WATER CHAMPIONS CELEBRATED AT LAMPREY RIVER EVENT

Lee, NH – On Friday, October 21, the Lamprey River Watershed Association will honor volunteers who have worked for a clean and sustainable water supply. It is also a celebration of the 20^{th} anniversary of the Lamprey River designation as a national Wild and Scenic River.

The keynote speaker is Cameron Wake, Research Professor Climatology & Glaciology, UNH on "How Will Flooding Change on the Lamprey River in the Future? Preparing for the New Normal."

Climate impacts are on our minds as we see continued extreme drought conditions locally and historic flooding in other locations. The Lamprey River has also had historic flooding in recent years. Why such extremes? Are our small towns ready for such drastic weather events? Dr. Wake's recent research sheds light on what we can expect locally with newly released information.

The event will take place at the Jerimiah Smith Grange Hall in Lee at 6 pm. A spaghetti supper with homemade desserts will be served at 6:30 and the program begins at 7.
