Dipping Temps Mean Deadly Carbon Monoxide Looms, as Residents Burn Fuel to Heat Homes

As New Hampshire residents start turning on the heat to combat colder daytime and evening temperatures, fire departments and emergency responders expect an uptick in calls for help related to carbon monoxide exposure. To educate citizens about the elevated risks associated with carbon monoxide in colder weather, State Fire Marshal Paul J. Parisi and *The New Hampshire/Vermont CO Alliance* are committed to putting this issue at the forefront throughout November, which has been recognized as Carbon Monoxide Awareness month in our state since 2010.

Marshal Parisi wants to remind residents that, as people spend more time indoors and the heating season begins, it is important to realize carbon monoxide poisoning is a deadly threat within your home and is particularly dangerous because we cannot see, smell or taste it.

"Carbon monoxide (CO) gas is created whenever a fossil fuel such as oil, wood, gas, charcoal or kerosene is burned. These are all commonly used within heating systems in our region and as winter approaches, our use of them increases. These factors raise potential for dangerous levels of carbon monoxide to build up in our homes. Basically, when people breathe in the carbon monoxide gas it replaces oxygen in the body and can suffocate you before you realize what is happening," says Marshal Parisi. To combat this risk, here are some tips:

- **DO** have your heating system and water heater serviced every year by a licensed, qualified professional. The company that delivers your fuel typically has HVAC technicians and is often a good choice, or the home inspector if you are in the process of purchasing a home.
- When you buy gas-powered equipment, **DO** make sure it displays the seal of a national testing agency, such as Underwriter's Laboratories (UL).
- **DO** have your chimney checked annually to make sure it's not blocked by debris, which can cause CO to build up in homes and cabins.
- **DON'T** ever use gum, tape, or other materials to patch a vent pipe.
- **DON'T** ever use a generator, portable gas camp stove, grill or hibachi indoors.
- **DON'T** try to heat your home with a gas range or oven.

Nationwide, hundreds of people die accidentally every year from CO poisoning, often caused by malfunctioning or improperly used fuel-burning furnaces or appliances. Marshal Parisi advises, "Install a battery-operated or battery-backup carbon monoxide detector (CMD) in your home, whether you live in a single-family home, multi-unit dwelling, or a rental unit. You want to make sure they are installed outside each bedroom, and on each floor including the basement because over a third of CO-related fatalities happen when victims are asleep."

Last year, emergency services personnel responded to 1,100 incidents in New Hampshire where carbon monoxide was a threat. With temperatures falling around the state, earlier this week at least two fire departments were called to properties due to carbon monoxide, including Keene and Rindge. In neighboring Massachusetts, there was a carbon monoxide fatality less than two weeks ago (Oct. 18, 2018), which may be related to a home heating system. These incidents underscore the importance of CO alarms. Symptoms of CO poisoning can mimic viruses such as cold or flu and may include headache, dizziness, weakness, nausea, vomiting, sleepiness, and confusion.

"Do not ignore symptoms, particularly if more than one person is feeling them. Marshal Parisi warns, "**If you suspect CO poisoning, get outside to fresh air immediately, and then call 9-1-1.**" The NH and VT Carbon Monoxide Alliance will host its 3<sup>rd</sup> Annual Carbon Monoxide Awareness and Prevention Summit on November 7<sup>th</sup> at the Hilton Garden Inn, in Lebanon, NH. The summit's focus is to reduce the occurrence of carbon monoxide poisonings through education and outreach, convening stakeholders from the NH and VT bi-state region.









#### **ATTENTION REGARDING SIGNS**

Please remember that advertisements of any kind need to be posted on "free standing" posts, not on telephone poles, street signs, markers, posts, etc. If you do put signs out for yards sales etc., please make sure that they do not block the view of traffic, are not on town property, and, if on private property that you have the land owner's permission and that you remove them once the event is over. Thank you!

# CHAPTER 236 HIGHWAY REGULATION, PROTECTION AND CONTROL REGULATIONS Outdoor Advertising - Section 236:75

236:75 No Advertisements of Any Kind Upon Certain Objects. —Notwithstanding any provisions of the law to the contrary, it shall be unlawful to affix, attach or display any advertisement upon any object of nature, utility pole, telephone booth, or highway sign, directly in such a manner that the object of nature, utility pole, telephone booth, or highway sign, is utilized as an integral part of the sign's support as distinguished from being only incidentally a support to the sign, such as the earth or ground upon which a sign is affixed. This prohibition shall extend to all primary and secondary highways and roads of and within the state without exception for any type of advertising. The owner of an object upon which an advertisement is placed in violation of this section shall be entitled to remove and destroy the advertisement and the advertisement owner shall not be entitled to damages or compensation therefor. The object owner shall be entitled to collect the costs associated with the removal and destruction from the advertisement owner or the person who is responsible for placing the advertisement on the object in violation of this section.

## WHEN SECONDS COUNT...

Having your name and number on a mailbox is just not enough. Some mailboxes are clustered together. The numbers are small and the location may not mark the entrance to your driveway.

The Lee Firemen's Association, in a joint effort with the Lee Fire Department, has started a program to install reflective house number signs at driveway entrances to assist all emergency responders in locating your home in a time of need.

The cost for each sign with a post is \$30.00 and it will be installed by the Lee Firemen's Association.

# Announced on Tuesday, October 16, 2018!

The Lee Parsonage has been chosen by the NH Preservation Alliance as one of this year's "SEVEN TO SAVE" historic New Hampshire landmarks.



The New Hampshire Preservation Alliance has announced its 2018 Seven to Save list, featuring the Ruggles 236-acre mica mine in Grafton, the 250-acre Laconia State School campus, a dam of a water-power system at Canterbury Shaker Village and the enormous exhibition barn at the Rochester Fairgrounds. Also on the list highlighting endangered historic landscapes as well as iconic structures is a home dating from the 18th and 19th century that

stretches along the common at Haverhill Corner, an Italianate parsonage in Lee and a Prairie-style residence built for the Director of the Veteran's Administration Hospital in Manchester. Watch for stories of the seven that will be unveiled on <a href="https://nhpreservation.org/">https://nhpreservation.org/</a> in the coming days.

"These places makes our state distinctive, and help connect us to our rich and complex history," said Jennifer Goodman, executive director of the Preservation Alliance. "The need for new investment and creative re-uses as well as deterioration and demolition are varied threats to the historic properties on this list. Here are seven great opportunities to transform threatened resources into vibrant assets once again that help meet community and economic goals." She noted that the list is the most diverse in the program's 12-year history, and many of the listees are not yet well-known or understood, even in their own communities. These include a campus of National-Register eligible buildings of the former Laconia State School, the Director's House at the Manchester VA Hospital, the former parsonage in Lee, an exhibit hall barn at the Rochester Fairgrounds, Ruggles Mine, Turning Mill Pond at Canterbury Shaker Village, and the Col. Brown House in Haverhill Corner.

The list was announced at a N.H. Preservation Alliance event celebrating the rehabilitation of Washington's iconic 1787 Meetinghouse (which was listed to Seven to Save when future was uncertain in 2014).

"This iconic New England village is a fitting place to hold an event that showcases irreplaceable landmarks, power of people who love and champion special places, and the social and economic benefits of historic preservation activity," according to Andrew Cushing, Field Service Representative at the Preservation Alliance. "These positive themes need to be front and center as we address the enormous challenges ahead."

Seven to Save listing has helped to attract new investment and re-use options for over 50% of the community landmarks that have received the designation since the program began in 2006. Criteria for Seven to Save include the property's historical or architectural significance, severity of the current threat, and the extent to which the Seven to Save listing would help in preserving the property. Typically, nominated properties are owned by non-profits, municipalities or commercial entities, and have local advocates willing to work toward a creative "save" rather than allowing continued deterioration and possible demolition.

Seven to Save attracts attention to threats and helps forge possible solutions for endangered properties. Examples of successes include the Wolfeboro Town Hall, Charlestown Town Hall, Kensington Town Hall, Pickering House in Wolfeboro, Watson Academy in Epping, the Pandora Mill in Manchester, Littleton Community Center, and the Langdon Meetinghouse. Seven to Save sites that still need more creative planning, new investment, and advocacy include the Balsams in Dixville Notch, Concord's iconic Gas Holder House, the Chandler House in Manchester, Sanborn Seminary in Kingston, and the former Brown Paper Company's R & D building in Berlin.

Seven to Save's sponsors for 2018 include the Pinnacle Leadership Foundation, Chinburg Builders, Christopher P. Williams Architects, Levasseur Electrical Contractors, Inc., Milestone Engineering & Construction, Nathan Wechsler & Co., The MacMillin Company, and North Branch Construction. Also Ciborowski Associates, CMK Architects, Cobb Hill Construction, Dennis Mires, P.A. The Architects, Historic Sashworks, Misiaszek Turpin, Norton Asset Management, Steppingstone Masonry, Udelsman Associates and Windows & Doors by Brownell.



A drop-off is available at the Public Safety Complex to the left of the front entrance for unused and unwanted prescriptions.






