Hi Mary Ann and Kathy,

First, your questions...

1. Why did you or your family members vote or not vote?

Wife and I both voted. We're tuned in enough to know when a referendum takes place. However, I know several people who were not aware, and a few others who assumed it would pass without their Yes vote. More publicity and coordinated 'go vote' message would have helped... instead message was, "all's well" followed at the last minute with "all's well but, uh-oh, I hope people still go out and vote." Total voting numbers were down across the Yes and No votes equally, so I don't believe low turnout meant that it was just the Yes voters who stayed home. Because of the lame response across the board, I wished for a do-over. However, the reductions proposed were expected (but IMO were as deep as we should ever allow). I question whether the BOE should (or even will) eliminate all those EA's, but that whole issue just made me more skeptical of their strategy and philosophy regarding the budget. Not to say the cuts aren't real and potentially painful, I just don't believe the BOE can accurately articulate how the reductions will impact the real budget. But saying all those EAs will be eliminated is inflammatory, at best.

2. What is your opinion on the latest requested budget amount? *I'm supporting the budget, but...*

I wasn't planning to take the time to write an email to answer your questions because I felt comfortable allowing the traditional process at the polls play out (with an assumption that the budget will pass this time/today). However, I'm hearing more and more about people willing to vote NO with the hope that the LC will add money back to the schools instead. I'm mostly writing today to say I think this is a <u>misguided strategy and a reckless assumption</u> this time around. I truly hope that cooler heads prevail and the budget passes. However, if it doesn't pass, and additional cuts are imposed on the BOE budget, I will in all likelihood vote NO next time. I know I'm not alone with this thought. No further cuts should be made to the BOE budget (unless the BOE offers suggestions based on new savings that come to light).

The primary public message I'd encourage you to share is this: education supporters need to get on the same page. I completely understand the scrutiny and skepticism some people feel toward the BOE budget and the rationale behind it. I'd put myself in that camp, too. Typically, the more a person seeks to understand the details, the more they question the processes and strategies that drive the costs. For good or for bad, most people come away believing that more can be done to work more efficiently and also leverage synergies with town-side operations. But these types of savings are not going to be identified in the midst of the referendum season. The BOE needs to proactively create a special subcommittee – comprised of BOE members, LC education subcommittee members, someone from the BOF and 2-3 members of the public. This group should convene from June through October to study business issues and strategies to better understand the inside-costs of running the schools. Are there still significant cost duplications with the town-side? Is Newtown really overly burdened with administrative staff or are we lean and efficient after all? Bring all the benchmarking data being thrown around into the proper forum. This special committee can vet all of the public suggestions offered on the facebook discussion pages, NewtownPatch and The Bee. Pick the brains of the people who are most vocally critical of the BOE budget to understand why/what ideas do they have to improve? If this process is done well, in a very public setting, it will help educate the public, and will encourage buy-in from the LC, BOF and traditional fence-sitters who would support the budget if they didn't think it was so bloated.

Ok, I'll stop rambling. I just didn't want all the "coordinated advocacy" bouncing around in emails today to speak for me.

Hope the budget passes! If it doesn't, please find a way to protect the BOE budget or there will likely be a major wave of NO-voting education supporters to reject the next round. And that would suck!

The thing I am most concerned about with the most recent cuts is the reduction in EA's in the school budget. It's hard to see how without them we can serve ALL the kids in the classroom.
