Legal Opinion

Selling or Leasing School Buildings

Ladies and Gentlemen:

You have asked this office for a legal opinion as to the power to sell or to lease school buildings and former school buildings. Apparently, the Superintendent of Schools and members of the School Committee have expressed interest in selling or leasing such buildings as a source of revenue for the support of the school department, while some members of the Municipal Council have questioned the school committee's jurisdiction over these buildings and the power to enter into such arrangements.

These processes are actually a cooperative venture. M. G. L. c. 40, §3 imbues cities and towns with the power to "hold real and personal estate in trust for the support of schools, and for the promotion of education, within the limits of the town." M. G. L. c. 39, §1 grants the powers of towns and town meetings to City Councils. There is nothing in the powers and duties of the School Committee outlined in M. G. L. c. 71, §37 or the powers and duties of the Superintendent as outlined in c. 71, §59 granting any power to own or to alienate real estate. Therefore, it is the City that ultimately owns the real estate and only the Mayor and Municipal Council have the power to sell it. Section 2-40 of the Revised Ordinances of the City of Taunton provides that "other than may otherwise be mandated for by general laws of the Commonwealth, no real estate owned by or in which the City of Taunton claims an interest may be sold, conveyed, gifted, disposed of, leased or otherwise encumbered without approval of the Municipal Council after recommendation of the Council's public property committee and the Mayor."

This is not to say that the School Committee is without power, however. Once a city or town designates property to the jurisdiction of a municipal board, that

board retains jurisdiction until such time as it issues a declaration to the City Council that the property is no longer needed for its originally intended purpose. M. G. L. c. 40, §15A. A statement to the School Building Assistance Authority that a facility will no longer be used to house and educate students does not in and of itself constitute such a declaration. Property being otherwise used or reserved "for the promotion of education" may remain under the School Committee's jurisdiction, even if it is not used for a considerable period of time. *Harris v. Town of Wayland*, 392 Mass. 237, 466 N.E.2d 822 (1984). Therefore, even if the School Committee does not have the power to sell property, it may control the ability of City government to do so.

The School Committee has much more say and benefit in the issue of leasing, but even there it is the Council which ultimately does the leasing and there are restrictions on lease proceeds. A further provision of c. 40, §3 states:

"Notwithstanding the provisions of this section, a city or town, with the approval of the school committee, may rent or lease any school building not in actual use and, with the approval of the commissioner of education, surplus space in a school building in actual use to any one or more public or private profit-making businesses or nonprofit organizations; provided, however, that joint occupancy of a school building in actual use as such shall not interfere with educational programs being conducted in said building. The terms of any such rental or lease shall be as approved by the school committee; provided, however, that no school building not in actual use shall be rented or leased for an initial term longer than ten years, but with renewal options if approved by the school committee."

There is a special provision for the allocation of such rental proceeds:

"The monies received from such rental or lease shall be kept separate and apart from other city or town funds in the city or town treasury and may be expended by the school committee without further appropriation for the upkeep of the facility so rented or surplus space which is so rented; provided, however, that any balance remaining in such account at the close of a fiscal year shall be paid into the General Fund of such city or town; and, provided further, that in any city or town that accepts this proviso, any such balance shall remain in said account and may be expended for the upkeep and maintenance of any facility under the control of the school committee."

Therefore, rental proceeds are restricted to the use for the upkeep of the leased facility, with funds in excess of that reverting to the General Fund. I find no record of the City having adopted the provision that the money may be used for the upkeep

of any facility controlled by the School Committee. In the case of the lease of the former Cohannet School for use as the District Court, the Council and the School Committee acted cooperatively because then Superintendent Donald Cleary and the School Committee saw an opportunity to get the Commonwealth to renovate facilities that they were interested in using as office and special programming space in the future and Mayors Strojny and Nunes made commitments for what would have reverted to the General Fund to go to school funding because of serious shortages in state funding of education as a result of the financial crisis created by the destruction of the World Trade Center on September 11, 2001. If the City were to adopt the provision that funds could go to the upkeep and maintenance of any school department facility, the school department could invest funds into supplies, repairs, and perhaps even salaries of maintenance personnel, which would free up other funds for educational programming.

The School Committee cannot enter into a lease on its own. In the case of <u>Cranberry Growers Service, Inc. v. Town of Duxbury</u>, 415 Mass. 354, 613 N. E. 2d 105 (1993) a town conservation commission on its own initiative attempted to lease land under its jurisdiction to a cranberry grower. The Supreme Judicial Court ruled that that board could not enter into such a lease unless the Board of Selectmen authorized them to do so. The same principles apply to school committees and properties under their jurisdiction, since the authorities of all municipal boards with property under their jurisdictions are governed by the same statute.

The bottom line is that the School Committee cannot independently sell or lease property under its jurisdiction, but neither can the Municipal Council undermine that jurisdiction. Nonuse of a facility or discontinuance of the instructional use of a facility does not remove it from the jurisdiction of the School Committee, even though the facility may no longer qualify as a school, since the facility may be used "in support of education" or, as the court found in the *Harris* case, be reserved for development as an educational facility at a more opportune time. The School Committee's jurisdiction over property may only be released by a formal declaration under c. 40, §15A, only the Mayor and Council can actually sell municipal real estate, and leases of school committee property must be effected by the Mayor and Council, but only with the permission of the School Committee.

I hope that this clarifies lines of authority for all parties concerned.

Re: Cost-of-living adjustment (COLA) base

Dear Mayor Crowley and Councilors:

As you may or may not be aware, retired public employees have a cap on the calculation of cost-of-living adjustments (COLA's) that they can receive. Currently, the cap or BASE is \$12,000 which means a retiree's COLA can only be applied up to the first \$12,000 of their respective allowance.

Recently, a change to the COLA law was passed under Chapter 188 of the Acts of 2010 that added MGL c. 32, §103(j) to allow for an increase in the COLA base in multiples of \$1,000. In order to adopt any increase, Chapter 188 states in part "...Each increase in the maximum base amount shall be accepted by a majority vote of the board of such system, subject to approval of the legislative body."

At it's meeting on September 24, 2010, the retirement board met with its actuarial consultant to study the impact of adopting an increase of the COLA base from \$12,000 to \$14,000. If increased to \$14,000, retirees would receive an increased COLA of no more than \$5.00 per month and the cost to the retirement system would be approximately 2% of the pension appropriation and could be spread over the life of the funding schedule to reduce the fiscal impact on the city's budget.

After review of all information, the retirement board voted to increase the COLA base to \$14,000 under section 103(j) and requests concurrent action by the city council.

- (c) If a schedule established under this section would result in an appropriation in the first fiscal year of the schedule that is greater than 8 per cent more than the appropriation in the previous fiscal year, the requirement of clause (2) of subsection (a) may be adjusted with the approval of the public employee retirement administration commission.
- (d) Systems may establish a schedule under this section that provides for an increase in the maximum base amount on which the cost-of-living adjustment is calculated pursuant to section 103, in multiples of \$1,000. Acceptance of this subsection shall be in accordance with paragraph (j) of section 103.

SECTION 19. Section 103 of said chapter 32, as so appearing is hereby amended by adding the following paragraph: -

(j) Notwithstanding paragraph (a), the board of any system that establishes a schedule pursuant to section 22D or 22F, may increase the maximum base amount on which the cost-of-living adjustment is calculated, in multiples of \$1,000. Each increase in the maximum base amount shall be accepted by a majority vote of the board of such system, subject to the approval of the legislative body. For the purpose of this section, "legislative body" shall mean, in the case of a city, the city council in accordance with its charter, in the case of a town, the town meeting, in the case of a district, the district members, and, in the case of an authority, the governing body. In the case of a county or region, acceptance shall be by the county or regional retirement board advisory council at a meeting called for that purpose by the county or regional retirement board that shall notify council members at least 60 days before the meeting. Upon receiving notice, the treasurer of a town belonging to the county or regional retirement system shall make a presentation to the town's chief executive officer, as defined in paragraph (c) of subdivision (8) of section 22, regarding the impact of the increase in the cost-of-living adjustment base, the failure of which by a treasurer shall not impede or otherwise nullify the vote by the advisory council. Acceptance of an increase in the maximum base amount shall be deemed to have occurred upon the filing of the certification of such vote with the commission. A decision to accept an increase in the maximum base amount may not be revoked.

SECTION 71. The first actuarial valuation to be conducted pursuant to the second paragraph of paragraph (f) of subdivision (3) of section 21 chapter 32 of the General Laws, as appearing in section 16, shall be completed by January 1, 2011, or by January 1 of the third year following the last actuarial valuation of the system, whichever first occurs.

TAUNTON—Wetlands Settlement Agreement – Confirmation of Completion of Work Under Paragraphs 6 & 7 of the Settlement Agreement

Dear Mr. O'Bara and Mr. Olivieri:

On September 22, 2009, Help Save the Lake, Inc. (HSTL) entered into a Settlement Agreement (the "Agreement") with the Commonwealth of Massachusetts (the "Commonwealth"), acting through the Attorney General and the Massachusetts Department of Environmental Protection (the "Department"). Under Section II, paragraph 6 of the Agreement HSTL agreed to modify the temporary dam at the outlet of Lake Sabbatia by removing sixteen (16) blocks from the lowest section of the upper course of the temporary dam once the water level in Lake Sabbatia falls to a level that is approximately 6 to 9 inches above the top of the lower level of blocks of the lowest section of the structure.

As you know, the water level never receded to the above-referenced level during the summer and early fall of 2009 because wet conditions persisted throughout that time period. As a result, HSTL implemented the alternative provisions of Section II, paragraph 9and successfully installed a second water control gate on October 2, 2009. In accordance with the Agreement, HSTL submitted a set of color photographs on a CD to the Department documenting the work.

In July of 2010 the desired water level was reached. As required by the Agreement, on July 20, 2010, HSTL removed the remaining fourteen (14) blocks from the upper section of the lowest section of the temporary dam. Due to site constraints, the Department authorized HSTL to store the removed blocks in two locations at the site as opposed to at the single location that the Parties had previously agreed upon. The Department approved this methodology in the field on the day of the work and allowed HSTL to store six (6) blocks on the east side down gradient from the temporary dam and set back from the down gradient bridge abutments in a location that should not impede water flow. By this letter, the Department is formally acknowledging its approval of this second storage location for the removed blocks. In accordance with the Agreement, HSTL submitted a set of color photographs on a CD to the Department documenting the work.

By performing this work and providing photo documentation, the Department hereby confirms that HSTL has completed the work required by paragraphs 6 and 7 of Section II of the Agreement.

Please be advised that the terms of paragraph 11 remain in effect. Specifically, that paragraph provides:

If care and maintenance of the temporary dam is necessary due to the detection of substantial deterioration prior to the date the temporary dam is removed, or the temporary dam becomes the subject of a validly issued permit, authorization, or certification of the Department, whichever is earlier, then HSTL agrees to return to the project location and to perform work reasonably necessary to alleviate the deterioration. In such case, prior to the performance of any work, HSTL shall coordinate with the Department for the Department to issue an Emergency Certification, if one is necessary, and the Department will make itself available to discuss and inspect any work, and will thereafter issue any letters to indicate whether the work was completed as discussed.

Grampy's annual sales also reported 500,000-1 million in revenue, employs 5-9 staff, sic code(variety store)533101/naics code(all other general merchandise stores)452990. The owners of Grampy's could well afford a paid detail to remain open in these dire economic times, yet when addressed by the Council on September 28,2010, implored all who were present to understand their financial difficulties.

We, the Weir Street Crime Watch Neighborhood STAY THE COURSE in our demand that Grampy's BE DENIED their Petilion to remain open 1am-4am to keep our neighborhood Safe, Non-Violent, Drug Free and Peaceful.
