THIS WEEK'S LEE TRIVIA QUESTION (answer will be given in next week's Lee E-Crier): The Battle of Wheelwright Pond occurred on July 6, 1690, 327 years ago. Our question is: Who is the Wheelwright Pond named for – a local maker of wagon wheels or ...? (With thanks to David Meeker for also providing this trivia question – as well as last week's Q.)

The answer to last week's trivia question:

The minutes of Lee Town Meeting on March 16, 1779 tell us: "Voted Ebenezer Burnham, Timothy Moses, John Davis, Jr., Aaron Harriscomb, Eleazer Watson, field drivers and hog reeves." What were the duties the Town expected of these field drivers and hog reevers? (With thanks to David Meeker for this trivia question.)

Each of these positions was involved in protecting the Town from damage due to stray animals. The field drivers were charged with driving stray cattle to the pound where the owner could pick them up – probably after paying a fine. Hog reeves were charged with protecting home gardens from straying pigs. Many towns required loose pigs to wear yokes around their necks to keep them from going through or under garden fences. The hog reeves enforced this requirement and they, like the field drivers, were to impound straying or unyoked pigs. (Thank you for providing the answer as well, Dave!)
