Call to Order:

A quorum was established and the meeting called to order at 7:04 p.m. by Chairman Fates. The meeting was held in the Trustees' Room at Snow Library.

Meeting Attendance:

Trustees present: Mary Lou Conway, Hal Eastman, Megan Fates, Barbara Natale, Barbara O'Connor, and Robert Singer.

Library Staff members present: Library Director, Mary Reuland; and Administrative

Assistant, Judi Wilson.

- Others present for regular monthly Library Trustees Meeting: Assistant Town Administrator, Myra Suchenicz; Friends Representative, Margaret Ostro; and Student Representative, Jennifer Withrow.
- Absent: Trustee Tim Traub.

Approval of minutes:

The minutes of the Trustees Meeting held June 9, 2009, were reviewed and amended. A motion was made and seconded to "approve the minutes as amended". The motion carried with a vote 5(Y)-0(N)-1(A).

Trustee Chair Report:

Friends Annual Meeting: The Annual Meeting for the Friends of Snow Library is scheduled for July 16 at 2:00 p.m. followed by guest speaker, Peter Smith, at 3:00 p.m. Smith has family ties to Orleans, is an editor for "O" magazine, and is a published author.

Financial Report:

Monthly Financial Reports: Administrative Assistant Wilson reported that there was no monthly financial report as year-end paperwork for Fiscal Year 2009 which ended June 30th was still being completed. The Library met the Town's goals for turning back funds and a final yearend summary will be available next month.

Report of Student Representative:

- Student Representative Withrow reported that although students are on their summer break, most are completing summer reading assignments and using the Library accordingly.
- A list of popular authors was given to Director Reuland for assistance in purchasing new materials for the young adult area. Director Reuland expressed a desire to improve the young adult section of the Library.
- It was suggested that any assistance the Library could provide students beginning their college search would be most appreciated. The possibility of a bookmark with a directory of helpful websites for students was discussed.

Library Director's Report:

- July Report: Director Reuland reviewed the July 2009 Director's Report. (Copy attached.) Copies of the Youth Services Reports for June 2009 were also distributed. (Copy attached.) In addition, the following matters were discussed:
 - Request for Author to Sell Books at Snow Library Programs: Director Reuland reported she was unable to schedule author Lisa Genova (Still Alice) as planned due to the author's scheduling conflicts. However, author Kathryn Kleekamp (Cape Cod and the Islands: Where Beauty and History Meet) was available and has been scheduled to speak on August 18th at

7:00 p.m. The author has expressed a desire to sell her books at the event if possible. (Note: Author, Michael Tougias (Fatal Forcast, Ten Hours Until Dawn) has been scheduled for July 21st at 7:00 p.m. and Trustees voted to permit him to make his books available for purchase at this event during the June 2009 Trustees Meeting.) A motion was made and seconded "to permit Kathryn Kleekamp to make her books available for purchase one time only at Snow Library during her program at Snow Library this summer." The motion carried with a vote 7-0-0. Any Trustee interested in attending and introducing the author to the audience was encouraged to speak with Director Reuland.

• Adult Programming:

• There will be two book and author programs: Michael Tougias (*Ten Hours Until Dawn*) has been scheduled for July 21st at 7:00 p.m. and Kathryn Kleekamp (*Cape Cod and the Islands: Where Beauty and History Meet*) has been scheduled to speak on August 18th at 7:00 p.m.

• The Friends of Snow Library and the Orleans Cultural Council will present an afternoon of music exploring the flute and guitar with "Contempaissance" on Saturday, August 8th, at

2:00 p.m.

• The Summer Reading Program will present a family program on Galileo on July 15th at

6:30 p.m.

• A Boston Globe reporter has expressed an interest in providing a lecture on pension reform if the Library is interested. There was consensus that Director Reuland should gather more information.

The Library was approached regarding the opportunity for hosting a Shakespeare program
in August. The matter was discussed and there was consensus that there was not enough

lead time to schedule it for next month and adequately publicize the event.

One Town One Book is being scheduled for the fall and the committee has narrowed the
potential books down to a list of four – Old School by Tobias Wolff, Empire Falls by
Richard Russo, Olive Kitteridge by Elizabeth Strout, and Mayflower by Nathaniel
Philbrick.

• Space Needs Assessment: Director Reuland distributed a list of potential focus groups to meet with Consultant Richard Waters in September along with a draft list of group discussion questions and a draft survey to accompany the Space Needs Assessment process. Trustees were encouraged to read the material thoroughly and offer suggestions for developing a list of people to invite to participate in the process.

• Public Relations: Director Reuland distributed copies of a flyer "What's New @ Snow Library" which was created by Sarah Freeman, the Town Media Coordinator. Trustees were very pleased with the result and inquired about it becoming a more regular feature available at the

Circulation Desk.

A motion was made and seconded "to accept the Director's Report as presented". The
motion carried with a vote 6-0-0.

Report of Friends' Representative:

Friends' Representative Ostro reported on the following matters:

• Trustees were encouraged to attend the Friends' Annual Meeting on July 16.

 An All Day Book Sale was held last week which raised \$1,800 for the Friends. The weekly Saturday morning sales continue, and the next all day sale is scheduled for the long weekend in October.

Other Reports:

• Craine Gallery Committee: Trustee Conway reported the Craine Gallery Committee does not meet during the summer although the monthly exhibits will continue. The next meeting of the committee will be in September.

• Endowment Fund: Trustee Singer reported on the following matters:

The current market value is approximately \$771,380, with a loss of \$4,311 since last month. There has been an income of \$11,000 in dividends and interest year to date.

The Endowment Fund gave the Library \$4,500 in response to a request from Director Reuland for additional shelving in the large print area of the lower level. Any balance of funds after this purchase is made will be used towards improved shelving for DVDs and music CDs. Another funding request from the Library is anticipated.

The Endowment Fund Board has hired an attorney to review the paperwork for the organization with regards to the possibility of moving the funds to the Friends of Snow Library. A meeting of the full board has been planned for next week to discuss the matter

further.




