



A Humane Small Town by Matthew Rowell

A good friend of mine, and fellow committee member, Chuck Cox, recently lent me a book, *A Reasonable Life* by Ferenc Mate. Never before has someone thought of me with a more applicable book in any phase of my life.

In 2015 I was recalled from the Navy Reserves to spend a year on active duty in Africa. This changed my life in many ways, but the one relevant to this story is my view on family, freedom and community. It was from Africa that I joined the Lee Sustainability Committee after awakening to the idea that to change the world, we must first change ourselves and work out to influence positive change in our family then our community, and so on.

My tenacity for personal freedom has spawned many ideas which are usually met with rolled eyes, or empty head nods, but after reading Ferenc Mate's words in *A Reasonable Life* I realized that my ideas, philosophies, and ideologies are not new, but they've been around for years!

He writes about how, as a society, we "traded granny for the VCR", which illustrates the era he's writing from and resonates so deeply with me as my research leads me to the statistic that we spend 97% of the time we'll ever spend with our parents by the time we graduate high school. That ship has sailed for me, but I aspire for my relationship with my children to be an outlier.

After closing out a chapter on the peril of big cities, Ferenc writes about that Humane Small Town we all long for. The one people escape the city to be in. Where neighbors know each other and help each other, because that's just what you do. Where you know your vegetable grower, cattle herder, lumber sawyer, and mechanic by name. And you trust them.

I'd like to offer to you that Lee is that Humane Small Town. But I didn't always know that, and I'm writing this to everyone in town who is where I was. Sustainability has many interpretations and the one that we lean on the most at the LSC is with regard to the environment, evidenced by our work with ground water awareness and composting. If we broaden it to 'the ability to be maintained' then we can apply it to much more in life, and here, I'm choosing to apply it to Community.

Unlike our other articles to date, which have mostly been for awareness, this article is a call to action. To make this town A Humane Small Town in YOUR life, I invite you to get involved. Here are some of the many ways:

Volunteer for a Committee – the town always needs fresh ideas, and this is a great way to grow your local network.
Join the NeighborLEE Facebook Group – as of this writing its 316 people strong. While it's a
great way to learn about what's going on in town, the value is in starting relationships to
then grow beyond the digital domain.
Shop Locally - Go out of your way to shop at the Lee Farmer's Market, or ask the
community for what you need: honey, meat, vegies, lumber, ointments, automotive, yard,
and so much more. There is so much available here in town, please support your neighbors.
Start a Side Hustle - I'm a huge advocate for everyone having a side hustle. The more
products and services available in this town, the stronger we'll become as a whole.
Go Meet Your Neighbors – Persevere through the modern social awkwardness by bringing a
gift of a small consumable food item and a card with your contact information.
Show Up – Whether it's to the Lee Fair, the Farmer's Breakfast, or the Music in the Park.
Show up, meet one person, and welcome other people meeting you.

WHEN SECONDS COUNT...

Can the Police, Fire, or Ambulance find your home when you need them for assistance with an emergency? Can they find it at night? Can they find it during a snowstorm?

Having your name and number on a mailbox is just not enough. Some mailboxes are clustered together. The numbers are small and the location may not mark the entrance to your driveway.

The Lee Firemen's Association, in a joint effort with the Lee Fire Department, has started a program to install reflective house number signs at driveway entrances to assist all emergency responders in locating your home in a time of need.

The cost for each sign with a post is \$30.00 and it will be installed by the Lee Firemen's Association.

A LEE FIRE AND PLANNING & ZONING DEPARTMENT REMINDER TO ALL HOMEOWNERS AND BUSINESSES IN THE TOWN OF LEE

A Building Permit is required for all tents that are 400 square feet and over per the International Building Code adopted by NH and the Town of Lee. An Assembly Permit is required for all tents being occupied by more than 50 people per RSA 155:17-39. **CLICK HERE** for more information or call Planning and Zoning at 603-659-6783 or the Fire Department at 603-659-5411.

ATTENTION REGARDING SIGNS

Please remember that advertisements of any kind need to be posted on "free standing" posts, not on telephone poles, street signs, markers, posts, etc. If you do put signs out for yards sales etc., please make sure that they do not block the view of traffic, are not on town property, and, if on private property that you have the land owner's permission and that you remove them once the event is over. Thank you!

CHAPTER 236

HIGHWAY REGULATION, PROTECTION AND CONTROL REGULATIONS Outdoor Advertising - Section 236:75

236:75 No Advertisements of Any Kind Upon Certain Objects. —Notwithstanding any provisions of the law to the contrary, it shall be unlawful to affix, attach or display any advertisement upon any object of nature, utility pole, telephone booth, or highway sign, directly in such a manner that the object of nature, utility pole, telephone booth, or highway sign, is utilized as an integral part of the sign's support as distinguished from being only incidentally a support to the sign, such as the earth or ground upon which a sign is affixed. This prohibition shall extend to all primary and secondary highways and roads of and within the state without exception for any type of advertising. The owner of an object upon which an advertisement is placed in violation of this section shall be entitled to remove and destroy the advertisement and the advertisement owner shall not be entitled to damages or compensation therefor. The object owner shall be entitled to collect the costs associated with the removal and destruction from the advertisement owner or the person who is responsible for placing the advertisement on the object in violation of this section.


DISPOSAL OF PRESCRIPTION DRUGS

- The Lee Town Center is now sporting a bright new summer look, due to the Lee Heritage Commission asking our very own Lee artist, Amy Daskal, co-owner of Blue Bell Greenhouse, to design some colorful banners. The two Little River Park banners should be up soon!


