LC Education Subcommittee Answers to questions on Common Core State Standards (# 16-18)

16: If teachers are unable to teach all of the standards for a particular grade level, for example, in kindergarten, then teachers in grade 1 and beyond will be required to teach the topics that were not covered in kindergarten, as well as the topics scheduled for their own grade level curriculum. This may cause teachers to rush through the curriculum that was not taught the previous year and/or leave out parts of their own curriculum, resulting in a ripple effect. Students take the first state assessment in grade 3, which only allows 2 years to make up a deficit in the kindergarten curriculum

^{*}It is difficult to predict all of the needs of teachers and students as the district transitions to CCSS. However, the time for teachers to become familiar with the new curriculum units they must teach, and the instructional strategies to deliver the curriculum, will be vital. Instructional strategies to ensure that ALL students are successful will require professional development, either through workshops, online, or in-district training.
