#### <u>April 29, 2013 MEETING MINUTES – OPEN SPACE & RECREATION PLAN</u> <u>COMMITTEE PRESENTATION TO TOWN BOARDS AND COMMITTEES</u>

Time: 7:00-8:30 pm

Presentation was made by Angela Ippolito and Pete Kane. Angela opened the meeting giving background information on the purpose of the OS&RP Committee and the Town's need to revise the existing Open Space plan as well as what the Committee has accomplished to date. She noted that, after doing extensive research, the Committee had developed a list of Goals, out of which came specific Recommendations and a list of Town Committees/Boards affected by the recommendations. Angela used a power point presentation (*attached*) to go over specifics, including the timeline for completion of the revised plan.

Angela requested that the Town Committees and Boards review the entire plan, to see if corrections were needed or if anything else should be added. It was noted that the Committees and Boards have two weeks, until May 14<sup>th</sup>, in which to provide formal comments on the draft plan which should be forwarded by the Committee / Board Chairs.

Angela then when through the six main goals (*see attached power point*). She then opened the meeting to questions.

- One party asked about the status of the Rail-to-Trail in Swampscott to which Marc Barden provided a summary, noting issues relating to property rights claimed by National Grid. Marc explained that the Rail-to-Trail group is attempting to have the Board of Selectman take certain portions of the trail eminent domain, a legal procedure by which land owners are entitled to be compensated. Marc noted that the group would prefer National Grid providing a recreational easement.
- Another question related to Philips Beach being privately owned. Jill Sullivan, Board of Selectmen, explained that there is an article in the Town Warrant to purchase the land from these owners for \$140,000. The land value approximately 30 years ago when this same issue came up was \$100,000. Reasons for the town to purchase the land include: ensuring that a lifeguard can be present; that the DPW can maintain that portion of the beach; and that beach goers in fact can use it for recreational purposes.

- It was asked if there were other areas, in addition to Blythswood, in which conservation easements/restrictions could be sought. Possible areas include Tedesco and wooded portions of the quarry, Marian Court. Participants at the meeting were also invited to suggest property owners that could be approached by the town.
- Angela explained that, in addition to it being a requirement for the town to have plan, it will also open up the town to the possibility of grant opportunities (e.g., PARC grants). Ideally, the plan should be updated every 5 years with the remaining goals reviewed and possibly moved to the top of the "list".
- In response to a question of whether the goals will be prioritized, it was explained that the plan will have a 5 year plan, broken down into what goals/actions can realistically be accomplished in that time period. It is anticipated that the Board of Selectmen will create an Open Space Committee to watch over the plan and work with the responsible parties.
- It was asked why the ocean waters was not included in the plan, only beaches. Noted that this was the type of feedback that the OS&RP Committee is looking for, and that the Harbor Plan that the Harbor Advisory Board is working on may overlap with the Open Space Plan and that there should be coordination of the two. One of the HWAC's many items is having a machine to rake the beach, but there is the issue of where to dispose of the debris (mostly seaweed, with only about 1-2% is trash).

Again, the groups were invited to review and comment on the draft Open Space Plan and provide other recommendations which the Open Space Committee would consider.

# WHAT IS AN OPEN SPACE & RECREATION PLAN?

- ⇒ Open Space and Recreation Plans (OS&RPs) allow communities to look at its entire open space infrastructure and cohesively determine the proper maintenance and enhancements of these assets.
- ⇒ Open space is a significant element in the character and quality of life for a community.

Open space — noun

conservation land, forested land, recreation land, agricultural land, corridor parks, small parks, green buffers along roadways

# BENEFITS OF AN OPEN SPACE & RECREATION PLAN

- ⇒ OS&RPs provide a means for the protection of the "green infrastructure" of a community.
- ⇒ Community is supplied with an outline of priorities to be considered for capital improvements.
- ⇒ Aside from quality of life impacts, open space protection and maintenance also provides economic benefits.
- ⇒ An OS&RP can also assist Swampscott in taking part in the Commonwealth's Greenway Vision (interconnecting parks and green space throughout the state).
- ⇒ Swampscott will be eligible for a number of open space and park grants to aid in the maintenance and creation of these spaces (Self -Help, Urban Self-Help, Land and Water Conservation Funds, etc.).







Such a network will also encourage wildlife passage through the region.

In supporting this goal, Swampscott mirrors residents in the northeast region as a whole, as revealed in the survey "Massachusetts Outdoors 2006: Statewide Comprehensive Outdoor Recreation Plan", in which maintaining existing facilities scored highest of any funding priority. Establishing site specific plans for maintenance, safety and replacement is key to achieving this goal.


