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Present: Deb Lievens, Gene Harrington, Ben LaBrecque, and M. Speltz

to grow in the stormwater wetland areas.

D. Lievens called the meeting to order at 7:30 PM. She appointed M. Speltz to vote for Truda Bloom.

Shoppes at Londonderry, 15-51 & 59- Brad Mezquita of Appledore Engineering returned with Luke Hurley of Gove Environmental Engineering to present a clarified version of the plan shown at the July 12 meeting. The updated exhibit differentiated more clearly between temporary and permanent buffer disturbances, showing a total of 5,700 square feet of permanent and 43,500 sf of temporary impacts along the length of the buffer. Grading for the berms of the proposed stormwater ponds is the reason for the temporary impacts while paving will cause the permanent intrusion. B. Mezquita noted that the 50,850 sf of stormwater wetland areas, all of which are outside of the buffer, is greater than the combined total of the temporary and permanent buffer impacts. M. Speltz argued that temporary impacts are not temporary in the sense that they are permanently changing the topography of the buffer. He also confirmed that no woody vegetation with significant root systems would be permitted

M. Speltz asked if the functional values being lost in the existing wetland because of the disturbance to the buffer is equal to or less than the functional values of the created wetlands. L. Hurley stated it would be equal because of the man made detention and infiltration capabilities. That aside, Commissioners expressed concern over the spirit of the Conservation Overlay District ordinance being violated by a project proposing disturbance along the entire length of the buffer (as opposed to a more perpendicular impact). M. Speltz stated that the intent of the ordinance is to avoid the buffer whereas this proposal consumes it. It was suggested that the buildings be manipulated in such a way as to remove the impact, although B. Mezquita stated it would not be cost effective for the project to reduce the size of the buildings and/or parking. Creating two-story structures would not be feasible, he said, in terms of engineering or attracting tenants. M. Speltz noted the criteria in the Conditional Use Permit application, which states that financial consideration cannot be the sole justification for buffer impacts. He suggested to B. Mezquita that he thoroughly read the COD ordinance, along with the criteria for the CUP and try to establish some other justification for the degree of impact. The representatives will return to the August 9 meeting with their CUP request.

Regarding the Dredge and Fill application for 9,990 sf of wetland impacts, **G. Harrington made a** motion to authorize the Chair to send a letter to the Wetlands Bureau stating that the LCC has no objections to the D+F application. M. Speltz seconded. The motion was approved, 4-0-0.

Concerns expressed in the Design Review Committee comments were also revisited. The day lilies originally proposed for the rain garden have been replaced with a variety of more appropriate native plantings. In addition, the pear tree species chosen for the site is a hardy variety, something D. Lievens had asked L. Hurley to confirm.



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Merrill easement- At the June 6 Town Council meeting, this proposed easement on map and lot 17-10 was presented for their approval. It was continued again to the August 8 meeting, before which the Open Space Task Force's report was expected to be available. The report, which supports the purchase, will be presented to the Council in August. In order to give the Council enough time to consider the report before voting on the acquisition, M. Speltz suggested recommending to the Town Manager to postpone again until September. He asked D. Lievens to see if the Merrills are amenable to waiting until then. In the meantime, the Open Space Task Force had authorized a letter be written by the Chair to the Council, recommending the easement purchase as it is part of the Open Space Plan.

<u>ARM grant</u>- The final step in this project is to record the easement, of which the Department of Environmental Services will be the executory interest holder. Once DES signs the easement document, it can be recorded with the Registry of Deeds.

<u>Sunnycrest Phase I</u>- In assigning this easement over to the Rockingham County Conservation District, a baseline report will be needed. D. Lievens will contact both RCCD and Chris Kane to obtain quotes.

 Ingersoll- D. Lievens entertained a motion to authorize the Chair to expend an amount not to exceed \$600 from the line item budget to hire the Rockingham County Conservation District to perform the annual monitoring duties of the Ingersoll easement. G. Harrington so moved. M. Speltz seconded. The motion was approved, 4-0-0. M. Speltz stated they might find some issues of intrusion onto the easement and the destruction of stonewalls, something which the Society for the Protection of New Hampshire Forests and, if necessary, the Londonderry Police Department will be working to resolve.

July 12, 2011 minutes- M. Speltz made a motion to approve the minutes of the July 12, 2011 public session as written. B. LaBrecque seconded. The motion was approved, 4-0-0.

G. Harrington made a motion to approve the minutes of the July 12, 2011 non-public session as drafted. M. Speltz seconded. The motion was approved, 4-0-0.


<u>DES grant</u>- The Department of Environmental Services recently made a request for proposals from towns affected by the widening of I-93 for a 25% matching grant (see attached). Three million dollars was to be awarded over a six-year period, but now DES will be awarding all the grant monies in 2011. This means that they will be looking for \$12 million worth of projects from these towns, which includes a large portion of Londonderry. Before the timetable changed, it was thought that since the towns in which the Massabesic watershed lies would have priority, applying for a grant would not be a worthwhile effort. Since \$12 million worth of projects will expand the scope beyond the Massabesic watershed, M. Speltz urged the LCC to find a project and submit an application. September 1 is the deadline for the eligibility application. Later in the evening, a non-public session was held to discuss possibilities.
