FAMILY NATURE WALK AT LEE TOWN FOREST SATURDAY, October 1st 9:30 am

Autumn's first nature walk will take place in the Town Forest on Saturday, October 1. We'll visit the bog, an abandoned orchard that is in the midst of becoming a forest, and a lovely, dense stand of hemlocks. Along the way we'll take note of how the variety of plant species changes from habitat to habitat, and we'll pause to enjoy plants whose bloom-time marks the end of the flowering season and a last opportunity for nectar-gathering. Fall is a time of dispersal, so we'll keep an eye out for the fruits, seeds and nuts that mark this season's bounty and for birds that are relying on them as fuel for the long journey to their wintering grounds.

Sponsored by the Lee Conservation Commission family nature walks are generally held on the first Saturday of every month. We'll meet at the trail head behind the baseball dugouts (alongside the transfer station road). All ages welcome!


250th TIME CAPSULE
