The residents of Lee are visiting and


using the library more than ever – taking advantage of the free print, electronic and programming resources available for

Updates Summer 2010

The Lamprey River Advisory Committee (LRAC) has been busy this summer. Here are some of the highlights:

Sense of Time and Place Along the Lamprev Series

The LRAC is pleased to announce the second in its three part series, "Wiswall and Folsom Mills: Two Historic Tales of How Water Power Became Economic Power". The event will feature a documentary on Durham's Wiswall Mills recently completed by Curt Mackail and a discussion by Jim Deely of Neatline Associates, focusing on the general context of historic mills in the Lamprev's watershed as well as information specific to Epping's Folsom Mills. Following the presentations, Jim will guide a tour of the ruins of Folsom Mills for participants. The work of Curt and Jim was funded under the LRAC's small grant program. The event is scheduled for Sept. 18, 1:00 to 3:30, beginning at the Epping Town Hall.

2010 Mini-Grants

To continue the tradition begun last year, the LRAC is funding work for small projects in the Lamprey River watershed:

The Town of Deerfield Planning Board is planning and mapping a system of low-impact trails throughout the town to complement the town's master plan and open space activities.

The Great Bay Estuarine Research Reserve is creating a tool lending library to help individuals and groups mechanically remove a wide range of invasive plant species. Contact Andy Gould at fieldecologist@yahoo.com or 778-0015 for more information.

The NH Coastal Protection Partnership is offering workshops on building rain barrels to help reduce run-off from roofs while also educating homeowners about the effects of overfertilizing lawns with nitrogen with the goal of getting them to sign a nitrogen reduction pledge. Neatline Associates of Deerfield is augmenting its historic mill and dam work from 2009 to create a more interactive mill experience on the LRAC's website, www.lampreyriver.org.

Land Protection

One of the main efforts of the LRAC is to protect land adjacent to the river by working with landowners to tailor conservation easements for their property. After many years of work and negotiations, the committee, several partners, and the river scored a major the win in town of Epping. Approximately 500 acres of prime wetlands and forest have been added to the river's tally of conserved land.

Summer Research

Three studies have recently begun along the Lamprey. The first, a fish survey, will provide a comprehensive assessment of existing fish communities throughout the Lamprey River watershed. The second study, a survey of fresh water mussels, will create an updated inventory to determine which mussels species are found in the Lamprey, with a special focus on the endangered brook floater mussel. Separately, the studies should yield interesting and important data, but

together, the findings can be used to help inform land use and conservation planning, storm water management, and water withdrawals.

A third study funded by NH DES and others, fluvial erosion hazards, will investigate where the potential for river bank erosion and subsequent loss of personal property or public infrastructure (such as culverts, bridges, or roads) is greatest. The resulting data will help municipalities be better prepared to prioritize upgrades and engage in appropriate planning.

New Bridge at Wiswall Falls, Durham

Last fall, the old, damaged bridge at Wiswall Falls was removed to make room for a new bridge. The old bridge had abutments on the river banks and a center support, all made of locally quarried granite.

The new bridge opened for traffic in June. It lacks a center support, but as part of mitigation for the loss of historic granite, three sides of the abutment seen from John Hatch Memorial Park have been faced with granite salvaged from the old supports. Funding for one abutment side was provided by LRAC.

Please heed signs on the bridge about safety. Ledge less than two feet below the water's surface occurs in places.

<u>Wiswall Historic Interpretive</u> Committee

Part of the funding that FEMA provided for the Wiswall bridge replacement

includes money for interpretation of the historic Wiswall area. The Wiswall Historic Interpretive Committee, composed of Durham residents and LRAC representatives, is hard at work creating a kiosk to help visitors appreciate the history of the mills and associated hamlet. The kiosk should be ready for installation at the John Hatch Memorial Park this fall.

Family Dragonfly Fun

Some local families recently had the opportunity to learn about dragonflies and damselflies and to try their hand (and nets) catching a few specimens to observe them up close. While the dragonflies were too elusive to be netted, participants did catch a nice variety of damselflies. In addition, frogs, fresh water mussels, fresh water snails, and larval insect molts were found and observed. At the end of the event, all participants, human and otherwise, returned safely to their homes.

Road Salt Reduction

The Lamprey River Advisory Committee joined several environmental partners in sponsoring a road salt reduction workshop in May. The LRAC funded the taping of the workshop and DVDs have been distributed to towns, NH DES, and the Great Bay Estuarine Research Reserve. NEWS at the TRANSFER STATION

As you've been able to see down in the backyard, we've

stockpile a lot of brush and some logs (stumps are not accepted). This September we will again have Pro-bark come and tumble-grind it. They will sell it as a fuel wood and then we don't smoke out our neighbors. This year the market for "chips" is near zero, so there is a cost involved. We plan to continue this program year round.

With the subjects of stumps, if your house was built in the 70's or 80's the usual disposal of stumps was to bury them on site. If you have the same problem as this writer has, it's a rapidly increasing depression somewhere in your yard. We have a free fix to help! We pay \$20 per ton to dispose of our "PGA" (processed glass aggregate). So if you have a contractor with a dump truck, we will load it for free and it's good material to fill in that type of depression. Mon., Wed., Fri. pick-up can be arranged too.

So what are we getting for recyclable prices these days; it changes a little weekly, but by the pound= Aluminum cans, \$.64, Tin cans \$.06, #2 plastic natural \$.22, #2 solid color, \$.16, #1 PETE (water and soda bottles) \$.095, Corrugated Cardboard \$.06, Newspaper \$.05, and Mixed paper \$.04 and oh, if it's in the trash, it costs us all \$.04. For each bag of trash, multiply that by 30 to 40 pounds. A load of Old Corrugated Cardboard (OCC) was shipped in the first week of September, we got \$2,530 for it and we ship it every 3 months.

We recently purchased a used baler from the City of Franklin. Pete Hoyt fabricated a new steel chute on the top. It is now up and operating, so that we have an additional baler if the old one should fail. Not only do we have a critical back-up but, we can now work on two separate bales at the same time. We have received a generous grant of \$5,000 from New Hampshire the Beautiful, a group that funds NH recycling efforts.

In case some of you want to know your Swap Shop staff, Linda is first to open weekdays, followed by Laurie, Nancy and Pat. 3:00 pm to 6:00 pm is Bill, and Saturday is Paul. We've been fortunate to have Vern and Harold to help fill in from time to time. Please help them by only bringing in clean useable items in good repair.
