## ARTICLE 1: Amend FY18 Wage and Classification Schedule

To see if the Town will vote to:

a) Amend the Salary Classification Plan, as set forth in Appendix A; Or take other action relative thereto.

#### ARTICLE 5: Transfer to OPEB Liability Trust Fund

The fiscal year ends on June 30<sup>th</sup> of each year. This process allows the Town to close its books on a fiscal year and submit financial reports to the Commonwealth on a timely basis. However, on a few occasions, there are invoices that are received well past the July 15<sup>th</sup> deadline.

#### ARTICLE 12: Marijuana Zoning Bylaw

To see if the Town will vote to amend the Town's Protective Zoning By-laws by adding a new Section \_\_\_\_\_, TEMPORARY MORATORIUM ON RECREATIONAL MARIJUANA ESTABLISHMENTS, that would provide as follows, and further to amend the Table of Contents to add Section \_\_\_\_\_,

"Temporary Moratorium on Recreational Marijuana Establishments".

Section \_\_\_\_\_ PURPOSE:

On November 8, 2016, the voters of the Commonwealth approved a law regulating the cultivation, processing, distribution, possession and use of marijuana for recreational purposes (new G.L. C. 94G, Regulation of the Use and Distribution of Marijuana Not Medically Prescribed). The law, which allows certain personal use and possession of marijuana, took effect on December 15, 2016 and (as amended on December 30, 2016; Chapter 351 of the Acts of 2016) requires a Cannabis Control Commission to issue regulation regarding the licensing of commercial activities by March 15, 2018 and to begin accepting application for licenses on April 1, 2018. Currently under the Zoning By-law, a nonmedical Marijuana Establishment (hereinafter, a "Recreational Marijuana Establishment"), as defined in G.L. c. 94G, Section 1, is not specifically addressed in the Zoning By-law. Regulations to be promulgated by the Cannabis Control Commission may provide guidance on certain aspects of location regulation of Recreational Marijuana Establishments. The regulation of recreational marijuana raises novel legal, planning, and public safety issues, and the Town needs time to study and consider the regulation of Recreational Marijuana Establishments and address such issues, as well as to address the potential impact of the State regulations on local zoning and to undertake a planning process to consider amending the Zoning By-law regarding regulation of Recreational Marijuana Establishments. The Town intends to adopt a temporary moratorium on the use of land and structures in Town for Recreational Marijuana Establishments so as to allow sufficient time to address the effects of such structures and uses in the Town and to enact by-laws in a consistent manner.

Section \_\_ DEFINITION: "Recreational Marijuana Establishment" shall mean a "marijuana cultivator, marijuana testing facility, marijuana product manufacturer, marijuana retailer or any other type of licensed marijuana-related business."

Section \_\_\_ Temporary Moratorium

For the reasons set forth above and notwithstanding any other provision of the Zoning By-law to the contrary, the Town hereby adopts a temporary moratorium on the use of land or structures for a Recreational Marijuana Establishment and other uses related to recreational marijuana. The moratorium shall be in effect through June 30, 2018 or until such time as the Town adopts Zoning By-law amendments that regulate Recreational Marijuana Establishments, whichever occurs earlier. During the moratorium period, the Town shall undertake a planning process to address the potential impacts of recreational marijuana in the Town, and to consider the Cannabis Control Commission regulations regarding Recreational Marijuana Establishments, and shall consider adopting new Zoning By-laws in response to these new issues.

#### **ARTICLE 13: PROPOSED BY-LAW CHANGE:**

To see if the Town will vote to amend Town By-law, Article XXXII, Stormwater Management Control By-law, Section 7.0 as follows:

#### FROM:

7.0 Permits and Procedures Public Hearing.

The Board shall make a determination of the completeness of an application within twenty-one (21) calendar days from the submittal. The Board shall hold a public hearing within twenty-one (21) calendar days of the receipt of a complete application as specified by the regulations and shall take final action within twenty-one (21) calendar days from the time of the close of the hearing unless such time is extended by agreement between the applicant and The Board. Notice of the public hearing shall be given by publication and posting and by first-class mailings to all abutters at least fourteen (14) calendar days prior to the hearing. The Board shall make the application available for inspection by the public during business hours at Shirley Permit Granting Authority office. All expenses associated with the notice of Public Hearing shall be at the applicant's expense. The Board, at its discretion, may hold concurrent public hearings for other hearings required under state, federal or local law or Bylaws.

**Start of Development.** Prior to the start of development the following items must be met. 1. There shall be a fourteen (14) calendar day waiting period from the close of the hearing to allow for any appeals of the Permit Granting Authority's procedures and subsequent decision. Any and all appeals shall be rectified before any Start of Development.

TO:

7.0 Permits and Procedures Public Hearing.

The Board shall make a determination of the completeness of an application within twenty-one (21) calendar days from the submittal. The Board shall hold a public hearing within sixty five (65) calendar days of the receipt of a complete application as specified by the regulations and shall take final action within twenty-one (21) calendar days from the time of the close of the hearing unless such time is extended by agreement between the applicant and The Board. The Planning Board will request feedback from other Town Departments after receipt of the application but prior to the Public Hearing. Notice of the public hearing shall be given by publication and posting and by first-class mailings to all abutters at least fourteen (14) calendar days prior to the hearing. The Board shall make the application available for inspection by the public during business hours at Shirley Permit Granting Authority office. All expenses associated with the notice of Public Hearing shall be at the applicant's expense. The Board, at its discretion, may hold concurrent public hearings for other hearings required under state, federal or local law or Bylaws.

**Start of Development.** Prior to the start of development the following items must be met. 1. There shall be a <u>twenty one (21)</u> calendar day waiting period from the close of the hearing to allow for any appeals



of the Permit Granting Authority's procedures and subsequent decision. Any and all appeals shall be rectified before any Start of Development.

#### ARTICLE 16: Revolving Funds Bylaw

To see if the Town will vote pursuant to G.L. c.44, §53E½ to authorize revolving funds for the following departments for Fiscal Year 2018 as set forth below, amend the General Bylaws by inserting the following new bylaw, and establish fiscal year spending limits, all as specified below:

Revolving Funds Bylaw

Section 1. There are hereby established in the Town of Shirley pursuant to the provisions of G.L. c.44, §53E½, the following Revolving Funds, from which the specified department head, board, committee, or officer may incur liabilities against and spend monies from without appropriation in accordance with the limitations set forth in this by-law.



Section 2. Fringe benefits of full-time employees whose salaries or wages are paid from the fund shall also be paid from the fund.

Section 3. No liability shall be incurred in excess of the available balance of the fund.

Section 4. The total amount spent during a fiscal year shall not exceed the amount authorized by Annual Town Meeting or any increase therein as may later be authorized by the Board of Selectmen and Finance Committee in accordance with G.L. c.44, §53E½.

Section 5. Interest earned on monies credited to a revolving fund established by this by-law shall be credited to the General Fund.

Section 7. Procedures and Reports. Except as provided in General Laws Chapter 44, §53E½ and this by-law, all applicable state and local laws and regulations that govern the receipt, custody, expenditure and payment of town funds shall apply to the use of revolving funds established and authorized by this by-law.

And, further, to establish the following fiscal year spending limit for such funds:

#### Summary:

Some of the Town's governmental functions are able to produce enough revenue, through fees, grants, and the like, to support particular expenses. Formerly the Town had to raise the expense money at Town Meeting and then offset the appropriation with estimated receipts to keep the tax rate at a minimum. More recently state law has provided for the use of revolving funds, and now this article has become a standard article in Shirley.

The result is essentially the same, but the balancing is demystified. The voter can clearly see what is happening, rather than worry whether a particular revenue stream is truly being used to fund the service for which it is received versus some other unrelated function. The law requires that revolving funds generally be voted at an Annual Town Meeting and renewed annually.

With passage of the Municipal Modernization Act, the Town must adopt a general bylaw to establish the funds. For this year only, the Department of Revenue has also recommended that the Town also approve revolving funds in a manner similar to past years. The above article therefore lists the proposed revolving funds, proposes a bylaw, and establishes fiscal year spending limits. Note further that in contrast to past years, the revolving fund receipts do not include gifts and grants, as, pursuant to G.L. c.44, §53A, such monies must be separately accounted for and can be spent by the recipient of the grant or gift for such purposes without further appropriation.
