



LAMPREY RIVER ADVISORY COMMITTEE Summer News

Small Grants Awards

The LRAC funded a Tool Loan program at the Great Bay Research Reserve to borrow weed wrenches and other tools, www.greatbay.org/programs/tool-loan-program.htm.

This year's LRAC Small Grant awards went to:

Deborah McNelly, a retiring fourth grade teacher at Mast Way School, has agreed to upgrade the Lamprey River Curriculum, which she helped to write a decade ago.

Bambi Miller, Strafford County Conservation District will work with district land owners in the watershed to help them learn more about their own septic systems, to suggest ways to upgrade them when necessary, and how to keep them in good repair.

Cindy Jupp-Jones, from Breakaway Media will create a video that shows the expanse of the Lamprey River, reveals its rich natural resources and the effects of human impacts.

Whole Lamprey River Nomination in the Near Future.

The LRAC is expanding to include representatives from river towns, now that the entire river and its major tributaries have been designated into the state's River Management and Protection Program. The volunteer effort and the unanimous support of all the river towns hold the promise of more conservation efforts that cross town lines, and result in better protection of the river and its resources.

Research Projects

Biologist Ethan Nedeau found that among the several mussel species that used to be in the Lamprey, only one, the eliptio is still there in quantity. Mussels filter gallons of water each day, feeding on tiny organisms and sending cleaner water back into the river.

Biologist Matt Carpenter surveyed 77 sites in the Lamprey, tributaries and streams. Some species that he is concerned about are the banded sunfish, red fin pickerel, and the snail darter. To preserve the diverse fish population small streams must be protected.

Education, Outreach, and Recreation

John Bromley's ORHS biology class spent two pleasant days in April exploring and documenting vernal pools at the Lubberland Creek Conservation parcel in Newmarket and at the Lamprey River Preserve in They found a Blanding's Durham. turtle, fairy shrimp, frog eggs, and the rare blue spotted salamanders. They shared their data with the state and reported their findings at the ORHS science evening in June. Though vernal pools occur in the spring and often dry up in the summer they are important habitats for amphibian egglaying and reproduction.

This summer,

- Come boating at the new site on Highway 152 in Lee by mid-July.
- Look for <u>River Story</u>; <u>Wiswall</u> <u>Mills</u>; <u>Streamwalk</u>; <u>Mary Blair</u> <u>Park</u> at the Lee Library and on the Lee Cable Channel.

LEE ENERGY COMMITTEE sponsors the first Lee Energy Fair

Lee Energy Committee held the first annual Lee Energy Fair on April 16, 2011 at Mast Way School. There were 20 vendors from the renewable energy and energy efficiency industry throughout the seacoast, and over 150 residents in attendance throughout the day.

The event was intended to mobilize, enthuse and educate local people around energy efficiency renewable energy, provide information and resources for community members and introduce local companies and contractors to interested residents. In addition to the vendor area, there were a series of presentations from leaders of NH green economies, followed by a question and answer period.

The event was a resounding success and those in attendance felt that it was a beneficial exercise that addressed a significant need within the community. The energy fair provided a unique opportunity to distribute a survey to determine the goals of the Lee community and provide guidance for the Lee Energy Committee around future initiatives. Respondents of the survey were entered into a drawing for a variety of door prizes including free home energy audits, Kill-a-watt energy meters, solar site assessments and more.

Analysis of the surveys indicated that renewable energy is the most important local energy issue from respondents, followed by saving money on energy expenses. The most significant response from the survey was regarding energy saving measures for school and town buildings, with 98% of respondents in support of future efforts. The Lee Energy Committee will use the collected surveys to focus its future efforts.

LEE ENERGY PLAN

Update of 2011 Progress

The Lee Energy Committee is working a \$40,000 federally funded grant that Lee received for the creation of a Lee Energy Plan.

There are four parts to the plan:

- 1- Creation of a Lee Energy Plan Handbook with recommendations for energy conservation and generation for citizen homes and lifestyles.
- 2- Completion of the energy use audits for the remaining municipal buildings that began under the Municipal Energy Assistance Program in 2010.
- 3- Creation of a feasibility study for a District Heating and Co-Generation System for buildings within the town center.
- 4- Review of local regulations that highlight energy conservation and sustainability related issues.

SDES Group, LLC of Dover has been working with the Lee Energy Committee on the first three sections of the grant project. The Lee Energy Fair in April was the first public outreach event. Energy Handbook is in process. and the feasibility study for Heating and Co-District Generation System and municipal energy use audits are scheduled for late summer and fall.

Jeffrey Taylor and Associates are working on the energy policy audit and have been reviewing the relevant Lee regulations. met with Lee officials including the Board of Selectmen, Planning Board, the Local Energy Committee, and the community-atlarge to review local energy policy documents that articulate community's energy goals. Based on the findings of the regulatory audit. Jeffrey Η. Taylor Associates are working with the Energy Committee and Planning Board to identify local energy conservation strategies recommendations. These items will be incorporated into a draft energy section to be included in the Lee's Plan. Based Master on the identified priorities in the regulatory audit, the firm will work with the Town to prioritize and draft amendments to the land use regulations for Planning Board consideration.

The initial audit and draft of the Energy Chapter are slated for completion by the end of summer. Proposed regulatory changes could be reviewed in February and voted on at Town Voting Day in March of 2012.







NEWS from the HIGHWAY **DEPARTMENT** At this time the Highway Department isreadying for the summer paving program and doing all the mowing of Town Cemeteries, Grounds & Recreation areas. The roads to potentially be paved are Stepping Stones East, Caverno Drive, Allens Ave., Decato Drive, Granger Drive. Jacob Lane, and Furber Drive. One of these roads may need to be deleted depending on the price at the time of paving.

Centerline Striping – Striping will be accomplished in June on the same roads that are normally done.

Mowing - As soon as paving is completed the department hopes to start roadside mowing and trimming with our new sickle bar mower attachment for our skid steer.

High Rd Bridge- By the time this newsletter is published work should be starting on the High Rd Bridge project. R.M. Piper was the successful bidder for this project at \$1,123,000. We have heard only good things about R.M. Piper so hopefully the project will go smoothly. Keep in mind that the town only pays 20% of the total cost of this project. NEWS from the TRANSFER STATION In the first ten days of the month we shipped a trailer load of Corrugated Cardboard, a trailer load of Mixed Paper and a "roll-off" of Lt. Iron. The Town received a check for \$5,120, for recycling these items. Thank you to the citizens who recycle! However, we still see a whole lot of recyclables in the trash that we are all paying to dispose of, when we could be getting more income.

We had projected recycling income of \$45,000 for the fiscal year ending in June. Our latest estimate is about \$80,000. This is not from better recycling, but better market prices. We hope this market continues!

Interesting...if a beer drinker buys bottles, it <u>costs</u> the town \$15.50 per year in glass disposal, but if the containers were aluminum cans, the town would <u>make</u> \$112 per year.

Brush: We are storing all brush in the old burn area. (max 6" diameter and 4' in length). Pallets are still accepted at no charge. Please leave pallets off at the Bulky Fee Building.

Our hours: 7:00 am - 6:00 pm Tuesday and Thursday, 7:00 am - 5:00 pm on Saturday. If a holiday falls on a Tuesday, Thursday or Saturday, we will be closed. However, we do not close during snow storms, severe weather, power outages etc. This is one extra benefit of having a building to safely operate in.

Now Available on Microfilm

Thanks to a generous donation from three local families, the library now has in its collection several microfilm reels of the *Newmarket Advertiser*, an historic newspaper that contains a trove of news about the people and events in Newmarket, Lee, and surrounding towns in the late 19th and early 20th centuries.


Each edition of the paper features a column dedicated to Lee news and events, including the activities of various town citizens, farm reports, town businesses, school news, the railroads and mills. For instance, the 1907-1908 editions of the *Newmarket Advertiser* tell the ongoing saga of the disruption of mail service at the Wadley Falls Post Office, and the subsequent

dissatisfaction of several business owners with the fluctuations of mail service partially caused by the termination of the local stage coach. During this same time period, the newspaper chronicles the renovation work for the Town Hall, as well as the introduction of telephone service to Lee.

Newmarket The Advertiser provides a small snapshot of Lee's historic past not found in the library's print local history collection. The entire newspaper collection covers the period from January 1891 - March However, the library currently only has the years 1907-1918 available on microfilm, with printouts of some earlier editions available on The library hopes to add additional years to its microfilm collection. as funding becomes available.

Town Meeting, the Lee Library
Board of Trustees is pleased to
announce that the documents
establishing the new Lee Public
Library Community Center
Foundation have received
preliminary approval.

The trustees also ask you to please note the following policy changes:

Tape/cassette donations: The library is no longer able to accept donations of VHS tapes or music or audiobooks on cassette for its collection or for the book sale.

WORKSHOP on HOW to MAKE YOUR SEPTIC SYSTEM LAST "FOREVER"

There will be a workshop held at the Lee Safety Complex on June 29th, at 7:00 pm. Bambi Miller of the Strafford County Conservation District and Tom Canfield, experienced Septic Designer and will be the speakers. Installer. Attendees will learn about how a septic system works and how to keep it working. A model of a working system will be available for viewing. There will be discussion of:

- Signs of a failing system
- Who can repair a system and what permits are needed?
- How often should the septic tank be pumped out?
- Care of your system to keep it working properly and <u>extend</u> its life
- Costs of maintaining verses replacement of system
- The different kinds of systems available and how they work, and their limitations

Contact information of local designers, installers, and pumpers will be available. Attendees will have the opportunity to questions on the subject of "poop control", including septic system designs, on-going maintenance and treatment, as well as other non-point pollution source and concerns that landowners are or should concerned with. This program is

made available through the Lamprey River Advisory Committee's Small Program educate Grants to landowners on being good stewards of their properties to protect the river and associated habitats. The program is being presented in with cooperation the Lee Conservation Commission.

SEPTIC SYSTEM SITE WALKS Offered This Summer

Landowners will have the opportunity to have a personal site walk to discuss their plans, issues, and conservation concerns for their own property.

This Pilot Project is to provide nonregulatory outreach and education to land owners through private confidential site walks with Bambi Miller of the Strafford County Conservation District. The focus is on septic systems. Landowners will have the opportunity to discuss and ask questions about septic system maintenance and other non-point pollution issues to reduce bacteria, sediment and nutrient loading and other conservation concerns.

These free site walks will be provided for landowners within the Lamprey Watershed in Strafford County, with priority given to landowners abutting the River or its tributaries, through a grant from the Lamprey River Advisory Committee.

By providing the landowners with site specific information for their own property, they will be able to take action to make improvements to reduce inputs of nutrients and other pollutants into the river. They will also receive information on technical assistance programs and funding available to help complete projects improve orprotect watershed. The District Board believes that informed landowners will make the right decisions with respect to conservation management, and will perform proper maintenance and upgrades as needed to their own systems and property. This will enhance the health of the Lamprey River as well as the health and enjoyment of their own property.

The Lee Conservation Commission encourages landowners to take advantage of this free program.

The Strafford County Conservation District is an agency organized in 1946 to provide non-regulatory guidance and technical assistance with planning, design and installation of conservation projects for landowners.


WILKINSON FOOD PANTRY at LEE CHURCH CONGREGATIONAL


The District welcomes sources. assistance to help us navigate this drastic change in funding and reorganization.

PROPOSAL to PURCHASE 5 MAST ROAD

The property located at 5 Mast Road, currently owned by Ed Bannister, is under consideration



to purchase by the Town. This property is located on the southwest side of the Town Hall. The building suffered fire damage in September 2010 and has remained vacant since that time. On May 9, 2011, the Board came to agreement for the purchase price of \$179,000 for the 1.46 acre. If the town takes of ownership property, Mr. Bannister will be responsible for removing the building and assuring that the land is free of environment concerns.

The purchase is contingent upon a vote of approval by the voters of Lee. The Board of Selectmen will petition the Superior Court for an emergency town meeting.

Regarding the purchase of this property, the Town should consider the following:


- 1. The Town Hall septic system is on this property. The Town Center lot is only 1.4 acres, and has four buildings on it.
- 2. Several Town Committees and Commissions are considering a "Welcome to Lee" information center kiosk for the town. Town information, brochures and trail maps would be available at this site.
- 3. Pocket Park. Small pocket parks are popular and common in urban areas. Lee is a rural

- town, but has few places that are open to the public. A quiet lawn space overlooking the bog, and a welcoming entrance to the trail system would be a pleasant addition to Lee.
- 4. Visitor parking would help relieve the congestion in the main town parking lot.
- 5. If the property was put back into commercial or residential use, the Town would lose the opportunity to purchase it.
- 6. Connectivity. In consideration of plans for building the Library/Community Center. the addition of this property would enhance the connectivity to the town properties. Safe pedestrian access to all of the buildings town and town services will become increasingly important when the Library/Community Center opens.

Please watch for more details in Foster's Daily Democrat, <u>leenh.org</u> and special announcements in the E-Crier as the process unfolds and the timelines are put in places. This will include a public hearing, special mailing, SB2 deliberative session in late summer and vote in early fall.

If you have questions, ideas, or opinions about this proposed project, please share them with town officials. There will be public hearings scheduled to hear from Lee citizens as the process moves along, similar to the process followed last summer for the Noble Farm project.
