 gallon drum was custom-built by Kent Kasper, a town resident; he built the unit from a design that he modified somewhat. In his system, the drum is mounted on a substantial wood frame and rotates a full 360 degrees; it is quite efficient.

In addition to this formal set-up, our leaves and branches are piled at various places on the woodlot to rot in place. In recent years, we have attempted to build some 'dens' for wildlife. Virtually all of this work is done by hand (pruning, raking, wheeling and stacking), minimizing the use of the chain saw or lawn mower. And, we have eliminated most of our lawn, replacing it with plants, shrubs and trees, thus expanding our food sources and improving the habitat nearest to our home for all.

### COME WALK WITH THE CONSERVATION COMMISSION TO SEE CONSERVED LANDS IN LEE! EVERY WEDNESDAY MORNING

Residents are invited to join members of the Conservation Commission any Wednesday morning while they conduct site walks on the Town's conserved properties. Some of these lands are owned by the Town, but most of them are privately owned and protected in perpetuity with a conservation easement. If you'd like to participate, call the Town Secretary, Denise Duval, at 659-5414. We meet in the Town Hall parking lot at 8:45 am, dressed for walking in the woods. Standard precautions for ticks & mosquitoes are advised. Walks take 1½-2 hrs.

Last Week's Trivia Question: During the 17th and 18<sup>th</sup> centuries, there were a series of wars fought in New England between the English, the French, and their allied Indian tribes – including the Abenaki (aka: Wabanaki) tribes of Northern New England. On July 6, 1690, the Abenaki defeated the English soldiers in a battle at Wheelwright's Pond in Lee. What was the name of the larger war in which this battle was one event?

**Answer:** The battle at Wheelwright's Pond, fought on July 6, 1690, took place during King William's War (1688–1697). It was the first of a series colonial wars fought between New France and New England along with their respective Native American allies before France ceded its remaining mainland territories in North America (east of the Mississippi River) to Great Britain in 1763.




