26 27	PRESENTATION: Case No. 3/21/201	2-1 was read into the record with no previous cases listed.
28 29	JIM SMITH: Who will be presenting?	?
30 31	JEANNINE WHEELER: My name is Je	annine Wheeler. I'm requesting a zoning variance for a home business.
32 33	JIM SMITH: Okay, go ahead.	
34 35		would be at 18 Wilshire Drive, Londonderry. I am a licensed massage
36	therapist and am requesting an in-home business. I have one (1) room in my home that I'd be using for this office. The days of operation would primarily be by appointment only. It is I do work outside the home, so it	
37	is not my primary business. And I was thinking of having a sign on a wishing well because of the name	
38	"Wheeler's Well" is my company's name. Just freestanding on the lawn. But I have not purchased that at this	
39	point. The floor plan included shows the office space. It's ten (10) by twelve (12), so a hundred and twenty	
40	(120) square feet, which is thirteen (13) percent of our fifteen sixty three (1,563) square foot house. The	
41	driveway would be where the client would park and it would be one (1) client at a time. Randomly. It	
42	wouldn't be one after another even because it is a new business. It is within the dwelling, within the house. It	
43	would not change the house at all, I'm not renovating or putting anything differently. No exterior. No storage	

of materials. And it's just my immediate family in the house and no one would be employed, actually, but me.

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And traffic would be extremely minimal. At this point, maybe like one (1) client a week, if that. It would be as if a friend was coming over. There'd be a one (1) hour or one hour and a half (1 ½) appointment and then time in between if there was another one. I also put that I'm going to purchase...I did purchase larger house numbers 'cause our...the street is not numbered, like on, you know, evenly, so that they could find the house easier and then hopefully, with the sign, when I get one. It's not a child care home business. And I don't need a play area. And I believe that's it.

JIM SMITH: Okay. Any questions?

LARRY O'SULLIVAN: Sure. Miss Wheeler, you say you will have one (1) at a time, one (1) customer there at a time. You're parking, you're driveway is gonna be an issue for us and where you are on Wilshire is not well traveled I would assume as well. But getting in and out of there, we wanna make sure that anybody who is in and out of there or driving along or if there are children in there, that they are protected and...you know, our concern and your neighbor's concern too is gonna be, "Okay, how commercial is this gonna be?" So, you've done a pretty good job, Miss Wheeler, of letting us know that, you know, the little sign that you're gonna put up is on your wishing well and, you know, it's really like a neighborhood kind of an area that you're in there with lots of residences. There's no other businesses around that I'm aware of and the issue that your neighbors and we are going to have is are you gonna be able to keep it as safe as you currently have it? Is there gonna be a lot of traffic that you're adding? When we give you a special exception, it's not gonna be for a one (1) at a time. We can't limit you to one (1) at a time because there's nobody to police it. There's nobody to enforce it. So by having the business there, what we'd like to be able from hear from you is that what your intentions are. Obviously, you live there. Do you leave the premises for some other reason during the day? Are you there all day?

JEANNINE WHEELER: I am not there all day. I only have one day off. I work at two other places.

LARRY O'SULLIVAN: Mm-hmm.

JEANNINE WHEELER: So...and my business cards do not have my address on it because it is my home. So if someone were to come on my day off or in the evening, we would already be home and they would just pull into the driveway as if a friend was coming over, that kind of thing. It shouldn't impact safety in any way.

LARRY O'SULLIVAN: How long is your driveway?

JEANNINE WHEELER: I'm not sure if I know that.

LARRY O'SULLIVAN: Do you see it there? I don't see it measured at all. I see that you have a driveway. And other than that...

NEIL DUNN: It's pretty...I'll betcha it's a hundred (100) feet at least.

JEANNINE WHEELER: It's pretty long. It's the whole...the house is set back and it is a whole side from the street, but I don't know how long it is.

JIM SMITH: Well, the side was two ninety two (292) and it's about half way back, so...

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      NEIL DUNN: Yes.
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      JIM SMITH: ...you're talking a hundred and forty (140), fifty (150) feet probably.
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      LARRY O'SULLIVAN: In other words, room for another car.
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      JEANNINE WHEELER: Plenty.
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      LARRY O'SULLIVAN: Or two (2) maybe.
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      JEANNINE WHEELER: Yeah.
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      LARRY O'SULLIVAN: Thank you.
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      JIM SMITH: Would be my guess. Were you going to have any other employees?
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      JEANNINE WHEELER: No, sir.
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      JIM SMITH: No outside employees. No outside storage of any type?
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      JEANNINE WHEELER: No, sir.
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      JIM SMITH: Approximately how many cars do you think you could park in your driveway?
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      RAYMOND WHEELER: I'd say four (4) or five (5).
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      JEANNINE WHEELER: That's my husband. Probably four (4) or five (5).
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      JIM SMITH: Okay, so there's...
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      RAYMOND WHEELER: [indistinct]. It's a big driveway.
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      JIM SMITH: If you're gonna speak, sir, could you come up to a microphone and identify yourself?
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      JEANNINE WHEELER: I guess he doesn't want to.
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      JIM SMITH: Well, it's more for the record than anything. Just so we have a record of who's speaking. Any
      other questions? Okay, at this point, I'll open it up to anybody who is in favor. If not, anybody who is in
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      opposition or has guestions? We have guite a few people here but not many interested in this case, evidently.
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      So therefore, I'll bring it back to the Board.
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      NEIL DUNN: Would you object to us limiting the number of people in a day? 'Cause I think we can do that,
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 Larry, and then just ask for the neighbor's help in monitoring that.

JEANNINE WHEELER: I don't think so. I mean, depending on what your number would be, but I would not, 135 you know, in a perfect world, have more than six (6) clients a day. So I don't know what your number...what 136 you were thinking, but if I had six (6) clients a day, I would probably go get an office, like, outside the home. 137 138 NEIL DUNN: And that's why I'm asking because earlier when you spoke, you spoke about maybe one (1) or 139 two (2) and now you're bringing up six, so I'm just trying to get a handle on how much...I mean, 'cause if we 140 141 gave it to you with no restrictions, then you could be open all day long and people could be rolling in and out 142 and that's what I'm trying to get a handle on and what... 143 144 JEANNINE WHEELER: Right. 145 NEIL DUNN: ....what you see would be realistic, I have no idea what... 146 147 JEANNINE WHEELER: Okay. 148 149 150 NEIL DUNN: ...how many patients you can see in a day, I guess, or what...the clients. 151 JEANNINE WHEELER: So I'm...correct. What I'm saying is a feasible amount is six (6) a day in a perfect world. 152 But I'm saying I don't have a clientele as yet, so, you know, one (1) or two (2) a month is how you start but I 153 wouldn't have a problem with you limiting that if it was reasonable. Within, you know, or close to the six (6), I 154 155 guess. 156 NEIL DUNN: Thank you. 157 158 JAY HOOLEY: If I could just...on the weekends, you indicated 9:00 AM to 8:00 PM and six (6) in there, assuming 159 somewhere normally in an hour appointment, would you be looking at six (6) during your evening hours 160 161 between 3:00 and 8:00 or are you talking a smaller number during that...? 162 JEANNINE WHEELER: It would be a smaller number. 163 164 JAY HOOLEY: Yeah, okay. 165 166 JEANNINE WHEELER: And I just put...at first I was gonna put my limited hours, but then I put all the time 167 because I, you know, situations change. I just started a new job within the last month, so, you know, my hours 168 changed too. So I just...why I put all availability, but I'm really not available all that, so... 169 170 JAY HOOLEY: That was more to just cover what... 171 172 173 JEANNINE WHEELER: Right. 174 JAY HOOLEY: ...might happen. 175

JEANNINE WHEELER: What might happen. Correct.

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JAY HOOLEY: As opposed to something you intend to fill all the time?

185 186 187	LARRY O'SULLIVAN: So right now you're asking for between 9:00 AM and 8:00 PM on weekends and 3:00 to 8:00 PM during the week? And that's seven (7) days a week?

190 191	LARRY O'SULLIVAN: Because you don't know what's gonna happen.
192 193	JEANNINE WHEELER: Right.
194 195	LARRY O'SULLIVAN: Okay.
196 197	JEANNINE WHEELER: And I work six (6) days a week elsewhere right now, so
198 199 200 201 202	LARRY O'SULLIVAN: Well, our issues are going to be that because you have the hours that you list are what we're either going to say yes or no to, we can modify those hours. Or we could say, "Well, you can't see anybody past 6:00 on the weekends," or something along those lines, but at the same time, you're not sure if all your business is gonna be Saturdays at 6:00 or Sundays at 7:00, right? Sotough. I mean, it's a difficult situation for us here.

211 212 213 214	NEIL DUNN: The hours, I mean, no, I mean, if she said midnight or 3:00 or something, I think I might want to reel back on that, but, you know, because you don't know and if it is, you know, if she was to have two (2) or three (3) in the 3:00 to 8:00 window, you know, I don't know. I was trying to get a handle on how do we

242 243	JEANNINE WHEELER: Mm-hmm.
244 245	LARRY O'SULLIVAN: Are you talking about the weekends or weekdays, Jim? Or both?
246 247	JIM SMITH: I would think the weekdays, I mean the weekends especially. Generally
248 249	LARRY O'SULLIVAN: No 9:00 to
250 251 252	JIM SMITH: Especially in the summertime, you're still pretty light, people are gonna be out and about, especially in the evening.
253 254 255	LARRY O'SULLIVAN: Mm-hmm. So you're alright with a 9:00 to 6:00 for the weekends and 3:00 to 8:00 for the weekdays?
256 257	JEANNINE WHEELER: Sure.
258 259	LARRY O'SULLIVAN: Okay. Is that where you were driving at, Jim?
260 261 262 263 264 265 266	JIM SMITH: Yeah, something to reduce it a little bit. I mean, you know, when you figure 9:00 toyou're talking what, eleven (11) hours on a weekdaya weekend. Five (5) hours each day. Twenty five (25)let's see thirty five (35)you're talking forty (40), fifty (50) a week possibly. Quite a bit of possible time. And again, I can understand where you're coming from because you don't know how to predict it because you don't what your potential is. Any other comments? No other comments from theor questions from the audience? In that case, I'll close the meetingthe hearing part of the meeting and take this under advisement.

269	LARRY O'SULLIVAN: Okay, are you ready for me?

JIM SMITH: Yup.

LARRY O'SULLIVAN: Obviously, I don't have an issue with the home occupation here. I think most of us are aware what a masseuse can do and, you know, there's none of the issues about the hair dressers that we've had where there's chemicals and all the rest of that stuff and, you know, the harsh chemicals and what have you, potentially. There's no motor anything, there's, you know, as far as I'm concerned, this is using a spare bedroom to turn it into a hobby room or something, but at the same time it's a business, so...and it's a licensed business, too, so as far as I'm concerned, I don't have any issue with it. I do think it's a good idea, Jim, that you came up with the request to ask for the limited hours on the weekends. As far as I'm concerned, that puts it over the top. Wouldn't be an intrusion to me if it was my next door neighbor, so...

JIM SMITH: Any other comments?

NEIL DUNN: My only concern is, again, hitting that number of visitors a day. If she, on a weekend, you know, theoretically, like you said, she could have twelve (12), maybe more people a day visiting. I think that's when we start to impact the neighborhood more. You're doing that...well, like you said, almost eighty (80) hours. If you did them on the hour, that's that many more trips in a small residential neighborhood, so I start getting concerned that now we're getting into the clause of adversely impacting traffic and that and, you know, you put a bunch of those in the neighborhood and all of a sudden it's not really a neighborhood anymore with all those extra trips. That's why I asked about the six (6) a day, and then that would be a trigger, so I'd like to see...she seemed okay with six (6). That seems fair to me, over the course of a day. I don't know what anybody else thinks.

JAY HOOLEY: I don't think you'd even squeeze six (6) in during the afternoon hours.

NEIL DUNN: No, but...

JAY HOOLEY: It would only be on the weekend and that...if that was agreeable.

LARRY O'SULLIVAN: Miss Wheeler also said, though, that if she had six (6) clients at any particular time, she'd get an office someplace, so...

JAY HOOLEY: [indistinct].

NEIL DUNN: Right, and that's where I'd wanna limit it because instead of making it more...

LARRY O'SULLIVAN: Sure, that's fine.

JIM SMITH: Yeah, between 3:00 and 8:00, if she...that's five (5) hours. If she spent an hour each, that's only five (5) possible.

JAY HOOLEY: And that's no in between time. You wouldn't even get that.

JIM SMITH: No.
