NOW THEREFORE BE IT ORDAINED by the Town Council of the Town of Londonderry that the Municipal Code of the Town of Londonderry, Title I—General Code, Chapter XXIX (newly created chapter) Dogs, Title IV – Public Health, Safety and Welfare, Chapter VIII – Animal Control, is hereby amended as attached (Attached please find the current Ordinance, Title IV, Chapter VIII- Animal Control, #1; the original proposed Ordinance, 2016-02, #2 & the current proposed amendment to Title IV, Chapter VIII, #3.)

CHAPTER VIII - ANIMAL CONTROL

SECTION I DEFINITIONS

- A. "Dog" shall mean both male and female, altered or not.
- B. "Owner" shall mean any person owning, keeping, harboring, or assuming the care of a dog.
- C. "Running at Large" shall mean off the premises of owner or keeper and not under the control of the owner or a responsible person.

SECTION II LICENSING AND REGISTRATION

- A. All dogs kept, harbored or maintained by their owners in the Town shall be licensed and registered as specified in RSA 466 and as it may be amended, of the State of New Hampshire
- B. Any person found to be keeping, harboring or maintaining an unlicensed dog shall be required to license the dog at the office of the Town Clerk within ten (10) days of notice and at the time of registration, pay to the Town an additional fee of ten dollars (\$10).
- C. Failure to register the dog and pay the fee shall require the person to be summonsed to court for the violation of RSA 466 and to receive the punishment thereof.

SECTION III RUNNING AT LARGE

- A. The Town Council shall provide for the rigid enforcement of RSA 466 and take such steps as they may deem necessary to ensure compliance with its provisions by residents of the Town.
- B. In accordance with the provisions of RSA 466:30-A, it shall be unlawful for an owner of any dog licensed or unlicensed to permit the dog to run at large, except when accompanied by the owner or custodian and when used for hunting, herding, supervised competition and exhibition or training for such.

CHAPTER VIII - ANIMAL CONTROL (Cont'd)

SECTION IV IMPOUNDING

A. It shall be the duty of the Animal Control Officer to apprehend any dog found running at large without a collar and valid license tag. Any injury or death of the animal caused in the effort of its apprehension shall be the responsibility of the owner and no liability shall be found with the Animal Control Officer or his assistants.

SECTION V METHOD OF CONFINEMENT

A. The Town Council, with the assistance and cooperation of the Animal Control Officer, shall select a suitable place of confinement for impounded dogs. Suitable shall include good food and care.

SECTION VI NOTICE TO OWNERS, REDEMPTION

- A. If the dog has upon it the name or address of the owner or such name or address is otherwise known or obtainable, then the Police Department or the Animal Control Officer shall notify the owner within twenty four (24) hours after seizure of the dog.
- B. Notice of impoundment shall be in writing by registered mail, postage prepaid, and shall be construed as having been given at the time of posting thereof.
- C. If the dog impounded does not have the name or address of the owner, and if the owner is not otherwise known, then no notice shall be necessary.
- D. The owner of any dog so impounded may reclaim the dog upon payment of the sum of ten dollars (\$10) for the first twenty four hour (24 hr) period or any part thereof that the dog is held and three dollars (\$3) for each twenty four hour (24 hr) period or any part thereof that the dog is held thereafter; provided, however, that before release to any person, if the dog is not licensed, a license as required by the Town shall be secured.

SECTION VII FEES

A. The sum collected pursuant to the provisions of the Ordinance shall be accounted for and paid over to the Londonderry Town Clerk.

CHAPTER VIII - ANIMAL CONTROL (Cont'd)

SECTION VIII DISPOSITION OF UNCLAIMED DOGS

- A. Any properly collared and tagged dog which has been impounded and has not been redeemed by the owner shall be turned over to the nearest Animal Rescue League provided that any such dog shall be held for at least ten (10) days after impounding.
- B. In those cases where it is required that notice be given the owner, the ten (10) days shall commence from the date the owner is notified.
- C. In the event the Animal Rescue League is unwilling or unable to accept custody of the dog, the dog shall be disposed of as directed by the Town Council
- D. Any uncollared, untagged dog whose owner cannot be identified shall be held for a minimum of ten (10) days and after such time, if the owner cannot be determined, the dog shall be disposed of in the manner prescribed by the Town Council.

SECTION IX DOG OFFICER APPOINTED

- A. The Town Manager shall appoint an Animal Control Officer and shall determine the amount of his pay.
- B. The Officer shall be selected from candidates having knowledge of animals and their care.
- C. It shall be the duty of the Animal Control Officer to enforce the provisions of his Ordinance and perform such other duties in respect thereto as the Town Council shall determine.
- D. The Animal Control Officer shall be appointed as a Special Patrolman.

SECTION X PENALTY

A. Any person found violating any of the provisions of this Ordinance shall be found guilty of a misdemeanor and upon conviction thereof, shall be punished by a fine of not less than ten dollars (\$10) nor more than twenty dollars (\$20) for such offense.

CHAPTER VIII - ANIMAL CONTROL

SECTION I DEFINITIONS

- A. "Dog" shall mean both male and female, altered or not.
- B. "Owner" shall mean any person owning, keeping, harboring, or assuming the care of a dog.
- C. "Running at Large" shall mean off the premises of owner or keeper and not under the control of the owner or a responsible person. is defined as a dog in, on, or being walked upon, a public street, park, parkway, cemetery, town forest, trailway or other public place in the Town of Londonderry, or in a public street, sidewalk or right-of-way adjacent to a public place and is not secured by a leash or chain or within a carrier which is in the possession of a person of sufficient strength and age to effectively restrain the dog or under the direct control of its handler by means of personal presence and attention as will reasonably control the conduct of such dog.
- D. Notwithstanding anything in this section to the contrary, no person shall be compelled to keep any dog in his possession on a leash while in or upon any public street, alley, park, parkway, cemetery, town forest, trail-way or other public place in the Town of Londonderry, if the dog is securely confined in an vehicle or is under the direct control of its handler. Evidence that the dog accosted, jumped on or otherwise bothered a person not its owner or handler shall be evidence that the dog was not under the direct control of its owner.
- E. "Service dog" is a type of assistance dog specifically trained to help people who have disabilities, such as visual impairment, hearing impairments, mental illnesses (such as but not limited to posttraumatic stress disorder (PTSD)), seizure disorders, mobility impairment, and diabetes.
- F. However in no case shall any dog be un-leashed on the Londonderry Rail-Trial or on the Londonderry Town Common, included the forested area adjacent to the Town Common and commonly referred to as the Town Forrest.

SECTION II LICENSING AND REGISTRATION

A. All dogs kept, harbored or maintained by their owners in the Town shall be licensed and registered as specified in RSA 466 and as it may be amended, of the

- B. Any person found to be keeping, harboring or maintaining an unlicensed dog shall be required to license the dog at the office of the Town Clerk within ten (10) days of notice and at the time of registration, pay to the Town an additional fee of ten dollars (\$10).
- C. Failure to register the dog and pay the fee shall require the person to be summonsed to court for the violation of RSA 466 and to receive the punishment thereof.

SECTION III RUNNING AT LARGE

- A. The Town Council shall provide for the rigid enforcement of RSA 466 and take such steps as they may deem necessary to ensure compliance with its provisions by residents of the Town.
- B. In accordance with the provisions of RSA 466:30-A, it shall be unlawful for an owner of any dog licensed or unlicensed to permit the dog to run at large, except when accompanied by the owner or custodian and/or when used for hunting, herding, supervised competition and exhibition or training for such.
- C. With the exception of service dogs, no dogs shall be permitted within the confines of any cemetery owned and managed by the Town of Londonderry.

SECTION IV DOG FOULING PROHIBITION

It shall be unlawful for any person owning, possessing, or controlling a dog on street, park, parkway, cemetery, town forest, trail-way or other public place in the Town of Londonderry, any public street, sidewalk or right-of-way adjacent to a public place, or on any private property neither owned nor occupied by said person to:

i. Fail to remove and dispose of any feces left by the dog in or on such public or private property.

SECTION V NOISE REGULATION

It shall be unlawful to keep any animal, including a bird, in a manner that causes frequent or long continued noise that disturbs the comfort or repose of any person in the vicinity. dog that barks for sustained periods of time, or during the night so as to disturb the peace and quiet of the neighborhood or area

SECTION VI ENFORCEMENT

The Londonderry Animal Control Officer and/or the Londonderry Police Department may seize, impound or restrain any dog in violation of this chapter, running at large and deliver said dog to an authorized boarding shelter for dogs. Such dogs shall be handled as strays or abandoned dogs pursuant to applicable laws.

SECTION VII IMPOUNDING

It shall be the duty of the Animal Control Officer to apprehend any dog found running at large, as defined or running at large without a collar and valid license tag. Any injury or death of the animal caused in the effort of its apprehension shall be the responsibility of the owner and no liability shall be found with the Animal Control Officer or his assistants. The Animal Control Officer shall have the responsibility to investigate violations of Section IV and Section V of this Chapter and take action consistent with this Chapter.

SECTION XIII - VIOLATION AND PENALTIES

In addition to impounding a dog found at large or in violation of this chapter, the Londonderry Animal Control officer and/or Londonderry Police Department may issue in the name of the owner, possessor, controller, or keeper of such dog a notice of violation. Such notice shall impose upon the owner, possessor, controller, or keeper of such a dog a forfeiture of Twenty-Five Dollars (\$25.00) which must be paid to the Londonderry Town Clerk within 96 hours of the date and time notice is given, in full satisfaction of the assessed penalty. In the event that such penalty is not paid to the Londonderry Town Clerk within the time limitation specified, a summons shall be issued for appearance in Derry District Court, and any person found guilty of violating the provisions of this section shall be guilty of a violation.

Chapter XXIV ENERGY SYSTEMS EXEMPTION POLICY

SECTION I PURPOSE

A. To adopt the provisions of RSA 72:61-68 and establish qualifications for the exemption for Energy Systems for Solar and Wind-Powered Systems.

SECTION II QUALIFICATIONS and DEFINITIONS

A. The energy exemption from property tax in the Town of Londonderry shall apply to any person who meets the requirement of either RSA 72:61, Solar Energy Systems; or RSA 72:65, Wind-Powered Systems on a yearly basis in an amount to be chosen by the Town.

SECTION III BENEFITS

- A. The exemption from property tax in the Town of Londonderry, based on assessed value, for qualified taxpayers shall be based upon the value of the entire energy system meeting the requirements of state statutes. *up to a value of \$5,000.00*
- B. The exemption under this section shall apply only in taxable years during which the exemption is claimed on April 1 in any given year.

43 44 45	Chairman Farrell introduced Ordinance #2016-02, an amendment to the Municipal Code, Title I, Chapter XXIX, Dogs. Chie Hart presented. Chairman Farrell stated that there is a leash law in place today. Town Manager Smith stated that in the

packets there are three sections. Chairman Farrell stated that the Town has not had a full-time animal control officer for many years. Chief Hart confirmed that is has been five years since the Town had a full-time animal control. Chief Hart stated that a few weeks back an Ordinance was proposed in preparing for the Public Hearing. The Town Manager, assisted by Steve Cotton, came to terms that there is already an Ordinance regarding dogs running at large in town. Chief Hart stated that they took a look at the current Ordinance, which was revised in 1998. [See attached for both original and amended Ordinance]. Chief Hart stated that in regards to dog violence, the part-time Dog Officer, Mike Bennett, has responded to about thirty bites a year. Councilor Green asked Chief Hart in regards to the penalty, it states that any person found violating the provisions of the Ordinance shall be found guilty or a misdemeanor. Councilor Green asked what the though process was in terms of removing that from the Ordinance. Chief Hart stated that the statute contemplates that it is a violation. A violation is a specific type of designation. In New Hampshire we designate two types of crimes, felonies, which are typically demarked by the level of punishment for it. This is for more than one year in prison. Misdemeanors, which are punishable by up to a year in jail, we have a third designation which is technically not a crime, that is a violations. Chief Hart stated that what the Town usually deals with are violations. A violation is still treated if it was a criminal offense. The same rights would accrue to you as a charged defendant as it would accrue in a misdemeanor or a felony.

Chairman Farrell stated that most of the e-mails that the Council have received are about dogs doing their business where they shouldn't be doing their business. It doesn't seem to be an issue if they have their dog under voice control and off the leash.

Beulah Himes, 23 King Henry Drive, stated that she has been a resident for twenty-three years and a long term dog owner. Himes stated that there is a contradiction in the running at large from section 1C to section 3. Himes stated that personally she uses all the trails in town and they are awesome. She is able to control her dog and let her off the leash when no one is around. When people come around she leashes her dog. Himes stated that she has never run into a problem with people having their dogs off leash. Himes stated that prohibiting dogs off a leash all together is prohibiting any training away from your home for your dog. Himes stated that it prohibits hunters who have hunter dogs.

Lisa Jennings, 28 Woodbine Drive, stated that she has a fear of dogs. Jennings stated that they have lived in Town for nine years. On their street there are many dogs. Jennings stated that the dogs on her street chase after her and venture into her yard and on her porch. Jennings stated that on athletic field's dogs go free as well. Jennings stated that she doesn't want to live in fear of dogs.

Councilor Green stated to Chief Hart that he is concerned about changing the wording. Councilor Green stated that he is at the athletic fields a lot and stated it is a growing problem.

The Council and members of the public discussed the leash aspect of dogs and whether a dog should be on a leash or not when off of your own property.

Councilor Dolan left the meeting at 1:03:43.

Kathy Wagner, 7 Fiddlers Ridge Rd, stated that she is a former Town Councilor who voted on and Ordinance to not allow dogs on the ballfield. Wagner stated that the ballfields are covered ibn today's Ordinance. Wagner stated that the schools have banned dogs at all games.

Sue and John, 21 Windsor Blvd, stated that they have lived in town for a long time and they have a dog. Sue stated that they take him for walks but they are very respectful of other people because they know not everyone loves dogs. Sue stated that they let their dog run at Continental. John stated that the Town should not get a dog park. It is not socially good for dogs.

Chairman Farrell stated that they are trying to find a solution that works for everyone. The Council has received complaints about people not using leashes or picking up after their dogs. Chairman Farrell stated that the Council is not looking to stop people from what they are doing, they are trying to find an equal median.


