GROUND BREAKING ARCHAEOLOGY IN NH Wednesday, July 16th 7:00 pm

Native Americans have lived in what is now New Hampshire for over 12,000 years. Their ways of life changed greatly over this span of time. Much of what we know about them comes from archeology, the scientific study of all the traces that people leave behind. Much of the recent field work uncovering important Native American sites in the state has been done by volunteers.

This talk will cover not only some of the things that modern archaeological work has revealed about Native Americans' ways of life, but also what it's like to be a part of the active volunteer program here in New Hampshire.



*The smart farmers who "collated" to get their haying done before July began to think, after their hay had been out nearly a week in the rain, that they would have to wring it out and take it in by the fire to dry. But Nature smiles on it this week.

*One of our greatest hustlers in the farming line is Josiah Sawyer. He has half an acre devoted to cucumbers, nearly an acre of peas, countless acres of potatoes and other edibles; he can't stop to be a Granger. He deserves success in his great undertakings.

*The Lee nine played the East Northwood second nine a game of ball on the latter's grounds last Saturday afternoon, resulting in a victory for Lee – 29 to 15.
