THESE MINUTES ARE SUBJECT TO APPROVAL BY BOARD OF SELECTMEN

The Board of Selectmen held a regular meeting Monday, December 21, 2015 in the Council Chamber of the Newtown Municipal Center, 3 Primrose Street. First Selectman Llodra called the meeting to order at 7:00p.m.

PRESENT: First Selectman Llodra, Selectman William F.L. Rodgers, Selectman Herbert C. Rosenthal.

EXECUTIVE SESSION: Selectman Rodgers moved to enter executive session to contemplate legal action in an ethics matter. Selectman Rosenthal seconded. Labor Attorney Fred Dorsey was invited to attend. Executive session was entered into at 7:00pm and returned to regular session at 7:25pm with no action taken.

ALSO PRESENT: Finance Director Robert Tait, Permanent Memorial Commission Chairman Kyle Lyddy, three members of the public and two members of the press.

VOTER COMMENTS: none.

ACCEPTANCE OF MINUTES: Selectman Rodgers moved to accept the minutes of the regular meeting of 12/7/15with the following corrections: New Business agenda item #2 First Selectman Llodra seconded.

New Business agenda item #3 Selectman Rodgers made the motion. Selectman Rosenthal seconded. All in favor of the minutes as amended.

COMMUNICATIONS: none.

FINANCE DIRECTORS REPORT: Mr. Tait presented the town financial statement showing the towns financial position on June 30, 2015 and the towns operating results for the fiscal year starting July 1, 2014 to June 30, 2015 (att.). The board expressed concern over the word "overrun" on page 2 (22), saying it can be interpreted that the Board of Selectmen spent what was beyond what was granted in the budget by \$885,930, which is untrue. Mr. Tait will make a note at the bottom of the page that overrun is an accounting term and that the costs were appropriated accordingly. Expenses on page 3 are budget offset by grants received.

UNFINISHED BUSINESS


Discussion and possible action:

1. 2016 Meeting Calendar: Selectman Rodgers moved to accept the 2016 Board of Selectman meeting calendar (att.). Selectman Rosenthal seconded. All in favor.

NEW BUSINESS

Discussion and possible action:

1.) Permanent Memorial Commission update: Mr. Lyddy was present to update the board (att.) and give Selectman Rosenthal an overview of prior work done by the commission. Other communities that have suffered tragedies have been very generous in their outreach. The commission believes the location should be decided prior to a decision on the design process. The commission has worked with the Conservation Commission, the Police Commission, Fairfield Hills Authority and Parks & Recreation. There have been multiple site visits to close to thirty locations, brought down to eight, then three and ultimately ended up with the High Meadow location; there wasn't a predetermined location. Selectman Rosenthal asked if the location was outside the conservation agriculture zone. First Selectman Llodra



- stated it is outside that zone and the Board of Selectmen formally designated that as open space over a year ago (att.). The location process has been very productive; the commission is working at a pace they are comfortable with to proceed. The access and viewpoint of the trails does not interfere with the land being considered; there will be a strong grade going down. It will be a destination. First Selectman Llodra encouraged the commission to proceed and keep the Board of Selectmen informed. Selectman Rodgers suggested contacting the First Selectman if there is an issue with interagency collaboration. Selectman Rosenthal is impressed with the steps taken and the sensitivity shown thus far.
- 2.) Proposal for Reorganization of Social Services Department: First Selectman Llodra shared documents on two positions being contemplated to add to social service/human services (att.) to continue the work of the recovery and resiliency team, whose funding expires March 2016. The Town has been receiving a grant from Praxair for \$50,000/yr. A grant has also been awarded an additional \$50,000 from the Newtown Sandy Hook Community Foundation. The \$100,000 total is for a licensed clinical social worker and a case manager. The cost for providing these services exceeds what will be received from grants. Selectman Rodgers said the social services department needed some revamping; he thinks this is a good partnership; it will be a transition, not an extension of what is currently in place.
- 3.) Transfer: \$39,609 from Contingency to Salaries & Wages, Social Security, Retirement Contributions and Group Insurance: Mr. Tait stated the transfer covers four months of this fiscal year. Selectman Rodgers moved to transfer \$39,609 from Contingency to Salaries & Wages, Social Security, Retirement Contributions and Group Insurance, noting that he is the Board of Selectman representative to the community foundation but doesn't see a conflict in the partnership. Selectman Rosenthal seconded. All in favor.
- 4.) Transfer: \$16,732 from Contingency to Capital: Selectman Rodgers moved the \$16,732 from Contingency to Capital. Selectman Rosenthal seconded. Mr. Tait said that the generator system on engine 331is broken and needs to be replaced. The request comes through the Board of Fire Commissioners (att.). All in favor.
- 5.) Board of Ethics response regarding inquiry: The Board of Selectmen sent the Board of Ethics a request for an advisory opinion. The Board of Ethics responded that after consideration the board determined that the Board of Selectmen request did not fall within the purview of an advisory opinion under section 460(g) of the Town Charter. First Selectman Llodra explained that the Board of Ethics has demurred from participating in providing an advisory opinion as requested by the Board of Selectmen. The Board of Selectmen met with counsel and does not believe there is additional action to be contemplated. Selectmen Rodgers is disappointed that the Board of Ethics didn't understand that the action being contemplated was an action of the Board of Selectmen and he disagrees with their decision and believes they misunderstood the request. Any individual who feels aggrieved can file their own complaint. Selectman Rodgers is content, consistent with the advice of the attorney, not to pursue this but wants the record to reflect the board disagrees with it. Mr. Rosenthal also does not agree with the Board of Ethics decision, saying they should've given an opinion, as requested, to the Board of Selectmen. Selectman Rosenthal said it is a complicated issue and individuals are free to file complaints. First Selectman Llodra stated the Board of Selectmen is in receipt of the Board of Ethics response, the Board of Ethics determined they would not participate in an advisory opinion and there in no further action contemplated.
- 6.) Certified Resolution relative to the State of Connecticut Judicial Branch Office of Victim Services financial assistance: Selectman Rosenthal moved the certified resolution authorizing First Selectman E. Patricia Llodra to execute and file such an application with the State of Connecticut Judicial Purchasing Office of Victim Services, to provide such additional information, to execute such other documents as may be required, with the State of Connecticut for State financial assistance if such an agreement is

- offered, to execute any amendments, decisions and revisions thereto, and to act as the authorized representative of the Town of Newtown, Connecticut. (att.). Selectman Rodgers seconded. All in favor.
- 7.) Appointment/Reappointments: Selectman Rodgers moved the list of re-appointments as noted in the document Board of Selectmen, December 21, 2015 (att.). Selectman Rosenthal seconded. All in favor.
- 8.) Driveway bond release/Extension: none.
- **9.)** Tax Refunds: Selectman Rosenthal moved the December 2015 tax refunds, refund No. 9, 2015/16 in the amount of \$4,410.26. Selectman Rodgers seconded. All in favor.

ADJOURNMENT: Having no further business the Board of Selectmen adjourned their regular meeting at 8:47.m.

General Fund Budgetary Highlights (continued)

Additional appropriations for the year amounted to \$298,031, which were funded by revised revenue estimates. Overall, revenues were higher than budgetary estimates and expenditures remained below budgeted amounts, with no department exceeding its annual appropriation. Transfers from contingency of \$248,053 were made to help defray year end overruns.

Bonded Projects Fund

The Bonded Projects fund revenues and other financing sources were less than its expenditures and other financing uses by \$1,515,787 for the fiscal year. The capital outlay activity from current and prior years was financed with a bond issuance in the current year and intergovernmental revenues.

Proprietary funds. The Town's proprietary funds provide the same information found in the government-wide financial statements, but in more detail. The Town's enterprise funds posted an overall decrease in net position of \$0.9 million for the fiscal year ended June 30, 2015.

Sewer Fund

Unrestricted net position of the sewer fund at the end of the year amounted to \$6,566,056, a decrease of \$1,716,493 from the prior year.

Sandy Hook Permanent Memorial Commission Update

Mission Statement: The mission of the Permanent Memorial Commission is to make a recommendation to the Board of Selectmen for a Permanent Memorial that remembers, honors and celebrates those 26 who died as a result of the Sandy Hook Elementary School shooting and serves to provide comfort to those who loved and were touched by them.

1. Information Gathering Stage - Surveys, Open Forums, In Person, Emails

- a. Phase I: 26 Families
- b. Phase II:
 - i. Parents of Students Enrolled at SHS on 12/14
 - ii. Staff Members Employed at SHS on 12/14
 - i. Newtown PD & Dispatchers, SHFD, Newtown EMS, State Police
- c. Phase III: Community at Large
- d. Phase IV: 26 Families (Ongoing)

2. Benchmarking of Communities

- a. 9/11 Commission
- b. Columbine Thesis
- c. Virginia Tech
- d. Aurora

3. Location Inventory

- a. Sub Committee worked with the Town of Newtown and Land Use Office to understand different locations available in town
- b. Based on information gathering, we created a criteria for what type of land we should be looking for
- c. Criteria included infrastructure, seclusion from noise, expansive views, a destination, proximity to Sandy Hook
 - i. Agreed that a portion of the **High Meadow** would be an appropriate location
- d. Working with the Conservation Commission, Fairfield Hills Authority, Police Commission and Park & Rec to move things forward
 - i. There's some pushback on the land, however want to align that the Board of Selectmen is okay with us pursuing this land

4. High Level Commission Outreach Takeaways (Conversations Ongoing)

- a. Conservation Commission: Concerned about ecological development if this were to be built and preserving the land of the High Meadow want to assure they are part of the process as we proceed
- b. Newtown Police Commission: 24 hour security cameras should be present, entrance should have sufficient room for emergency access




- c. Newtown Park & Rec: Work in tandem with their Phase III trail upgrades to ensure what they're proposing from a layout standpoint works with the memorial and not against it (parking, entranceway, etc.)
 - i. Met with Stantec to discuss land and our current proposal from a logistics/technical, infrastructure standpoint
- d. Fairfield Hills Authority: Overall supportive of the project no glaring concerns except to not rush through the process.

5. Design Selection Process

- a. In 2016, our Commission will create a Design Selection Process and open it up to architects and designers based on the land, criteria and any other "wish list" items we think should be included.
- b. Commission will be communicating with Owners Rep Geralyn Hoerauf in assuring our process is moving forward in the correct manner

6. Account

- a. Our Commission currently has \$165,000 committed to this project, but i. \$130,000 in the Town of Newtown Account from contributions after 12/14
 - ii. \$10,000 committed from the Glen Atkinson Memorial Fund
 - iii. \$25,000 committed from the Newtown Memorial Fund
- b. Although a dollar amount has not been put on this project at this time, more money will likely be needed to complete the project. A sub-committee has been created in an effort to raise dollars with as minimal of an impact on the community as possible

High and East Meadows Open Space

The High and East Meadows has been designated as open space at the request of the Planning and Zoning Commission. This designated open space at the Fairfield Hills Campus is unique when compared with other Town open space. It is not a separate parcel of land as it remains within the Fairfield Hills Campus and the Fairfield Hills Adaptive Reuse Zone.

The High and East Meadows Open Space contains trails maintained by the Newtown Parks and Recreation, structures maintained by Public Works and allows passive recreational uses as permitted by the Land Use Agency under Newtown Zoning Regulations 6.03.300 (27), (attached). The open space remains under the oversight of the Fairfield Hills Authority.

The designation of open space can include stipulations allowing uses requested by the donors of the land. The Town being the "donor" of the High and East Meadows open space has specified via the Zoning Regulations that the land be utilized for passive recreation as permitted by the Fairfield Hills Special Event Permit.

The Land Use Agency, specifically the Zoning Enforcement Officer has the final permit approval for Fairfield Hills Special Events under 6.03.300 (27). The final approval is based on comments from all pertinent agencies including the Police Department, Fire Marshal, Health District, Parks and Recreation, Land Use Agency, Fairfield Hills and the Conservation Commission.

The jurisdiction of the High and East Meadows Open Space has to be shared by all relevant Town agencies, departments and commissions. The purposes for Town Open Space are listed in Newtown Regulations, (attached).

To comply with the Newtown Zoning Regulations, to be in accordance with the Fairfield Hills Master Plan and facilitate the management of the open space, the following "Declaration Document Concerning the High and East Meadows" is submitted for approval:

Newtown Department of Social Services

At present, the Newtown Department of Social Services consists of two staff persons with an FTE of 1.8. The mission of the department is to enhance the quality of life and self-sufficiency of people in need of financial and social services. The department is very successful as a bridge between those in need and the many grant and aid programs available through public and private organizations. Support for longer-term needs and for new applications for renter assistance, food stamps, short-tern/immediate medical or dental care, and housing are handled with respect, compassion, and accountability. However, it has become increasingly clear over the past few years that the enormous range of needs of our residents cannot be met by the existing staffing and that a professional social work position is necessary for our community to be served at a more meaningful level.

The Town of Newtown was fortunate to be able to fund a six member (4.2 FTE) Recovery & Resiliency Team (RRT) through a grant from the Department of Justice in the wake of 12/14/12. Approximately 13% (over 100 individuals) of the current case load of the RRT is from residents with issues unrelated to the needs associated with the tragedy at Sandy Hook Elementary. But, the majority of the RRT case load is Sandy Hook related. Through mid-October of 2015, the RRT has logged 780 case files. And each month brings an average of 25 new cases. There is no dispute to the evidence of need for social work services.

Early in 2013, just weeks from the Sandy Hook tragedy, the Praxair Foundation committed financial help for Newtown to conduct a comprehensive needs assessment focused on mental health needs of discrete constituent groups. Moving forward, the information from that needs assessment provided some of the framework for DoJ and SERV grant applications and program planning. Praxair then committed an additional grant of \$50,000 to support community outreach for mental health services. The Praxair grant was used to supplement the DoJ grant so that we could add to the RRT staffing and enhance the outreach function. Praxair has committed, now, to grant \$50,000 for two additional calendar years in order that we continue community outreach and service through the position of the clinical social worker position.

These resources from Praxair in combination with an appropriation through the local municipal operating budget will be used to fund the clinical social worker position. Further, we plan to have the social worker in place and operational by March of 2016 in order to better soften the impact of the demise of the RRT. It is anticipated that this additional position will eventually be fully funded via the municipal budget. The availability of Praxair funds helps to ease this request into the municipal spending plan and increases the sustainability of that position and the services provided therein.

An additional position sought for social services is a care navigator. For this position we are seeking a grant of \$50,000 from the Newtown-Sandy Hook Community Foundation. Our experience with the RRT established a firm understanding of the value of care navigation. Persons in this role have provided a high level of direct, personal support and outreach services, primarily focused on the families most

impacted by 12/14. The care navigators have been described to me by RRT clients as the "feet on the street", "anchors in a turbulent surf", and "caring, constant, and compassionate voice of reason and advice". Care navigation will help to round out the service profile most needed by our community. Our plan is to have the care navigator in place in March 2016. We commit to future consideration of this position as a permanent feature of our social services department. We just do not know right now when or if the need for this level of care navigation services will abate over time or if those services could at some future point be incorporated into the work role of existing staff. In the meantime, we are hopeful that the Foundation will be able to help us restructure and enhance the delivery of critical social services by funding our grant request.

A description follows of the services to be provided by the Clinical Social Worker and by the Care Navigator.

Licensed Clinical Social Worker

The primary responsibility of the Social Worker is to help create and sustain a well-coordinated mental health system in Newtown, understand and anticipate gaps in service, and work to secure necessary resources to support the community needs. DSS should provide a single point of contact for those in the community seeking assistance.

- The clinician would be responsible for working with community partners to serve as a clearing house for services provided and to gather & disseminate such information on a regular basis throughout the community;
- Develop and maintain a comprehensive mental health service delivery and planning system for the town, including very close partnership with the Newtown Public Schools, healthcare providers, senior services, and mental health treatment providers;
- Work in partnership with a trauma treatment center* to execute a training plan for providers
 throughout the community and region to assure on-going professional development in the areas
 of trauma response;
- Work with insurance providers and funds to make clear to the public the availability of services and the coverage available via insurance and/or private funds;
- Provide clinical oversight of the care navigator(s) and clinical support as needed to individual cases;
- Serve on local and regional boards and teams related to service delivery and planning, and meet
 with Boards or Commissions as necessary; Work in conjunction with support services such as
 the Commission on Aging, Newtown Health District, Newtown Youth and Family Services to
 ensure and provide optimal service;
- Serve as the clinical/mental health expert/spokesperson for the town.

Qualifications

Masters of Social Work or closely related field. LCSW or equivalent strongly preferred;

A minimum of 10 years of professional experience including both clinical work as well as managerial functions (i.e. program development, staff management, fiscal responsibilities) with a proven track record of successful project management in complex & challenging environment;

Experience with community organizing/planning, coalition building, and/or community collaborations with particular knowledge of the Newtown community;

Exceptional communication and relationship building skills;

Proven engagement skills with diverse populations:

Trauma informed and experienced with strong crisis intervention skills.

*A trauma treatment center is in the planning stages by Melissa Glaser of the Recovery and Resiliency Team as a follow-on program and facility when the RRT funding ends in March 2016. Ms. Glaser is joined in this effort by a number of professional colleagues with certifications and licensure in diverse mental health disciplines.

Care Navigator

Through a grant from the Newtown-Sandy Hook Community Foundation, the care navigator is responsible for direct work with individuals and families impacted by 12/14, linking and following up on needed services. The care navigator will provide comprehensive outreach services for the Newtown population with a proactive focus on the families who lost loved ones and others most closely impacted by the tragedy.

- Proactively engage families of loved ones lost and others most impacted by the tragedy to elicit feedback and respond to individual needs;
- Respond to inquiries from residents, employees, concerned family members, police and fire departments, clergy, hospitals and area mental health agencies;
- Provide case management services to link individuals and families to all of the services available to them, including assistance in navigating systems such as insurance;
- Work in conjunction with any existing treatment providers to assure comprehensive service delivery;
- Advocate on behalf of the individual or family for services as needed;
- Feed information re: needs and potential gaps in services to Clinician.

Qualifications

Bachelor's Degree in Social Work or related field, Master's Degree preferred;

3-5 years of case management experience working with vulnerable populations including brief assessment and discharge planning;

Trauma informed and experienced;

Familiarity with entitlement benefits and experience proactively researching community resources and services in order to provide most appropriate referrals;

Strong boundaries and demonstrated emotional resilience and intelligence;

Experience with client-centered advocacy;

Proven engagement skills;

Adherence to the highest ethical standards and confidentiality.

The grant (\$50,000) I am seeking will be directly applied to salary and fringe benefits for the Care Navigator position. Funds will be sought from the municipal budget to meet any costs which exceed the Foundation grant for the salary and benefit package. Further, operational costs including professional development, technology support, materials and supplies, rent, utilities, postage and the like will also be sought from the municipal budget. Much of these operational costs, exclusive of rent, are line items in the municipal budget and would be increased accordingly.

A key component of constructing the expected budget for the expanded social services department is location of those staff members. The current social services department offices in the lower level of Town Hall South can be reconfigured to accommodate the two additional staff. This is not the best option, however, as space is not expansive, confidentiality may be difficult to achieve, parking is very limited, and the building itself-as the home of the Police Department-may be off-putting to many in search of a more welcoming environment. A second option is to continue to rent the Engineer's House. now the home of the RRT. The Town is leasing that building from the Fairfield Hills Authority at the rate of \$1000.00 per month through the DoJ grant. A continuation of that lease beyond March 31,2016, is subject to negotiations with the FHA. It could be anticipated that negotiations would be successful but that the rental costs may increase. A third option is to 'partner' with the Parent Connection and lease space in the to-be-remodeled duplex located in Washington Circle of Fairfield Hills. That option, if pursued, is subject to review and approval by the PC Board. Of these options, it is the latter two which have the best setting and environment for the delivery of services. If this grant request is successful, I will then seek negotiations with the FHA and or the Parent Connection Board. I share this information about the unknowns regarding location of expanded social services so that you will know and understand the absence of specificity in the budget associated with this grant request,

The Town will soon begin development of its municipal budget forfiscal 2017. That budget proposal will include funding for operational costs for the expanded social services department, as well as resources needed to fill the salary/benefit gap for the clinical social worker position funded at \$50,000 via Praxair. A grant from the Foundation for the care navigator position will provide additional support in our efforts to create a sustainable plan for the delivery of community-based mental health and wellness services and supports.

In closing, thank you for considering this request. It is my belief that the clinical social worker and the care navigator positions are important components of a sustainable plan for the delivery of services. I appreciate that the Foundation will have many requests to review and too few resources to grant. I hope that this application warrants approval.
