In the Year One Thousand Nine Hundred and Ninety

AN ACT AUTHORIZING CITIES AND TOWNS TO ESTABLISH CERTAIN REVOLVING FUNDS.

Whereas, The deferred operation of this act would tend to defeat its purpose, which is to immediately provide for revolving funds in cities and towns; therefore it is hereby declared to be an emergency law, necessary for the immediate preservation of the public convenience.

Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representatives in General Court assembled, and by the authority of the same, as follows:-

SECTION 1. Chapter 44 of the General Laws is hereby amended by inserting after section 53E, as appearing in the 1988 Official Edition, the following section:-

Section 53E]. Notwithstanding the provisions of section fifty-three, a city or town may, annually authorize the use of one or more revolving funds by one or more municipal agency, board, department or office which shall be accounted for separately from all other monies in such city or town and to which shall be credited only the departmental receipts received in connection with the programs supported by such revolving fund. Expenditures may be made from such revolving fund without further appropriation, subject to the provisions of this section; provided, however, that expenditures shall not be made or liabilities incurred from any such revolving fund in excess of the balance of the fund nor in excess of the total authorized expenditures from such fund, nor shall any expenditures be made unless approved in accordance with sections forty-one, forty-two, fifty-two and fifty-six of chapter forty-one.

Interest earned on any revolving fund balance shall be treated as general fund revenue of the city or town. No revolving fund may be established pursuant to this section for receipts of a municipal water or sewer department or of a municipal hospital. No such revolving fund may be established if the aggregate limit of all revolving funds authorized under this section exceeds ten percent of the amount raised by taxation by the city or town in the most recent fiscal year for which a tax rate has been certified under section

twenty-three of chapter fifty-nine. No revolving fund expenditures shall be made for the purpose of paying any wages or salaries for full time employees.

A revolving fund established under the provisions of this section shall be by vote of the annual town meeting in a town, upon recommendation of the board of selectmen, and by vote of the city council in a city, upon recommendation of the mayor or city manager, in Plan E cities, and in any other city or town by vote of the legislative body upon the recommendation of the chief administrative or executive officer. Such authorization shall be made annually prior to each respective fiscal year; provided, however, that each authorization for a revolving fund shall specify: (1) the programs and purposes for which the revolving fund may be expended; (2) the departmental receipts which shall be credited to the revolving fund; (3) the board, department or officer authorized to expend from such fund; (4) a limit on the total amount which may be expended from such fund in the ensuing fiscal year; and, provided, further, that no board, department or officer shall be authorized to expend in any one fiscal year from all revolving funds under its direct control more than one percent of the amount raised by taxation by the city or town in the most recent fiscal year for which a tax rate has been certified under section twenty-three of chapter fifty-nine.

In any fiscal year the limit on the amount that may be spent from a revolving fund may be increased with the approval of the city council and mayor in a city, or with the approval of the selectmen and finance committee, if any, in a town; provided, however, that the one percent limit established by clause (4) of the third paragraph is not exceeded.

The board, department or officer having charge of such revolving fund shall report to the annual town meeting or to the city council and the board of selectmen, the mayor of a city or city manager in a Plan E city or in any other city or town to the legislative body and the chief administrative or executive officer, the total amount of receipts and expenditures for each revolving fund under its control for the prior fiscal year and for the current fiscal year through December thirty-first, or such later date as the town meeting or city council may, by vote determine, and the amount of any increase in spending authority granted during the prior and current fiscal years, together with such other information as the town meeting or city council may by vote require.

At the close of a fiscal year in which a revolving fund is not reauthorized for the following year, or in which a city or town changes the purposes for which money in a revolving fund may be spent in the following year, the balance in the fund at the end of the fiscal year shall revert to surplus revenue unless the annual town meeting or the city council and mayor or city manager in a Plan E city and in any other city or town the legislative body vote to transfer such balance to another revolving fund established under this section.

The director of accounts may issue guidelines further regulating revolving funds established under this section.

SECTION 2. For the purposes of establishing a revolving fund under the provisions of this act during fiscal year nineteen hundred and ninety-one, a town by majority vote of a special town meeting in a town, upon recommendation of the board of selectmen, or by vote of the city council in a city, upon recommendation of the mayor or city manager, in a Plan E city, and in any other city or town by vote of the legislative body, upon recommendation of the chief administrative or executive officer, may authorize the use of a revolving fund during said fiscal year; provided, however, that prior to such vote the finance committee in a town and the auditor or chief financial officer in a city designated by special law, General Law or ordinance, certifies to the assessors that the estimated revenue of the proposed revolving fund has not been used as a local estimated receipt, offset receipt, enterprise revenue or otherwise within the city or town's fiscal nineteen hundred and ninety-one appropriations.

I am writing to request Taunton's approval for athletes to ride their bikes on a segment of Rte 79/Myricks Road in Taunton during the Cranberry Trifest Sprint distance triathlon scheduled for Saturday, August 22, 2015. 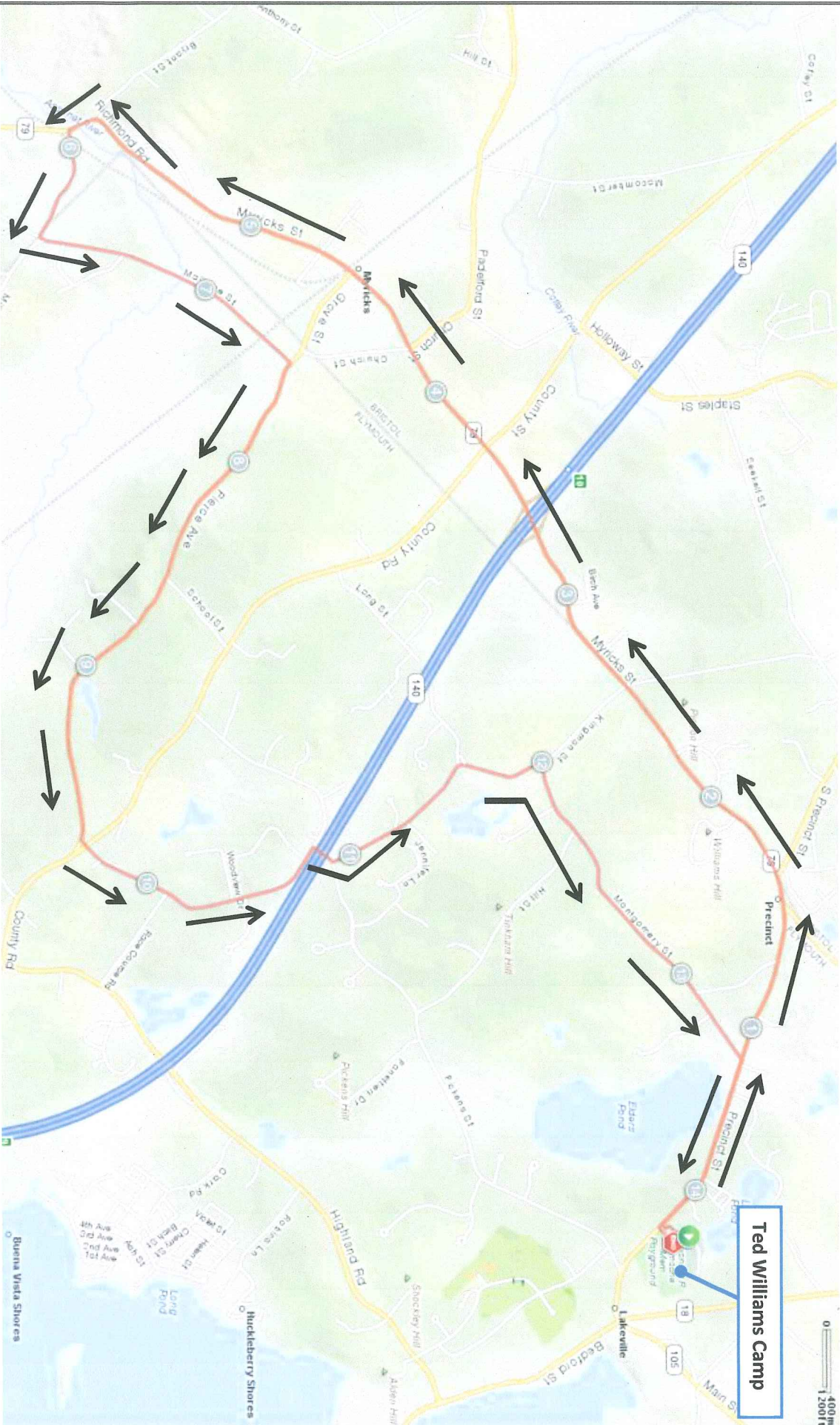

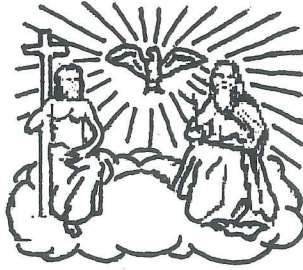

Re: 2014 Sewer Use Ordinance (SUO) Change Request

Dear Fred,

This letter is intended to request that the Taunton Sewer Use Ordinance (SUO) be modified to remove the language from Section 19.23.1(6) pertaining to the 5 mg/l limit for total petroleum hydrocarbons (TPHs).

A request was sent to the EPA requesting that a public notice be posted with the required 30-day comment period. The EPA then generated the posting, which was then submitted to the Taunton Gazette and included in the October 7, 2014, issue. The EPA did not receive any comments during this period, thereby issuing Veolia a letter of approval for the modification to the SUO (see attached).

Also attached are the previous version of Section 19.23.1, with the modification language highlighted in yellow, and the requested version with the language omitted. This change request will need to be read before the City Council in order to gain approval and then the SUO can be modified and submitted as final.

TPH – Questions and Answers

What does TPH stand for?

Total Petroleum Hydrocarbons

Do other Industrial Pretreatment communities within USEPA Region 1 have a TPH limit?

No. Taunton is the only IPP program out of approximately 75 that have a TPH limit in the Sewer Use Ordinance.

Why is there a TPH limit in the Taunton Sewer Use Ordinance?

Taunton’s TPH limit was first identified in the May 31, 1994 Sewer Use Ordinance. Since then, a “local limits” evaluation was completed in 1996 using USEPA’s “Technically Based Local Limits Development.” TPH was not included in this “local limits” study and, therefore, limits were not set in this study. The assumption is that TPH was written into the Sewer Use Ordinance because, at that time, there was no effective FOG program in place.

What would protect the sewer collection system and wastewater treatment plant from petroleum-based chemicals?

Taunton has an extremely effective and well-run Fats, Oils, and Grease (FOG) program which monitors and controls petroleum products discharge.

Does the current TPH limit prevent NPDES permit violations?

No. The Taunton WWTP NPDES permit does not contain a TPH limit.

How does removing the 5 mg/l TPH limit affect the sewer system and WWTP?

Removal of the limit from the Taunton Sewer Use Ordinance would not affect the sewer system or the WWTP. The wording pertaining to “amounts that will cause interference or pass through” will remain in the Sewer Use Ordinance.

Has the EPA approved this change to the Taunton Sewer Use Ordinance?

Yes. In a letter dated November 10, 2014, from Mark Spinale, EPA Manager of the Municipal Assistance Unit for Region 1, the EPA approved the removal of the 5 mg/l limit from the Taunton Sewer Use Ordinance. The letter was received after the change to the ordinance was posted in the Taunton Gazette on October 7, 2014, for a 30-day comment period. No comments were received.

Why should this be changed?

To reduce the annual sample testing costs associated with this limit. Also, the industries that contribute to the Taunton sewer system are unfairly being issued Notices of Violation and potentially fines for a limit that should not be assessed.

On January 28, 1981, the United States Environmental Protection Agency (EPA) promulgated the General Pretreatment Regulations at 40 C.F.R. Part 403. These Regulations mandated by the Clean Water Act, 33 U.S.C. 1251 et seq., govern the control of industrial waste introduced into municipal sewage treatment plants.

Pursuant to the General Pretreatment Regulations, the applicant has submitted a request for approval of modifications to its Industrial Pretreatment Program. The proposed modifications consist of removal of the following language from its approved Sewer Use Ordinance under Section 19.23.1 Prohibited Discharge Standards:

"(6) Petroleum, oil, nonbiodegradable cutting oil, products of mineral oil origin, or any other oil, in excess of 5 mg/l or in amounts that will cause interference or pass through;"

As specified in 40 CFR 403.18, program modification is necessary whenever there is a significant change in the operation of a POTW Pretreatment

Program that differs from the information in the POTW's submission, as approved under 403.11. In this particular case, there is a modification that would relax a local limitation. Prior to making a final decision of approval on this request, the Regional Administrator of EPA is providing an opportunity for public comment on the proposed modifications for the City of Taunton's Industrial Pretreatment Program. 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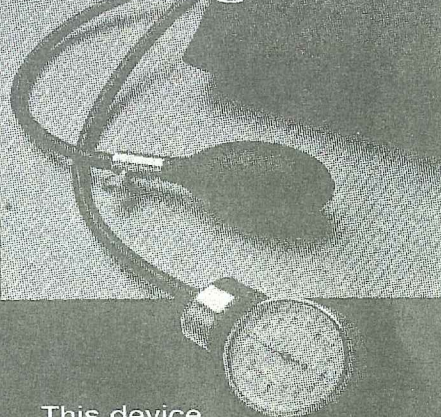

Chapter 19

SEWERS AND DRAINS*

19.23 – General Sewer Use Requirements

19.23.1 Prohibited Discharge Standards

A. General prohibitions: No user shall introduce or cause to be introduced into the POTW any pollutant or wastewater which causes pass through or interference. These general prohibitions apply to users of the POTW whether or not they are subject to categorical pretreatment standards or any other National, State, or local pretreatment standards or requirements.

B. Specific Prohibitions: No user shall introduce or cause to be introduced into the POTW the following pollutants substances, or wastewater:

(1) Pollutants which create a fire or explosive hazard in the POTW, including, but not limited to, wastestreams with a closed-cup flashpoint of less than 140 degrees F (60 degrees C) using the test methods specified in 40 CFR 261.21;

(2) Wastewater having a pH less than 5.5 or otherwise causing corrosive structural damage to the POTW or equipment. If a continuous pH chart recorder is being used, any occurrence of pH over 9.5 but under 10.5 for a period of thirty minutes or more per day is prohibited. Any occurrence of pH between 10.5 and 11.0 for more than fifteen minutes per day is prohibited. Any pH occurrence over 11.0 is prohibited. If a continuous pH chart recorder is not being used, any occurrence of pH over 9.5 is prohibited. At no time shall any discharge cause the pH of the influent at the POTW head works to go above 9.5.

(3) Solid or viscous substances in amounts which will cause obstruction of the flow in the POTW resulting in interference (but in no case solids greater than 1/2 inch(es) 1 1/2") or (3.39 centimeter(s) (0.39 cm)) in any dimension;

(4) Pollutants, including oxygen demanding pollutants (BOD, etc.), released in a discharge at a flow rate and/or pollutant concentration which, either singly or by interaction with other pollutants, will cause interference with the POTW;

(5) Wastewater having a temperature greater than (150 degrees F or 65 degrees C) or which will inhibit biological activity in the treatment plant resulting in interference but in no case wastewater which causes the temperature at the introduction into the treatment plant to exceed 104 degrees F (40 degrees C);

(6) Petroleum, oil, nonbiodegradable cutting oil, products of mineral oil origin, or any other oil, in excess of 5 mg/l or in amounts that will cause interference or pass through;

(7) Pollutants which result in the presence of toxic gases, vapors, or fumes within the POTW in a quantity that may cause acute worker health and safety problems;

(8) Trucked or hauled pollutants, except at discharge points designated by the City in accordance with section 19.24.4;

(9) Noxious or malodorous liquids, gases, solids, or other wastewater which, either singly or by interaction with other wastes, are sufficient to create a public nuisance or a hazard to life, or to prevent entry into the sewers for maintenance or repair;

(10) Wastewater which impart a Color which cannot be removed by the treatment process, such as, but not limited to, dye wastes and vegetable tanning solutions, which consequently imparts color to the treatment plant's effluent, thereby violating the City's NPDES permit. Color (in combination with turbidity) shall not cause the treatment plant effluent to reduce the depth of the compensation point for photosynthetic activity by more than ten percent (10%) from the seasonably established norm for aquatic life;

(11) Wastewater containing any radioactive wastes or isotopes except as specifically approved by the Commissioner in compliance with applicable State or Federal regulations;

(12) Storm water, surface water, ground water, artesian well water, roof runoff, subsurface drainage, swimming pool drainage, condensate, deionized water, noncontact cooling water, and unpolluted wastewater, unless specifically authorize by the Commissioner;

- (13) Sludges, screenings, or other residues from the pretreatment of industrial wastes;
 - (14) Medical wastes, except as specifically authorized by the Commissioner in a wastewater discharge permit;
 - (15) Wastewater causing, alone or in conjunction with other sources, the treatment plant's effluent to fail a toxicity test;
 - (16) Detergents, surface-active agents, or other substances which may cause excessive foaming in the POTW;
 - (17) Hazardous Waste or Wastewater resulting from treatment of hazardous or Toxic wastes, as designated under State and Federal law, and discharged to the POTW by dedicated pipe, truck
 - (18) Septage or septage byproducts from haulers or other dischargers except as specifically approved by the Commissioner.
 - (19) Waters or wastes containing fats, wax, grease or oils, not specifically prohibited in Section 19.23.1(B)(6), in excess of 100 mg/l or containing other substances which may solidify or become viscous between 32 degrees Fahrenheit or 0 degrees Centigrade, and 150 degrees Fahrenheit or 65 degrees Centigrade. Waters or wastes containing such substances, excluding normal household wastes, shall exclude all visible floating oils, fats and greases. The use of chemical or physical means to bypass or release fats, oils and greases into the POTW is prohibited.
- Pollutants, substances, or wastewater prohibited by this section shall not be processed or stored in such a manner that they could be discharged to the POTW.

In accordance with 40 CFR 403.18 (b)(2), I am writing to request a substantial modification to the City of Taunton's Industrial Pretreatment Program. The City of Taunton's local limits development document was completed on 4/22/96 and approved by the EPA on 5/29/97. Within this document there is no mention of a limit for Total Petroleum Hydrocarbons (TPH). At present, the Significant Industrial Users discharging to the Taunton POTW are subject to a concentration-based limit of 5 mg/L TPH. Due to the limit being arbitrary and not included in the Technically Based Local Limits Development document, I request that the 5 mg/L limit for TPH be eliminated from the Industrial Pretreatment Program.



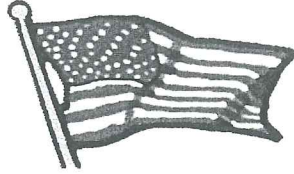


