Chairman Farrell stated that it is true that the clergy donate to the committee
and participate in the event. They used to receive \$10,000 from the town; they
now receive \$6,500. The money is primarily for fireworks, which cost \$7,000 this
year.

Attorney Ramsdell claimed that there is no separation issue, using the analogy of municipalities providing bus service for Catholic school students. There is no separation issue because this serves the common good and is not primarily about religion.

Londonderry Police Chief Bill Hart introduced two new Police Department hires: Officer Michael Tufo from the Mill ord police department and Officer Ryan Bukor, a resident of Londonderry from the Goffstown police department.

Town Manager Kevin Smith requested the confirmation of Catherine Blash as the Senior Affairs Director. She comes with years of experience with the elderly citizens of Atkinson, and she has also worked with Rockingham Meals on Wheels. Ms. Blash was confirmed unanimously.

Chairman Farrell commented on the possibility of changing the date of the Deliberative Session currently scheduled for February 3, 2014 at 7:00 PM. Town Manager Shirth stated that by law the session must be held between February 2, 2014 and February 8, 2014. The School's Deliberative Session will be held on February 7, 2014. It was decided that more research needs to be done, including a check of the sports. The dules.

Mr. Reed Clark commented that having sessions twice in one week is problem.
He welcomed Kevin Clark as the new Town Manager.

Two representatives of the NH Theater Group, Joel Mercier of 27 Thorndike
Street in Concord and Wallace Pineault of 85 Belmont Street in Manchester. Mr.
Mercier explained that this is a professional equity theater group pursuing the
possibility of making Londonderry its home. NH Theater Factory has three

branches: commercial season shows, an education program, and new work
development. Councilor Dolan asked if they had made this presentation to the
school board. Mr. Mercier stated that they have not, but that they had made on
for the Arts Council. Councilor Green asked about size requirements for the
facility. Mr. Mercier said it would be 7,000 to 10,000 square feet. Councilor
Green also suggested that the theater group contact Tupelo Music Hall and the
cable television department.

Councilor Dolan introduced Mr.Stuart Arnett to make a presentation on behalf of the Conservation Commission regarding the Outdoor Recreation Guide/Management Plan. Mr. Arnett explained that they would use a phase approach and provide regular updates. They have a proactive stewardship plan for open space.

Chairman Farrell commented on the Capital Improvement Plan (SIP) Committee, saying that it acts in an advisory capacity **only** to the Planning Board regarding projects for such facilities as the Central Fire Stanon and the Senior Center (\$732,000). He stated that only the Young Council has authority to issue bonds and has had little appetite for bond in recent times.

Councilor Dolan mentioned a Boston Clobe article about civil discourse which stated that incivility increasing in local overnment arenas. Councilor Dolan stated that he is pleased that landonderry maintains civil discourse at he<u>aring</u>

On motion Councilor Down, duly seconded by Councilor Green, it was voted to go into publishearing. The vote was 4-0.

Order #2013-23 – Licensing of Junkyard Pursuant to RSA 236 – Licensing of Murray's Auto Recycling owned by Edward Dudek.

Mr. Richard Canuel, Building Inspector and Code Enforce Officer, stated that we are beyond the renewal date for this Junkyard License. Negotiations have not been successful. Mr. Canuel has discussed this issue with Matt Serge, Esq., who claims that there are three options in this situation: renew the license as it is, deny the license outright, or renew the license as amended to address the lack of fencing in front of office trailer. Mr. Canuel supports the third option. He

suggests that the requirements be clarified so that Mr. Dudek has specific guidance as to his responsibilities and he (Mr. Canuel) has distinct criteria for enforcement. This should not be left with arguable interpretation. There are two conditions to be addressed: stacking of vehicles above the fence and clarification of hours of operation. Councilor Dolan expressed concern about the court case stipulations. Police Chief Hart stated that the parties can agree to change stipulations, and the Town is one of those parties. This is an annual licensing function only. The license can be issued and private parties can work out their differences. Councilor Dolan stated that we don't use the licensing to enforcement the court agreement. He is concerned about making decisions which are illegal. Mr. Canuel summarized that the rensing and the court agreement are separate issues.

Chairman Farrell stated that he would meet with all parties and resolve the issue this evening.

Attorney Ramsdell stated that would be happy to take a look at the license and the agreement.

Jonathan Boutin, Esq. of Cambridge, MA stated that he has an office in Londonderry and represent, the Mr. and Mrs. Adams. He stated that he had prepared the court orders, including the signed agreement between the parties and the 2008 through 2012 livense applications and conditions.

Chairman Farrell sald that he would summarize the situation and try to have an agreement. He suggested that everybody gives a little. Maybe the junkyard could be more aesthetically pleasing. He mentioned that if there is bad faith negotiating, no loody can make the ball.

Attorney Boutin state. The wanted the Council to hear a few misperceptions from the evening. The wrst is that Mr. and Mrs. Adams are trying to close the facility or have the license denied. This is not the case. There is a history of noncompliance with the court order and the license conditions. In 2003 the agreement was made part of the licensing conditions; they are not separate things. The idea that Mr. and Mrs. Adams did not show up is also not true. All they are seeking is that the conditions imposed before remain in place – that the stacking of the cars be moved below the fencing level and the hours of operation be 8-5. There is the issue of fencing which code enforcement seems to have

dropped. They would accept Mr. Dudek's offer to change the siding. 154 155 Chairman Farrell called for a ten minute recess to allow for discussion between 156 157 the attorneys. 158 159 **New Business** 160 161 Vice Chairman Dolan stated that the Council would cominue with New Business. 162 He called on Chief Hart to present Resolution #2012 T-To adopt RSA 162-K 163 giving the Town the local option to establish a Marrinal Economic Development 164 and Revitalization District and Resolution #2013-12 - N. Plan - Airport Area. 165 Chief Hart stated that in July there was a presentation re: possibility of 166 establishing a tax increment finance district located in the north of town 167 surrounding the Airport. To keep the discussion going forward he is bringing to 168 the Council what those things might look like. These resolutions are not 169 technically first readings for action today. They are discussion points hopefully to 170 be brought forward later in September 3 a formal list reading. There are two 171 pieces: the tax increment financing district a legislatively-created legal construct 172 which allows for changes in how property taxes collected by the town are 173 allocated. The Town must first adopt the legislation. Then the district is created 174 and guidelines articulated, delineating what portion of the collected taxes will be 175 apportioned to whatever bond may come from that, and what specific needs of 176 the Town pught be met, such as transportation. It would mostly be for the 177 Pettened Road project but not limited to that. Neither of these actions would 178 bind the lown. He stressed that the legislation must be adopted and the 179 guidelines exhibitshed prior to the beginning of a development project. 180 181 Attorney Ramsdell tated that there is a common misconception about TIF 182 districts in that adoptine enabling legislation automatically creates a bond. 183 That is not true. Only the voters can vote for a bond. 184 185 In response to a question, Chief Hart stated that the TIF is not for developers – it is 186 the town. Responding to another concern, Chief Hart stated that establishing a TIF 187 project in one area does not require doing it in another. It does not open the 188 floodgates. He stated that the Town can avoid litigation by going step by step. 189 190 Attorney Ramsdell added that there is a limitation in terms of acreage and the 191

percentage of assessed value that may be part of a created TIF district. 192 193 194 Vice Chairman Dolan stated that this is only casual discussion. There will be a first reading in the future and them a public hearing. The councilors will also be 195 meeting with the County Commissioners and school board members. 196 197 Chairman Farrell stated that the Town Manager will approach the superintendent 198 because he had questions about the change in size of the TIF. 199 200 Resolution #2013-13 – Walking Trail Easement. Chief Fart stated that this is a first 201 reading and the Council can either waive a second reading or put it an on the 202 agenda for a public hearing on September 9th. Trelease from public servitude 203 the walking trail located in the Nevins Community. Removing the mandate 204 on the land has the agreement of all parties. Attorney Ramson L stated that even 205 though a public hearing is not required it would be good to have one. It was voted 206 to waive first reading. 207 208 Chairman Farrell stated that this would be the second reading. We paid a 209 significant amount of money for an open space lot next to this property. We 210 should go back and look at what was remonstrated to the voters; the adjacent 211 property was to have certain things. We should get that information for public 212 hearing. 213 214 Mr. Phil Marine of 41 Monagen Drive, a Nevins director, stated that they had had 215 three meetings regarding this sue, and 100% of the residents did not want the 216 walking trail. 217 218 Chairman Farre stated that by special election spent over \$2 million to buy some 219 adjacent land. Die we put any conditions that certain things were going to 220 happen? 221 222 Councilor Butler stated that he knows of the concern that the trail is too close to 223 the homes. He is concerned to make sure this doesn't happen again. 224

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Ms. Ann Chabot, 28 Woodford Rd, asked if there would be any difference in taxes

on the property if that is removed. This was referred to Town Manager Smith who

Other Business

Chairman Farrell asked to take up the Impact fee review and status. Attorney Ramsdell stated that last July the Council filed a bill of interpleader action with the Rocking hap count. Superior Court attendiscovering issues with the impact fee program administration. The court ordered an audit of the collection and expenditures of impact leas. That took a lot of time because it covered an 18-year period. The audit report is on the lown website. Most of the matters have been resolved. There is a group of parties who have expressed similar concerns and interests. Their attorney has a copy of the audit report. The parties will sit down between September 3rd and September 13th to resolve last issues. State of art amendments have been drafted for the impact fee ordinances. Attorney Ramsdell reviewed the ordinances of several communities to aid in the revision process.

Chief Hart has included the proposed impact fee ordinance drafted by Counselor Ramsdell, not as part of the agenda, but for information.

Chairman Farrell stated that this issue is in the Traffic Safety Committee. It's taped off where they want to put the parking lot.

Councilor Dolan stated that the issue of a parking area did come up. The problem is that when the parking lot is full, people spill into the treets and onto people's lawns. It was quite an emotional issue for some of the folks because they don't feel safe or that their kids can play there. It seems to fit the definition of loitering.

Chairman Farrell stated three or four years ago we remove the trails from that neighborhood because they weren't comfortable with people walking through there, yet the developer donated the land, connect the Musquash. And this is in their deeds.

Chief Hart stated that his department would do a special intention in that area in the next few days.

Councilor Butler raised the issue of the Hardy/Stonehooge traffic sign. They paved their road and lined to They have put out the STOP signs and some language on the roadway-about yielding to TOP signs.

Councilor Green stated that he went to the Library Trustees meeting and got a glimpse of the budget. Hopefully we will have a smooth effort like we did last year. They usually did give some nuney back, as they did last year.

Chairman Farrell streed Town Manager: \$732,000 for Senior Center. If it's okay with everyone, let's laure out if we can get write any grants. That is a lot of money and it was unexpected. He suggested that the Public Works Director and Fire Chief get together with Steve Cotton. The timbers of the roof under discussion are charred and we have to shovel it. Maybe we can figure out if there is something we can do with what we have before we have to get three quarters of a million dollars. At the CIP meeting they said we can't fix the roof till we add on to the building.

Town Manager Smith yielded to the former town manager, Chief Hart, who

passed down the Sewer rent levy which is the quarterly authorization which requires Council signatures, so that the Town Clerk/Tax Collector can levy and collect the fees. Secondly, I did include the proposed impact fee ordinance. The intention is for the staff to place that on the Planning Board agenda. He raised the issue of what to do with the position of Town Clerk/Tax Collector. Currently it is a unified Town Clerk/Tax Collector. The total allocation of funds to that position is approximately \$130,000 compensation and benefits included. Last year it was one of the goals of the Council to look for savings. As currently constructed the position is relatively new to Londonderry. It has been separated position. If it is separated, the Town Clerk position, which is an elegate position in NH, can be statutory in nature. The Tax Collector position could be unified as a Motor Vehicle agent and simply be part of the staff.

Chairman Farrell stated that there has been discussion over time of moving to a statutory-required Town Clerk only, which would be a part time position, which would be a stipend position.

Councilor Dolan stated that this is an important office in terms of customer service.

Town Manager Smith stated that Finance Manager Sup Hickey has been working to cross train the stall of that office so that they are each knowledgeable and able to do one another's functions so that people don't have to stand in multiple lines. They can be everything done in one stap.

Chairman Farrell stated of skeep in mind that we collect one hundred million dollars, so we have to be highly processional.

Councilor Green stated it is a service oriented business, unlike some of the other things we do, and to the hours is a negative. We can take a look at the hours as well.

Chairman Farrell explained the hours are stated in the collective bargaining agreement. In order to change, we must work within the confines of that agreement.

Chief Hart stated that we have hired two part time people to help us out in that office. One is a consultant who comes in on Fridays. Diane Demers is the Town
