

SELECTMEN'S MEETING

November 10, 1977

Present were Thomas Mansfield, Oliver Andrews, Roland Sallada and Betty Hooper.

A representative from Wagner Woodland came in to try to resolve the problem of what acreage the company actually owns. The representative discovered another error, therefore Roland advised that they should cancel their hearing with the Board of Taxation and the New Boston Selectmen to avoid unnecessary time expended.

Chairman of the New Boston dump committee, David Woodbury, brought Mr. Gregg Bohosiewicz of Wilton, representative of the Wilton dump committee to describe a program that the town of Wilton hopes to organize and invite surrounding towns to use their re-cycling system. This system necessitates the separation of glass, cans, dry paper, organic matter and the balance to be incinerated. Other towns showing interest are Lyndeboro, Temple, Greenfield, and possibly Milford. The traveling distance for New Boston is about 20 miles to the Wilton dump.

The town of Wilton will own and operate the system and the other towns would be customers. It would be run on a per capita fee using the census figure and varying every year. The cost of travel would be \$5.00 per loaded mile, and it is estimated the program would cost an estimated \$10,000 to \$12,000 per year.

Anyone bringing unselected garbage may leave it once, but will pay a fine of 25¢ per pound. If their offense is repeated, they will be turned away.

Wilton will probably ask for a five or ten year contract. The Selectmen of Wilton would appreciate knowing in about 2 or 3 weeks the general

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feelings of the New Boston selectmen. A meeting was set up for Monday November 21, at 8:00 pm at the Wilton town hall.

Richard Warnock and Mr. FredArsenault came in to make application for a trailer hearing. The hearing will be scheduled for December 1, 1977 8:00 pm in the Town Office Building.

Frank and Diane Crawford and Mr. Zwillinger came in to discuss the unpaid taxes on the Zwillinger property which went through the tax sale, placing a lien on the Crawford land. The bank is reluctant to issue a loan to the Crawford~~s~~ because of the lien. The bank official and the Board of Selectmen will endeavor to resolve the problem with a letter from the Selectmen "To Whom it May Concern" stating they would not ever use Lot #5 for satisfaction of any tax lien.

The fire department is still interest in hiring a member from CEFA . There will be meeting with a representative from CEFA and the Selectmen some Thursday at 7:30 pm that they may be more informed on the program.
