Pearl Harbor, Harold Ward's extraordinary perspective on World War II
Wednesday, April 4th 7pm

Public Safety Complex

Even before he settled in Lee, NH as a young man in the late 50's with his wife Virginia, Harold Ward had witnessed some of the 20th Century's most dramatic events. Harold grew up in Harlem during the great depression. Before World War II, he enlisted in what was still a segregated and racist US Navy, and served as a mess assistant on the USS San Francisco. On December 7, 1941 his ship was docked in Pearl Harbor awaiting overhaul. His battle station as a lookout gave him a front row view of the surprise Japanese attack. The following year, Harold was seriously wounded when the San Francisco came under fire at the Battle of Guadalcanal.

Saturday, June 23 10am - 3pm

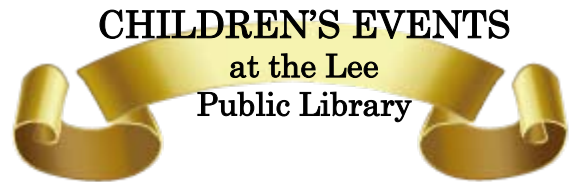

As a public safety organization, the primary goals for this and any McGregor's programs include injury prevention and preparedness through CPR and First Aid education. This program is recommended for youth 10 years of age and older who do not have extensive experience in babysitting. It is designed to be a hands-on interactive dialogue.

The program consists of five sections:

- Teach participants that babysitting is a responsibility
- Provide the participants with the skills and information necessary to keep children safe
- Familiarize the participants with the responsibilities of babysitting

- Develop confidence in handling the situations that may be encountered when babysitting
- Develop a positive attitude toward the care of children

FROM THE TRANSFER STATION

GLASS vs. ALUMINUM DISPOSAL

– Just so you know. It's better to recycle glass containers than to dispose of them in the trash. A glass bottle takes 4,000 years or more to decompose and using recycled glass in the manufacturing process saves raw materials, lessens the demand for energy and cuts CO2 emissions.



And...The aluminum can industry can make up to 20 cans from recycled aluminum with the same amount of energy it takes to make one new aluminum can. In fact, The National Recycling Coalition says aluminum cans are the single most important item to recycle.

But...The Town of Lee pays more than \$23.00 per ton to dispose of glass from the Transfer Station and makes \$1,420.00 per ton from aluminum!

So...If a resident were to regularly consume 3 beverages per day, it would cost the Town \$13.91 a year if the containers were made from glass, but would make the town \$48.59 if consumed from aluminum cans!

REDUCE, REUSE, RECYCLE

FROM the HIGHWAY DEPARTMENT

Winter

As of March 9, 2012 the Highway Department has plowed and/or treated 18 events this past winter (about half of a good winter). Ten of the events were plowable snow that totaled 40 inches. The biggest storms being 10-1/2 inches March 1st and the Snow-tober storm of 8 inches in October. As one might guess the Salt, Overtime, and Fuel budgets are in good shape.



Paving Prices

Some of the winter savings may be used up by increases in paving cost. The cost of paving is directly linked to fuel prices and we all know which direction they have gone. Liquid asphalt which is a large percentage of the cost of paving has increased 9% in the past 6 weeks and 25% from this same time a year ago. With this in mind the Highway Department will be doing some shim and seal treatment on some of the lesser traveled roads to try and stretch the paving dollar as well as protecting the pavement on said roads.

Landscaping

Many residents are probably planning landscaping projects for spring at this time including fencing, walls, loaming, etc... Please keep in mind the Town's Right of Way extends well beyond the edge of the pavement. Please call the Lee Highway Department (town roads) at 659-6515 or NH DOT at 868-1133 (state maintained roads) before doing any landscaping adjacent to the roadway.

Paving permits

Paving permits are required before paving or repaving any driveways attaching to any State or Town roads in Lee. These can be obtained at the Building Inspectors office at 659-6783.

High Road Bridge

The High Road Bridge has been passable for winter traffic since early January. The contractor is planning to mobilize again at the site as soon as the frost is out of the ground and the paving plants are open. We would expect this to be mid to late April. The remaining work includes shot blasting the bridge deck, installing a membrane over the deck, blending in the approaches, finish grading, loaming, paving, and guardrail work. The contractor will most likely be closing the bridge again once construction starts back up. It is anticipated that the road will be closed for two weeks. The Town has asked the contractor to do the necessary planning to keep the closure as short as possible. More on this will be posted in the E-Crier and the website as the schedule is developed.

Equipment

This winter has provided a good opportunity for the Highway crew to repair the town's older equipment. Included in the fleet are a 25 year old grader and a 26 year old plow truck. With some TLC and careful operators these vehicles should provide several more years of use for the town.

Roadwork

After the threat of snow is gone, the final schedule for roadwork will be posted on the website and the E-Crier.

NOTES FROM THE TOWN CLERK
VEHICLE REGISTRATION Information

What do I need to renew my registration?

Due to the Privacy Act, you must present your old registration or the reminder letter sent to you from this office. If you are a new resident of Lee, we also require proof of residency.

What do I need to register a vehicle just purchased? If purchased from a New Hampshire dealer, we will need the blue Application for Certificate of Title.

If purchased from an out of state dealer or private owner, we will need the title or certificate of origin. For vehicles older than 15 years, we need either the title, old New Hampshire registration on the vehicle, or form TDMV 19A (obtained from this office or on the State of New Hampshire website).

If transferring plates to a new vehicle, we need your old registration or a certified copy of the registration (obtained from the DMV or our office, for a fee). We **cannot** transfer plates if you do not have one these documents.

What do I need on a Bill of Sale?

Per RSA 261:148 Permit Required, to be a proper Bill of Sale, the following information needs to be provided:

1. Date of Sale
2. Description of the vehicle: make, model, VIN, model year, year of manufacture, type of body and number of cylinders
3. Name and address of purchaser
4. Signature and address of seller.
