ARTICLE 1: Accept Report

To see if the Town will vote to provide its non-binding support for the Open Space and Recreation Plan prepared by the Open Space and Recreation Plan Committee and submitted to the Massachusetts Executive Office of Energy and Environmental Affairs, Division of Conservation Services, as on file with the Town Clerk; or take any other action relative thereto.

Summary: This is a non-binding vote with respect to the Open Space and Recreation Plan.

Article 4: Prior Year Bills 2017

Selectmen Expenses: The will allow the Town to contract for services to prepare backlogged meeting minutes.

The entity known as Teenage Anxiety and Depression Solutions (TADS) wishes to provide services in Shirley. TADS is a non-profit 501(c)(3) entity devoted to addressing issues of mental health by raising awareness, providing education, and enabling access to care for all residents. If approved, the Board would enter into a grant agreement with TADS for the purpose of furthering awareness of and enabling access to mental health care in Shirley.

Cemeteries: The current cemetery software system is antiquated and needs to be replaced. This amount will fund the expense to input existing cemetery data from the old software system to the new software system.

ARTICLE 6: Transfer to OPEB Liability Trust Fund

To see if the Town will vote to transfer a sum of money from Free Cash to the Other Post Employment Benefit (OPEB) Trust Fund; or take any other action relative thereto.

Summary: This article transfers a sum of money to the OPEB Trust Fund. OPEB is an unfunded liability that neither the state nor the federal government has required funding, unlike retirement obligations. The Fund was adopted at a previous Town Meeting. Last Year the Town appropriated \$10,000.00 and the Board of Selectmen does not wish to exceed that amount this year.

The balance as of October 2017 \$823,590.05

The balance as of October 2017 \$455,822.

Summary: If approved as a public way, as with all public ways, the Town will be responsible for maintenance.

ARTICLE 15: Temporary Moratorium on MEDICAL Marijuana

To see if the Town will vote to amend the Town of Shirley's Protective Zoning Bylaws to add a new Section 14.17, entitled: **TEMPORARY MORATORIUM ON MEDICAL MARIJUANA TREATMENT CENTERS**, as set forth below, and to amend the Table of Contents for said Bylaws to add said section accordingly, or take any other action relative thereto.

14.17 Temporary Moratorium on Medical Marijuana Treatment Centers

14.17.1 Purpose

By vote at the State election on November 6, 2012, the voters of the Commonwealth enacted Chapter 369 of the Acts of 2012, entitled "An Act for the Humanitarian Medical Use of Marijuana", regulating the cultivation, distribution, possession and use of marijuana for medical purposes. The law became effective on January 1, 2013, and on May 24, 2013, the State Department of Public Health issued regulations under the act governing the cultivation, processing and distribution of medical-use marijuana. On July 28, 2017, Governor Baker signed "An Act to Ensure Safe Access to Marijuana" (the "Act"), adopted as Chapter 55 of the Acts of 2017. The Act makes a number of significant changes to the regulation of medical-use marijuana, including, but not limited to, the eventual repeal of Chapter 369 of the Acts of 2012, the transfer of the oversight and regulation of medical-use marijuana from the Department of Public Health to the newly-created Cannabis Control Commission, and the adoption of new requirements for the cultivation, processing, distribution, possession and use of marijuana for medical purposes. Pursuant to the Act, the Commission is required to promulgate new rules and regulations for the medical use of marijuana, including the licensing and operation of Medical Marijuana Treatment Centers. Currently under the Zoning Bylaws, the cultivation, processing, or distribution of marijuana for medical purposes is not a permitted use in the Town and regulations promulgated by the Commission are expected to provide guidance to the Town in regulating medical marijuana, including Medical Marijuana Treatment Centers.

The regulation of medical marijuana raises complex legal, planning and public safety issues. The Town needs time to study and consider the regulation of Medical Marijuana Treatment Centers and address such complex issues, as well as to address the potential

impact of State regulations on local zoning and to undertake a planning process to consider amending the Zoning Bylaws regarding regulation of Medical Marijuana Treatment Centers and other uses related to the regulation of medical marijuana. A temporary moratorium on the use of land and structures in the Town for Medical Marijuana Treatment Centers will allow the Town sufficient time to engage in a planning process to address the effects of such structures and uses in the Town and to enact bylaws in a manner consistent with sound land use planning goals and objectives.

14.7.2 Definition

"Medical Marijuana Treatment Center" shall mean an establishment approved under a medical use marijuana license that acquires, cultivates, possesses, processes (including development of related products such as food, tinctures, aerosols, oils, or ointments), transfers, transports, sells, distributes, dispenses, or administers marijuana, products containing marijuana, related supplies, or educational materials to registered qualifying patients or their personal caregivers for medical purposes.

14.7.3 Temporary Moratorium

For the reasons set forth above and notwithstanding any other provision of the Zoning Bylaws to the contrary, the Town hereby adopts a temporary moratorium on the use of land or structures for a Medical Marijuana Treatment Center. The moratorium shall be in effect through December 31, 2018, or until the Town adopts Zoning Bylaw amendments that regulate Medical Marijuana Treatment Centers, whichever occurs earlier. During the moratorium period, the Town shall undertake a planning process to address the potential impacts of medical marijuana in the Town, consider the impact of the "The Regulation and Taxation of Marijuana Act" and the "Act to Ensure Safe Access to Marijuana" and regulations adopted thereunder, and consider adopting new zoning bylaws to address the impact and operation of Medical Marijuana Treatment Centers and related uses.

Summary: This amendment serves to adopt a temporary moratorium on the use of land or structures for a Medical Marijuana Treatment Center. The moratorium shall be in effect through December 31, 2018, or until the Town adopts Zoning Bylaw amendments that regulate Medical Marijuana Treatment Centers, whichever occurs earlier. During the moratorium period, the Town shall undertake a planning process to address the potential impacts of medical marijuana in the Town, consider the impact of current and future regulations. The Planning Board recommends favorable action on this Article.

A two-thirds vote is required for passage of this article.

ARTICLE 16: Temporary Moratorium on RECREATIONAL Marijuana

To see if the Town will vote to amend the Town of Shirley's Protective Zoning Bylaws to add a new Section 14.18 entitled, "TEMPORARY MORATORIUM ON RECREATIONAL MARIJUANA ESTABLISHMENTS", as set forth below, and to amend the Table of Contents accordingly, or take any other action relative thereto.

Section 14.8.1 PURPOSE:

On November 8, 2016, the voters of the Commonwealth approved a law regulating the cultivation, processing, distribution, possession and use of marijuana for recreational purposes (new G.L. C. 94G, Regulation of the Use and Distribution of Marijuana Not Medically Prescribed). The law, which allows certain personal use and possession of marijuana, took effect on December 15, 2016 and (as amended on December 30, 2016; Chapter 351 of the Acts of 2016) requires a Cannabis Control Commission to issue regulation regarding the licensing of commercial activities by March 15, 2018 and to begin accepting application for licenses on April 1, 2018. Currently under the Zoning By-law, a non-medical Marijuana Establishment (hereinafter, a "Recreational Marijuana Establishment"), as defined in G.L. c. 94G, Section 1, is not specifically addressed in the Zoning By-law. Regulations to be promulgated by the Cannabis Control Commission may provide guidance on certain aspects of location regulation of Recreational Marijuana Establishments. The regulation of recreational marijuana raises novel legal. planning, and public safety issues, and the Town needs time to study and consider the regulation of Recreational Marijuana Establishments and address such issues, as well as to address the potential impact of the State regulations on local zoning and to undertake a planning process to consider amending the Zoning By-law regarding regulation of Recreational Marijuana Establishments. The Town intends to adopt a temporary moratorium on the use of land and structures in Town for Recreational Marijuana Establishments so as to allow sufficient time to address the effects of such structures and uses in the Town and to enact by-laws in a consistent manner.

Section 14.8.2 DEFINITION:

"Recreational Marijuana Establishment" shall mean a "marijuana cultivator, marijuana testing facility, marijuana product manufacturer, marijuana retailer or any other type of licensed marijuana-related business."

Section 14.8.3 Temporary Moratorium

For the reasons set forth above and notwithstanding any other provision of the Zoning By-law to the contrary, the Town hereby adopts a temporary moratorium on the use of land or structures for a Recreational Marijuana Establishment and other uses related to recreational marijuana. The moratorium shall be in effect through December 31, 2018 or until such time as the Town adopts Zoning By-law amendments that regulate Recreational Marijuana Establishments, whichever occurs earlier. During the moratorium period, the Town shall undertake a planning process to address the potential impacts of recreational marijuana in the Town, and to consider the Cannabis Control Commission regulations regarding Recreational Marijuana Establishments, and shall consider adopting new Zoning By-laws in response to these new issues.

Or take any action relative thereto.

Summary: This amendment serves to adopt a temporary moratorium on the use of land or structures for a Recreational Marijuana Establishments. The moratorium shall be in effect through December 31, 2018, or until the Town adopts Zoning Bylaw amendments that regulate Recreational Marijuana Establishments, whichever occurs earlier. During the moratorium period, the Town shall undertake a planning process to address the potential impacts of medical marijuana in the Town, consider the

impact of current and future regulations. The Planning Board recommends favorable action on this Article.

A two-thirds vote is required for passage of this article.

ARTICLE 17: Proposed Change STORMWATER Management Town Bylaw

To see if the Town will vote to amend Town By-laws, Article XXXII, Stormwater Management Control By-law, Section 7.0, by deleting the strike through text and inserting the underlined text as follows:

7.0 Permits and Procedures

Public Hearing. The Board shall make a determination of the completeness of an application within twenty-one (21) calendar days from the submittal. The Board shall hold a public hearing within twenty-one (21) sixty five (65) calendar days of the receipt of a complete application as specified by the regulations and shall take final action within twenty-one (21) calendar days from the time of the close of the hearing unless such time is extended by agreement between the applicant and The Board. The Planning Board will request feedback from other Town Departments after receipt of the application but prior to the Public Hearing. The complete application must be reviewed by a qualified engineer at applicants expense. Notice of the public hearing shall be given by publication and posting and by first-class mailings to all abutters at least fourteen (14) calendar days prior to the hearing. The Board shall make the application available for inspection by the public during business hours at Shirley Permit Granting Authority office. All expenses associated with the notice of Public Hearing shall be at the applicant's expense. The Board, at its discretion, may hold concurrent public hearings for other hearings required under state, federal or local law or Bylaws.

Start of Development. Prior to the start of development the following items must be met. 1. There shall be a fourteen (14) twenty one (21) calendar day waiting period from the receipt of decision submitted to the Town Clerk to allow for any appeals of the Permit Granting Authority's procedures and subsequent decision. Any and all appeals shall be rectified before any Start of Development. 2. Building Inspector shall not issue a building permit until appeal period is over.

Or take any action relative thereto.

ARTICLE 18: Revolving Funds Bylaw

To see if the Town will vote pursuant to G.L. c.44, §53E½ to authorize revolving funds for the following departments for Fiscal Year 2018 as set forth below, amend the General Bylaws by inserting the following new bylaw, and establish fiscal year spending limits, all as specified below:

Revolving Funds Bylaw

Section 1. There are hereby established in the Town of Shirley pursuant to the provisions of G.L. c.44, §53E½, the following Revolving Funds, from which the specified department head, board, committee, or officer may incur liabilities against and spend monies from without appropriation in accordance with the limitations set forth in this by-law.

Section 2. Fringe benefits of full-time employees whose salaries or wages are paid from the fund shall also be paid from the fund.

Section 3. No liability shall be incurred in excess of the available balance of the fund.

Section 4. The total amount spent during a fiscal year shall not exceed the amount authorized by Annual Town Meeting or any increase therein as may later be authorized by the Board of Selectmen and Finance Committee in accordance with G.L. c.44, §53E½.

Section 5. Interest earned on monies credited to a revolving fund established by this by-law shall be credited to the General Fund.

Section 7. Procedures and Reports. Except as provided in General Laws Chapter 44, §53E½ and this by-law, all applicable state and local laws and regulations that govern the receipt, custody, expenditure and payment of town funds shall apply to the use of revolving funds established and authorized by this by-law.

Summary: Some of the Town's governmental functions produce enough revenue, through fees, grants, and the like, to support particular expenses. Formerly, the Town had to raise the funds at Town Meeting and then offset the appropriation with estimated receipts. More recently, however, state law has provided for the use of departmental revolving funds, whereby departmental receipts in connection with a particular program are able to be expended for program purposes without further appropriation by Town Meeting. The use such revolving funds is now standard practice in Shirley, with Town Meeting voting annually to establish, for each fund, the purpose for which funds can be

expended, the revenues to be credited, the entity authorized to expend, and the limit on annual expenditures.

While the result is essentially the same, the balancing is demystified. The voter can clearly see how a particular program is being funded, resolving concerns as to whether a particular revenue stream is truly being used to fund the service for which it is received. Use of revolving funds also allows the Town to avoid raising through taxation revenues that prove unnecessary, such as if, for example, participation in a program decreases from the prior year.

With passage of the Municipal Modernization Act, the Town must adopt a general bylaw to establish the funds. For this year only, the Department of Revenue has also recommended that the Town also approve revolving funds in a manner similar to past years, which action was undertaken at the Annual Town Meeting. Note further that in contrast to past years, revolving fund receipts do not include gifts and grants, as, pursuant to G.L. c.44, §53A, such monies must be separately accounted for and can be spent by the recipient of the grant or gift for such purposes without further appropriation.

A majority vote is required for the passage of this article.
