Chairman Farrell also held a moment of silence for the family of the victim who passed away in a fire earlier this day.

18 19	Chairman Farrell opened up the floor to the public for public comment. There was no public comment.

Smith stated that back in September we opened up the Assistant Town Manager position and received over sixty applicants for that position. After a vigorous process, Smith introduced Lisa Drabik who will be the new Assistant Town Manager. Drabik introduced herself to the Council.
26 27	Chairman Farrell introduced members of CART to present to the Council. Martin Srugis, 17 Wimbledon Dr, stated that he has three people present from CART this evening.
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 29 30 31 32 33 34 35 36 37 38 39 40 	Scott Bogl, Senior Transportation Planner for the Rockingham Planning Commission, stated that he is the VP if the CART Board. Right now the board is doing a search for a new Executive Director. All of CARTS services are contracted through Easter Seals. Bogl stated that CART is a public transit agency established under State law, governed by a Board of Directors. Londonderry has two official Town representatives on the Board, Art Rugg and Nancy Michaels. SNHPC representative on the CART Board is Martin Srugis who is also a Londonderry resident. Bogl stated that CART is available five days a week curb to curb service rom 8 AM to 5 PM. Bogl presented CART facts and information to the Town Council and touched on a few concerns he has heard from the seniors in Londonderry. Bogl stated that you can schedule a CART trip up to two weeks in advance. Bogl stated that they would like riders to schedule their rides in advance. Bogl stated that they do about 2600 trips in 2016. It is up about 10% from FY 2015. Smith asked how many unique riders are using CART.
41	Fred Roberge, Vice President of Special Transit Services for Easter Seals stated that they have a

42 43 44 45 46 47 48	passenger history for Londonderry of 275 different individuals that have used CART since the beginning. Roberge stated that probably in the neighborhood of forty to fifty people use the service on a regular basis. Chairman Farrell stated that as Londonderry continues to grow with fifty-five and older and taking care of the needs of our seniors, the Council has recently discussed the options to enhance the services of the Town such as eliminating CART and doing a service ourselves through the Town. It was talked about supplementing CART. There have been a number of different ideas thrown out there.

Green stated that all the information should be consistent. Green stated that he doesn't feel that we are ready to jump into our own service for the Town yet. Green stated that there are still additional needs though. Green asked if CART still does the taxi voucher services. Green stated that he talked with Green Cab and they have dropped that program. Councilor Green asked if it would be fair to say that the service CART provides right now to the Town of Londonderry is worth one hundred thousand dollars. Bogl stated that yes he think they do offer that kind of service.

The area this is in near the Auburn Rd Superfund Site, the water there had been extended back in the 1990's but it was not extended to this portion at the time.

Cocci stated that she has about thirty registered voters' signatures. Smith stated that the cost to do it would be \$230,000. That number is from Manchester Water Works. Cocci stated that this issue had been brought up in the past.

Dear Councilor Joe Green:

I recently read of your efforts to get help for senior transportation. needs.

With CART providing such poor service I believe our own service would be welcome.

It was noted at the last meeting that various hospitals and others already provide this service. I called several of these providers and the following are results.

Catholic Medical does provide this service but only for the towns of Bedford, Goffstown, Hooksett and Manchester.

Elliot Hospital used to provide this service but no longer provides this service.

Parkland doesn't provide this service and recommended calling CART.

Easter Seals may or may not, but no one answered the phone and my call was never returned.

Care Givers provides this service, but my name would have to go on a waiting list. They don't have enough volunteers to provide this service to meet the needs.

Green cab is about \$30.00 round trip to Parkland.

Recently I was at Mass general Hospital in Boston, and noticed a car with a sticker Atkinson N.H. Senior Transportation. I talked to the driver and asked about the service he was providing. He stated that Atkinson provided this service for seniors at no charge, no tips to residents for doctors' visits. This is an amazing service for such a small town.

It was also noted that there weren't many seniors at the meeting to support this program. I believe the reason there weren't many at the council meeting was the meetings are held in the evening. Many seniors don't drive at night and in general don't go out in the evening. Or they may depend on others for a ride.

I am 80 years old and very seldom go out in the evening.

As a final note seniors pay a portion of the taxes in town. And generally use fewer services than younger families with school children, sports, recreation requirements and other services not used by seniors.

I am not suggesting any reductions in other services, as they are what make our town such a desirable place to live. But I would support additional portion of the taxes for this senior activity.
