Initial estimates of the amount of material to be removed, were found to be enormous and the removal of all of the material was not feasible. Working with the site engineers on numerous options, a rip rap sloped design was developed as the most cost effective means of building the road and saving the owner literally tens of thousands of dollars. AIA-NH awarded the project a design excellence award.

Although Milestone won this project on a low-bid basis with the owner, we have since developed this into a long-term relationship with Holderness School and we are soon to start our eighth major project with them.

Renovations to University of New Hampshire, Manchester Manchester, NH

The University of New Hampshire chose Milestone Engineering & Construction, Inc. as construction manager for the renovation and restoration of the University Center, a historic downtown mill in the heart of the canal district of Manchester. The University of New Hampshire swapped buildings and land they owned in the outskirts of Manchester with the City of Manchester for the downtown mill in order to bring the campus to the downtown area.

The mill at 300 Canal Street, previously used as a multi-tenant office building, was renovated and converted into the downtown campus.

Lavallee/Brensinger PA of Manchester, New Hampshire, was the architect for the project. The project presented some unique challenges not only with the mill-type construction, but also with the occupancy and schedule for the project. At the time construction started, the university occupied approximately one-third of the building along with a tenant with an existing lease.

Milestone developed a four-phase construction schedule that allowed us to renovate the building while the university maintained all class schedules and operations.

The schedule was timed to coordinate all phase changes with school shutdowns at Christmas vacation, spring break, and summer vacation. The owner's desire to maintain the exposed mill-type structure also presented numerous challenges, as mechanical, electrical, and telecommunication systems throughout the building were all exposed and needed to be coordinated on a phase by phase basis, not only to work properly, but to also be esthetically acceptable and pleasing.

The project also included the restoration of an existing mill machine shop into the new college library with a mezzanine seating area. Despite the difficult schedule, the project was completed on time and under budget for the owner.

Experience Working with the Community

Milestone has worked with many libraries in the early stages to present their plans to the town residents for funding. We have worked with the building committees of New Boston on the Whipple Library, Epsom, Smyth Library in Candia, Fremont Library, to develop budgets and performing value engineering to assure the voters they are getting the best value, that we include the local workforce, and that we incorporate donated materials and labor.

A good example of this is our work with Epsom Library. We worked with the library over a give year period to develop the plan. Once designed we bid the project to the local builders, and asked them to put their donation in their bid. Through process we were able to hire a Sitework contractor, framing contractor, and well contractor from the town. In addition we accommodated donations for materials, and the painting of the drywall through volunteer labor and worked with the committee so that it could all be accomplished by volunteers without impacting progress, jeopardizing safety, and without increasing a liability to the town.





SCHEDULE A GENERAL PROJECT INFORMATION

Description of Project

STATEMENT OF PROBLEM/NEED: Statistical analysis of motor vehicle crashes occurring on New Hampshire roadways reveals that 'driver inattention/distraction' was the primary contributing factor in approximately 10.83 percent of crashes resulting in incapacitating injuries and 21.8 percent of crashes resulting in non-incapacitating injuries during 2009 - 2012.

Furthermore, the NH Department of Motor Vehicles reports that 21.1 percent of non-fatal crashes are caused by some form of distracting driving.

Although crashes occur at all hours of the day and night, they are most prevalent during the morning and afternoon/evening commute hours when traffic is the heaviest as drivers travel to and from work locations. Instead of focusing their attention on the task of driving and operating their vehicles safely, drivers are frequently distracted by talking on the cell phone, texting, eating, reading, shaving, applying makeup... often in combination with speeding, following too close, and making improper lane changes. The combination of these tasks is a recipe for disaster that leads to crashes and the loss of life, injuries, and property damage. Distracted driving crashes occur on local and state roadways, as well as the interstate/turnpike highways. When a crash occurs, no matter how minor the crash or resulting injuries, it creates a great deal of congestion and can lead to road closures ... all of which impact the impatience and attitude of other drivers.

An aggressive, statewide campaign (Operation Safe Commute) needs to be conducted during the morning and afternoon commute hours (6.00 - 9.00 AM and 4.00 - 7.00 PM) in order to reduce the number of crashes caused by distracted driving.

<u>PROPOSED SOLUTION:</u> "Operation Safe Commute" is an enforcement campaign designed to encourage all motor vehicle operators to focus their attention on the task of driving and operating their vehicles safely. The Lee Police Department will hire, on an off-duty basis, two (2) officers per patrol date to work overtime distracted driving patrols in 3-hour shifts during the morning and/or afternoon commute hours (6.00 - 9.00 AM) and (6.00 - 7.00 PM). "Operation Safe Commute" overtime patrols will be conducted on the following dates:

October 30, 2013 November 27, 2013 December 31, 2013 January 17, 2014 February 14, 2014 March 17, 2014 April 18, 2014 May 23, 2014 June 20, 2014 July 3, 2014 August 29, 2014 September 19, 2014

Adherence to all traffic laws, including the state's occupant protection law, will be monitored and enforced. It is understood that these patrols will be conducted on an overtime basis and officers will be paid at their overtime (1.5) rate for work exceeding their normal 40 hours per week. Part-time officers will be paid at their normal hourly rate.

ANTICIPATED RESULTS: "Operation Safe Commute" patrols will result in an increased number of motorist contacts leading to the issuance of citations and warnings that will contribute to increased public awareness that distracted driving will not be tolerated. In addition, the presence of law enforcement on the roads of the state will lead to a decrease in motor vehicle crashes during the morning and afternoon/evening commute hours which will make for a safer commute for all vehicle operators.

ADDITIONAL PROJECT CONDITIONS: It is agreed that all signed "Overtime Selective Traffic Enforcement Program Report" forms (HS-200) for each patrol, along with a summary "Overtime Reimbursement" form, will be submitted to the Coordinator of the NH Highway Safety Agency by the end of the month following each quarterly period (i.e. January 31st for the quarter ending December 31, April 30th for the quarter ending March 31st, etc.)..

The recipient of these funds is encouraged to provide programs to encourage the use of safety belts by all drivers and passengers in motor vehicles (23 U.S.C. 1200.11 (a)(d)) and to adopt and enforce seat belt use policies for employees operating company-owned, rented, or personally-owned vehicles when performing official business.

CHILD PASSENGER SAFETY LAW

RSA 265:107-a requires that ALL PERSONS under the age of 18 riding in a motor vehicle must be restrained and properly fastened in a safety belt. However, children under the age of 6 years and 55" in height must be restrained and properly secured in an approved child passenger safety seat.

Any driver who violates the provisions of this law shall be guilty of a violation and subject to a fine.

INSTRUCTIONS

Enforcement of the child passenger restraint law is included as a part of ALL overtime selective traffic enforcement projects (including speed enforcement, DWI enforcement, sobriety checkpoints, etc.) funded by the NH Highway Safety Agency. Therefore, whenever a stop is made during any overtime enforcement patrol involving a vehicle driver or passenger who is under the age of 18, a visual check will be made to determine if there is a violation of the child passenger restraint law. The total number of visual checks will be recorded. If a child safety seat, booster seat, or seat belt is not being used properly, the action taken (warning or summons) must be indicated in the appropriate column.

ADDENDUM TO THE APPLICATION FOR HIGHWAY SAFETY PROJECT GRANT

<u>PROJECT REPORTS</u>: It is agreed that quarterly reports will be made to the NH Highway Safety Agency for one year summarizing the progress being made in implementing the project and identifying any problems being encountered. A final report will be made upon completion of the project. Monthly reports will be submitted within 20 days of the project termination date.

PROJECT TERMS: All purchases and expenditures under this project will be subject to audit procedures satisfactory to Federal regulations. It is understood that no monies provided under this project will be used for the replacement of any existing equipment which currently meets Federal Highway Safety Standards. If any existing equipment is sold or traded during the project period, in order to reduce the actual outlay of funds for equipment which is provided under this project, the proceeds will be applied in pro-rated amounts to the Federal and local shares of the costs of the project.

<u>PROCUREMENT AND EQUIPMENT COST</u>: State agencies receiving federal funds for the purchase of equipment are required to process orders through the Division of Plant and Property Management in accordance with state regulations. Items of equipment requiring testing and certification to verify their accuracy (i.e. breath testing devices and traffic control radar) must be selected from the State approved devices.

<u>EQUIPMENT:</u> Equipment acquired under this agreement for use in highway safety program areas shall be used and kept in operation for highway safety purposes by the State; or the State, by formal agreement with appropriate officials of a political subdivision or State agency, shall cause such equipment to be used and kept in operation for highway safety purposes (23 CRF 1200.21).

PROJECT INVENTORY: An inventory of each item of equipment having a useful life of more than two years and a cost of five thousand dollars (\$5,000.00) or more will be provided to the NH Highway Safety Agency during the period in which it is in use. Before such equipment is disposed of, either by trade-in or write-off, authorization will be obtained from the Highway Safety Agency, acting as agent for the National Highway Traffic Safety Administration.

<u>PROJECT CREDIT</u>: All publications, public information or publicity released in conjunction with this project shall state that "this project is being supported in part through a grant from the NH Highway Safety Agency with federal funds provided by the National Highway Traffic Safety Administration, US Department of Transportation", or words to that effect.

<u>AUDIT REPORTS</u>: The grantee agrees to provide the NH Highway Safety Agency with a copy of the audit report including this project which was conducted under provisions of Circular A-133 - Audit of State and Local Governments and Non-Profit Organizations.

Certifications and Assurances

(23 USC 402 (b) (1) (E)); (f) The State shall actively encourage all relevant law enforcement agencies in the State to follow the guidelines established for vehicular pursuits issued by the International Association of Chiefs of Police that are currently in effect. (23 USC 402 (j)). 6) The State will not expend Section 402 funds to carry out a program to purchase, operate, or maintain an automated traffic enforcement system. (23 U.S.C. 402(c)(4).

Other Federal Requirements

(g) All NH Highway Safety Agency employee's time which is charged to federal funds utilize Section 402 funds. All Time and Attendance charges from federal sources come from that single cost objective which brings the State of New Hampshire into compliance with the applicable federal regulation as stated in 2 CFR 225, Appendix B, h(3). The Drug-Free Workplace Act of 1988(41 U.S.C. 8103)

In accordance with the Drug-Free Workplace Act of 1988 (41 U.S.C. 702) and former Governor Judd Gregg's Executive Order No. 89-6, the State will provide a drug-free workplace by: a. Buy America Act

INTRODUCTION

This report has been prepared to document the perambulation of the common Town Line between Barrington and Lee, New Hampshire. The perambulation was performed on September 21, 2012 by Marcia Gasses. Town Planner and Land Use Administrator and Peter Cook, Road Agent for the Town of Barrington and by Caren Rossi, Planning/Zoning and Health Administrator and Robert Moynihan (Licensed Land Surveyor) for the Town of Lee.

The route followed was from North to South (see Overview Maps on pages 8-10). Photos were taken and GPS (Global Positioning System) coordinates (WGS 84 Datum) obtained for each town bound found. A "Recreation-grade" GPS (Garmin GPS II Plus) receiver was used, with an accuracy in the 10 to 20 foot range. The coordinates given in the report are Latitude and Longitude based on the WGS 84 Datum.

(Note that one arc second of Latitude is approximately 100 ft. on the ground and one arc second of Longitude is approximately 75 ft. – at this latitude)

The perambulation description used is a copy of those used earlier by the towns with the addition of bound designation numbers, updated road names, Latitude and Longitude, and any missing or modified bounds. The distances and directions used in the earlier perambulations were not changed.






OVERVIEW MAP OF TOWN LINE AND BOUND DESIGNATIONS

SETTING BARRINGTON - LEE TOWN BOUND BL1 @ NH Route 125 JULY 23, 2013















DATE: September 26, 1992

At 9:00 a.m. Saturday, September 26, 1992 Selectman Grumbling joined a Committee from the Town of Barrington to visit each of five town bounds on the Lee-Barrington line.

The Barrington Volunteer Committee was made up of:

Ron Landry - Barrington Road Agent Charles Karcher - Norway Plains Survey Assoc. Joe Runnals - Norway Plains Assoc.

The Town of Barrington is the Senior town and has the responsibility to notify Lee of the once in seven year requirement to perambulate the town bounds. They will respond to the Secretary of State.

We visited the five bounds on the Lee-Barrington line and chiseled on each the year 1992 then painted the "B", "L", "M" and the 1992 with yellow paint. Each bound has a drill hole and all are granite rock set in 1898/1899.

The bounds were as follows:

- Lee-Nottingham-Barrington bound off Steppingstones Road West just North of its intersection with Mitchell Road and North of the Lee property of John LaCourse.
- Lee-Barrington bound on line at the intersection of Steppingstones Road West and the Barrington town road of Crummet Hill Road. The bound is in the triangular center formed by the roads and located at the Northwest angle.
- Lee-Barrington bound on line located on the South side of Route 4 on property of Alan Binnie, said bound being about 2400 feet West of the Lee traffic circle.
- 4. Lee-Barrington bound on line on the Class VI section of Pinkham Road West. The bound is in the remains of a rock wall about five feet off the dirt road and some thirty feet from the enclosed side porch




