SENIOR ADVISORY COMMITTEE UPDATE



The animal life we come across during our weekly Little River Park nature walks doesn't always have a backbone, in fact right now it's the arthropods that are putting on the show. The cicada killers have bounced back from the prolonged, heavy rains of last week and continue digging their extraordinary tunnels; dragon flies patrol airspace above the park; robber flies perch on branches and grasses, ready to dart out and seize their prey as it flies past; and an amazing array of pollinators are working over the blooms of late summer. On our last walk, the above nursery web spider - a handsome lady with long, elegantly-striped legs was photographed as she kept guard over her numerous tiny spider lings tucked safe inside the silken nest she constructed shortly before they hatched. They will remain inside their nursery web and under mom's protection until their second molt.

We continue to be impressed with the array of plants and animals that make this little park their home and invite you to join us for each Saturday's 8:00 am ramble. "To the free holders and inhabitants of the Town of Durham qualified by law to vote in town affairs this is to give notice of a publick town meeting to be held at the meeting house a Durham Falls on Monday the third day of September next at two o'clock in the afternoon then and there to see if said inhabitants will pass a vote that the western end of said Durham shall be legally set off as a parish..."

And that was the beginning of the process to create the Town of Lee...


