RE: REVISED TRANSIT BONUS AWARDS

Dear Mr. Hayes:

Please disregard the Transit Bonus letter dated 6/4/12. Due to a municipality reporting error, the amount previously awarded to you has changed.

The Department of Transportation received thirty Transit Bonus certifications for a total of \$2,455,203.19. The total of qualifying certifications for reimbursement exceeded the \$590,000 in annual funding dedicated for the Transit Bonus Payment Program. Therefore, the funds will be apportioned according to the amount of each municipality's increase for qualifying expenditures.

- Amount available is 0.24 % of the total request
- Town of Veazie requested \$13,113.90; and will receive \$3,151 in FY 2013

The Transit Bonus Payment Program funds will be added and disbursed to the municipalities' allocated URIP amount for FY 2013 paid in the regular URIP process, and used for URIP purposes.



#### Number of votes

Re:

Most municipalities are asked to vote for two candidates, because there are two elected LPC members for most districts. Some municipalities only vote for one candidate, because the other LPC member in that district is appointed. You are instructed on the ballot (above the list of candidates) whether to vote for two candidates or just one.

### Candidate profiles

If you are not familiar with any of the candidates, please review the Candidate Profiles on the back of the ballot. Feel free, also, to contact the candidates directly.

#### Write-in candidates

In addition to the candidates listed on the ballot, you may vote for a candidate whose name you write in. The write-in candidate need not be from your municipality, but must be an elected or appointed official from a municipality in your Senate/LPC district. 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# **MEMO**

Date: June 25, 2012

At your request, we have reviewed the three paving bids submitted to the Town for work on Main Street and Riverview Street. It appears that the Town has solicited pricing from three area contractors for paving the two streets. Bids were submitted by Lane Construction, Pike Industries, and B and B Paving.

As you know, we communicated recently and provided you with our recommendations for Main Street improvements. Our recommendations included grinding pavement layers down to approximately a 3-inch depth and replacing with 3-inches of bituminous pavement. We recommended removing approximately 200 linear feet of concrete road base, which was the only amount of concrete beneath the road, as reported to us by MaineDOT. We also let you know that we did recommend installing an underdrain system along much of the section of Main Street from the Town Office to the Railroad Tracks heading north toward Orono. Our comment to you was that we did realize that this was a recommendation made a few years ago and since that time Lou Silver, Inc. had performed some work to improve the drainage system. We did not direct that work and do not know what was performed.

It appears the Town solicited pricing based on the assumption that the Contractors would provide the scope of work and associated quantity estimates, based on general directions provided by Town staff. This type of a Bid scenario has created a significant inequity between the three bidders and as such, comparison of Bids is difficult to conduct. For instance, B and B Paving provided a unit price for 1½-inches of milling and a unit price for 1½-inches of pavement to be placed on Main Street. Because the other two bidders assumed 3-inches of pavement, the price for B and B to perform the same scope could be higher or lower but given that their unit pricing is based on less thickness, we cannot assume either way.

The following Table identifies the payment items that CES believes should be part of the Main Street project. We have provided columns for each of the three bidders and have placed an X in each corresponding item that was included with each individual Bidder.

As is seen above, Lane Construction provided the most complete bid in terms of the work scope required to complete the project. In order for B and B Paving or Pike Industries to produce the same amount of work as Lane, the actual price to complete, or resulting actual cost paid by the Town could be different than presented.

With respect to the project on Riverview Street, it should be pointed out that CES did not recommend this approach. Our approach was to investigate the ability to perform full depth reconstruction, install a drainage system, and then pave the road. Drainage is a concern that must be addressed when considering improvements to this road. Given the apparent narrow right of way widths and the fact that ditches do not currently exist, building an adequate drainage system may be a challenge.

It appears that the Town has not been protected against workmanship issues arising from poor performance given that we could find no reference to the Contractor being required to furnish a Performance or a Payment Bond. A \$200,000 investment is significant enough to consider having protection against faulty workmanship or inability for a contractor to complete the project. A discussion should be had surrounding the level of risk the Town is willing to incur for a project of this size.

Another point of concern is that the pricing from B and B Paving and Pike Industries is based on their Terms. These Terms appear more favorable for the Contractor. There is also no protection for the Town if the Contractor's estimates are wrong. The Terms clearly indicate the quantities are estimates and any overage will result in the Town owing them the full amount due. There are no controls in place to protect the Town based on the information we have reviewed.

At this time, our recommendation would be to create a Bid Package that would include at a minimum the need to provide Performance and Payment Bonds, and a Bid Form that will provide the Town the ability to compare all bids. This would include providing for the exact scope items required of each Bidder. We would also recommend the Town solicit pricing utilizing Contract Documents more favorable to the Town and less favorable to the Contractor. This procedure is what has been followed on the last several similar construction projects performed in Town.
