(2) What Are The Needs of Monterey?

(a) Keeping the Monterey School program in Monterey

- (b) Complete construction & determine uses for the Monterey Community Center
- (c) Plan to improve/expand programs for the Monterey Library
- (d) Address the needs of our aging population,
- (e) Keep and attract younger residents to live in Monterey
- (f) Town-wide Broadband to sustain businesses, Library, School, Community Center

- (g) Expansion of cell phone service to the entire Town
- (h) Provide additional Village parking for businesses, Church, Library and Post Office
- (i) Additional elderly and handicapped transportation options
- (j) Secure additional funding for School, Library, Community Center, Bidwell House
- (k) Additional sewer & water infrastructure to sustain the Village commercial district
- (I) Additional affordable housing
- (m)Address current Town financial constraints
- (n) Recognize the interrelationships between competing Monterey assets for public/private funding

(3) How Do We Address the Needs of Monterey?

Town and Related Infrastructure

- (a) Distinguish between the preservation of the Monterey School building and preserving the School program
- (b) Consider the construction of a multi-use building for the School & Library at the Community Center
- (c) Further collaboration between the Bidwell House, the Library, the Community Center and the Fire Co. to secure grant funding through the creation of an "umbrella" 501(c)3 Non-Profit Organization
- (d) Develop a detailed Needs Assessment for all Town facilities
- (e) Consider if the Library is moved to a multi-use building at the Community Center, then the existing Library building could be used for the Monterey School and the old School building could be used by the Monterey Historical Society.

Transportation

- (a) Advocate for additional Elderly Transportation with government/private entities
- (b) Advocate with Berkshire Regional Transportation Authority for a handicapped bus route along Route 23. Transport vehicles should be handicap accessible.

Business & Job Creation

- (a)Sustain existing businesses in the Village Center by upgrading water and sewer systems and providing for additional parking, sidewalks and fire protection
- (b) Evaluate the need for additional affordable housing that is built sustainably
- (c) Consider bylaws to allow/encourage "Accessory Dwelling Units" on existing lots

- (i) Obtain a copy of the Town Budget and Post on the *Monterey 2020* website before the Annual Town Meeting in May 2014
