PUBLIC WALK ON MAUD JONES MEMORIAL FOREST

Saturday, August 17 2013, 10:00 a.m.

(Rain date: Sunday, August 18, 1:00 p.m.)

Sponsored by the Lee Conservation Commission

All residents of Lee and Interested persons are invited!

The purpose of the walk is to introduce folks to the location of a proposed walking trail through this town-owned forest, located between Garrity Road and Route 155 (Turtle Pond Road).

The management plan for the forest, approved in 2010, includes recreational objectives that include "Create an all-season, gated, trail system for foot traffic only." This proposal would represent the first step in meeting this objective.

The property includes a variety of interesting vegetation types and terrain, including a glacially produced dry "kettle hole" that the trail would skirt.

If time and interest permit, there would also be an opportunity to introduce participants to a proposed timber harvest area, which is also included in the management plan.

Meet at the forest sign and parking area along Garrity Road, across from the small, fenced cemetery about half-way along the road. For additional information and rain advisories: please call Don Quigley at 868-1466, or Bill Humm at 659-8857.

May 29, the Building Committee toured the building site on the bluff overlooking Little River Park with Don Quigley, professor of forest technology at UNH's Thompson School of Applied Science, to evaluate the condition of the forest on the property. Test pits were done in June on the site, and no problems affecting construction were found. With the approval of the Select Board, the committee has begun working with Dennis Mires P.A., The Architects ~ the firm that developed the original design and site plan for the library community center in 2009-10, to refine and revise as necessary the floor and site plans. Members of the committee include Chuck Cox, Tom Dolan, Tobin Farwell, Paul Gasowski, Lou Ann Griswold, Leslie Martin, Katrinka Pellecchia, Zachary Smith, Sharon Taylor; Carole Dennis is the Select Board representative. the NEWMARKET ADVERTISER

August 10th, 1893

*Misses Victoria Biruie and Edna Bartlett have extended invitations to their friends to attend a lawn fete on the beautiful grounds of the Cartland farm.

*Our enterprising fish merchant, Dan Brackett, came along Monday with a very long face. "Couldn't get a fish, Grover has caught them all." Imagine Queen Victoria going fishing for six days out of seven.

*This is a year for great potatoes, Walter Tharton, so far as known, leading. He has one on exhibition that weighs 1 lb. 7 ounces. He is selling them by the bushel where nearly all of them weigh 1 lb. apiece.

*A small ripple of excitement disturbed the serenity of the Wadley's folds Monday morning, as a horse with harness came tearing through the village. The runaway was caused by the whiffletree falling on his heels.
