FIRE PREVENTION WEEK OCTOBER 7TH - 13TH!

Urges Residents to "Have Two Ways Out!"

The Lee Fire & Rescue Department will be hosting Station Tours and providing handouts during Fire Prevention Week to promote "Have Two Ways Out!" Residents can learn more about the importance of fire escape planning and practice, as well as the power of prevention.

If you woke up to a fire in your home, how much time do you think you would have to get to safety? According to the nonprofit National Fire Protection Association (NFPA), 1/3 of American households estimated that they would have at least 6 minutes before a fire in their home would become life threatening. Unfortunately, the time available is often less. Lee's Fire Dept is teaming up with NFPA during Fire Prevention Week, to urge residents to "Have Two Ways Out!" This year's theme focuses on the importance of fire escape planning and practice.

In 2010, U.S. fire departments responded to 369,500 home structure fires. These fires caused 13,350 civilian injuries, 2,640 civilian deaths, and \$6.9 billion in direct damage. "One house fire was reported every 85 seconds in 2010," says Scott Nemet, Captain of the Lee Fire & Rescue Dept. "Fire is unpredictable and moves faster than most people realize. Having a tried and true escape plan with two ways out is essential to ensuring your family's safety should fire break out in your home."

Lee Fire & Rescue Department recommends the following tips for planning your family's escape:

Make a map of your home. Mark a door and a window that can be used to get out of every room.

Choose a meeting place outside in front of your home. This is where everyone can meet once they've escaped. Draw a picture of your outside meeting place on your escape plan.

Write the emergency telephone number for the fire department on your escape plan.

Sound the smoke alarm and practice your escape plan with everyone living in your home.

Keep your escape plan on the refrigerator and have your family practice the plan twice a year or whenever anyone in your home celebrates a birthday.

NEW VOTER ID LAW DISPUTE GOES TO NH SUPREME COURT

The NH Supreme Court agreed to assume jurisdiction on a dispute over new voter registration requirements. Last week, the Strafford Superior Court filed a preliminary injunction blocking the new Voter ID requirements, but the Attorney General's office is asking the Supreme Court to overturn the Strafford County ruling. House Speaker Bill O'Brien also filed a motion with the Supreme Court asking to intervene on behalf of the House of Representatives.

At issue is whether or not out of state students attending school in NH will be required to register their car and get a NH driver's license if they wish to vote in NH.
