SEXUAL ASSAULT SUPPORT SERVICES

Sexual Assault Support Services (SASS) is dedicated to the prevention of child sexual abuse, sexual assault and stalking, while supporting victims, survivors and others impacted by sexual violence.

The mission is accomplished by providing the following services:

- A confidential 24-hour sexual assault crisis hotline
- 24-hour advocacy and support at police stations, hospital emergency rooms, child advocacy centers and the courts
- <u>Support groups</u> for rape survivors, sexual abuse survivors, parents, and others affected by sexual violence
- Professional training and consultation to police departments, hospitals, schools and others in the community
- Sexual abuse and sexual assault prevention <u>education</u> in the schools for children, teens and parents
- Sexual harassment prevention workshops for teachers and children in schools, and managers and employees in the workplace

Client Services: During the 2010-2011 fiscal year, SASS responded to 13 Lee residents, providing service through hotline calls, accompaniments at hospitals, police departments and Child Advocacy Centers and the provision of support groups.

Education Programs: SASS Educators were able to present its range of agebased programs to a total of 338 students, and 49 teachers in the Lee schools system.

LEE COMMUNITY GARDENERS

~ The Garden of Native NH Plants ~ Four years ago a few enthusiastic Lee gardeners agreed that our fancy new recycling center needed some panache. Locating a garden in the space next to the building (instead of using it for more piles of debris), seemed to us a dandy way to enhance the transfer station and create a learning experience as well. We decided to limit the garden to "native" plants as they are hardier and more likely to survive harsh conditions.

The garden you see today has been made possible by grants from the NH and Strafford County Master Garden Associations (not Town taxes). Many plant donations and dedicated volunteers attend to all the necessary upkeep. It is open to anyone during recycling hours and we urge you to stroll through it whenever the spirit moves you. We are grateful to The Coastal Maine Botanical Garden for creating the labels you see along the path which identify the plants and verify that all are, in fact, native varieties.

Each year we welcome the classes from the Mastway School who visit the garden as part of their educational program. You may notice there are plenty of blueberries which you are welcome to sample; but do leave plenty for others to enjoy, as they are not intended to be for just a few serious harvesters. Soon our rapidly growing grapes will be ready for sampling as well.

If gardening is "your thing", please join us. We are always in need of more hands.

OYSTER RIVER and LAMPREY RIVER NEED YOUR HELP

Volunteers from Lee



are needed to help develop management plans for the Oyster and Lamprey Rivers. Earlier this vear. the Legislature designated segments of the Ovster River and the Lamprev and its major tributaries to the NH Rivers Management and Protection Program (RMPP). Designation results in better protection and management through a two-tiered approach: state protection of instream values, and local management of riparian lands.

The RMPP is administered by the NH Dept. of Environmental Services (DES), aided by a Local Advisory Committee (LAC) for each designated river. The LACs develop management plans that are integrated with community master plans and conservation programs. They also review and comment on any federal, state, or local government plans to approve, license, fund, or construct facilities that would alter the resource which values for the river was designated.

DES has invited the Lee Board of Selectmen to nominate individuals who would be interested in serving on either the Oyster or Lamprey River LAC. Ideally, they would prefer a broad range of backgrounds, for example, business, agriculture, conservation, government, education, etc. If you think this might interest you, please notify the Board of Selectmen, 7 Mast Road, Lee, NH 03861.



from the TRANSFER STATION

Lee residents did it again! Back in 2009 we were the first town in NH to get more money from recycling than we paid to get rid of the trash. From July 2010 through June 2011, we paid \$77,931 in tipping fees to get rid of our trash, and received \$82,451 from recycling income. It would be great if we could get the few who don't recycle to "pitch in" and get the rest of the recyclables out of the trash!

Household Hazardous Waste Collection **Day** - For a couple of decades it has been in September. This year the City of Dover will host the four town collection, on October 15th. They are located at 271 Mast Road in Dover. Please mark your calendars now for the Saturdav after Columbus Day! They will take: oil based paints. (not latex) old cleaners, pesticides and all old unwanted Lee pays a flat fee (by chemicals. population) to participate, so let's get those chemicals where they belong!

Brush - We will be storing all brush in the old burn area. It is all hauled away for tub grinding and recycled as a fuel wood. You can bring all brush (logs max 6" diameter and 4' in length). Pallets are accepted at the Bulky Fee Building at no charge, but are not taken by our brush hauler.

Hurricane Irene - When we have excessive tree damage from storms, we are sometimes open for "For Brush Only". You can be alerted for special opening times by signing up for town E-Alerts on Lee's website leenh.org. **Box Tops for Education** - Have you noticed an orange bucket on the wall between Mixed Paper and Corrugated Cardboard? It's for "Box Tops for Education". All General Mills products and some others, have a little coupon worth \$.10 each. Mike Bolduc had the idea to collect them from the Transfer Station, he services it, and gives the Box Tops to the Mastway School. So far they've raised over \$400, mostly from the orange bucket. Thanks to all of you that have been donating box tops!

A New Face - We have an additional attendant on some Saturdays. When one of the full time staff is away or sick, Frank Taylor comes in and helps keep the Transfer Station running smoothly. We welcome his help.

As school begins and we begin to think about the colder months ahead, I'd like to take this opportunity to remind all residents who are concerned about their upcoming heating bills this winter that



NOW is the time to think about applying for Fuel Assistance through Strafford County Community Action. The Low Income Home Energy Assistance Program, better known as Fuel

Assistance, provides income-eligible households with help in paying energy bills during the winter heating months.

You may also apply for the Electrical Assistance Program (this gives you a monthly discount on your electric bill) and Weatherization (this program can help to make your home more fuel efficient) at the same time. You may be eligible even if your heat is included in your rent! In that case payment would go to your landlord in lieu of rent.

Here is the most exciting news of all: This year Strafford County Community Action and the Town of Lee have made arrangements for applications for the above programs to be accepted on one day, Tuesday, October 11th here in Lee at the Public Safety Building. You MUST call the Dover office of Strafford County Community Action at 516-8130 to make an appointment as soon as possible in order to get an appointment on that date. If you are unable to make an appointment for that date, make sure you call the number above to make an appointment for another day. Don't delay!!!

I'd also like to announce that the New Hampshire Department of Human Services is now accepting applications online! If you are in need of assistance, you may now apply for Cash Benefits, Food Stamps, Medicaid, Medicare premium, and Child Care assistance from the privacy of your own home! EXPANDED LAMPREY RIVER ADVISORY COMMITEE

On June 7th, Governor Lynch signed House Bill 149, adding the entire Lamprey River and five of its major tributaries the NH Rivers to Management and Protection Program. Although the river in Lee and Durham has been in the program for more than twenty years, the other towns along the river were slower in offering their unanimous support for inclusion of the full river. Now that they too, are on board, the Lamprey and its drainage area will be defined by its natural boundaries. not arbitrary political Thank vou to all the boundaries. volunteers who made this happen.

The nomination to the program does not bring any funding to the river, but it does mean that representatives from the entire length will be engaged in creating a river management plan that will help guide decisions and activities that affect the river. The representatives will also have the opportunity to review and comment on all proposed projects that might impact the river, regardless of the town where the project is proposed. The new representatives will ioin seasoned of members the current LRAC beginning in September. Being able to view activities in the context of the full river should go a long way in protecting and managing the valuable resources of our Lamprey River.

NEW CANOE LAUNCH at WADLEIGH FALLS

homeowners how to keep their systems functioning well. She found that people had many common problems that are easily addressed:

- Know where the septic system is located in your yard. Consult your town hall if necessary. Keep the area free of shrubs and trees.
- Pump out the septic tank regularly. A tank full of oily scum or heavy sludge does not work.
- Do not use the toilet or sink as a garbage can. Do not dispose of medications or personal hygiene products in the toilet. Dispose of cooking grease by putting it with regular trash or burying it in soil away from the septic system. Do not put cat litter down the toilet. Use easily biodegradable toilet paper and avoid brands that are guilted or treated with lotions.

2011 SMALL GRANTS PROGRAM

While two grants are still in process, the grant awarded to Bambi Miller of the Strafford County Conservation District is winding down. Bambi created a pilot program that addresses one of the issues making water everywhere less clean: septic system malfunction. She led a public workshop to educate landowners about septic systems and then offered personalized site visits to review septic system care and advise

ROAD SALT, NOW?

Road salt has traditionally been used to fight ice on pavement, but salt is harsh on cars and can cause chronic water pollution. Freshwater fish and other tolerate aquatic life cannot salt. Further, salt is infiltrating groundwater supplies and some private wells in the area are showing increasing levels of sodium. For people with high blood pressure, this poses a direct health risk. Fall is the time to start thinking about winter salt.

In 2009, the LRAC partnered with several other environmental groups and sponsored а road salt workshop. Individuals from municipalities, NH DES, maintenance companies, and NH DOT shared their concerns and issues. The LRAC funded a videographer to record the workshop, entitled "The Road Less Salted". The DVD has been donated to all local libraries and most municipalities. If you would like to understand the issues and be part of the solution, please watch the DVD.
