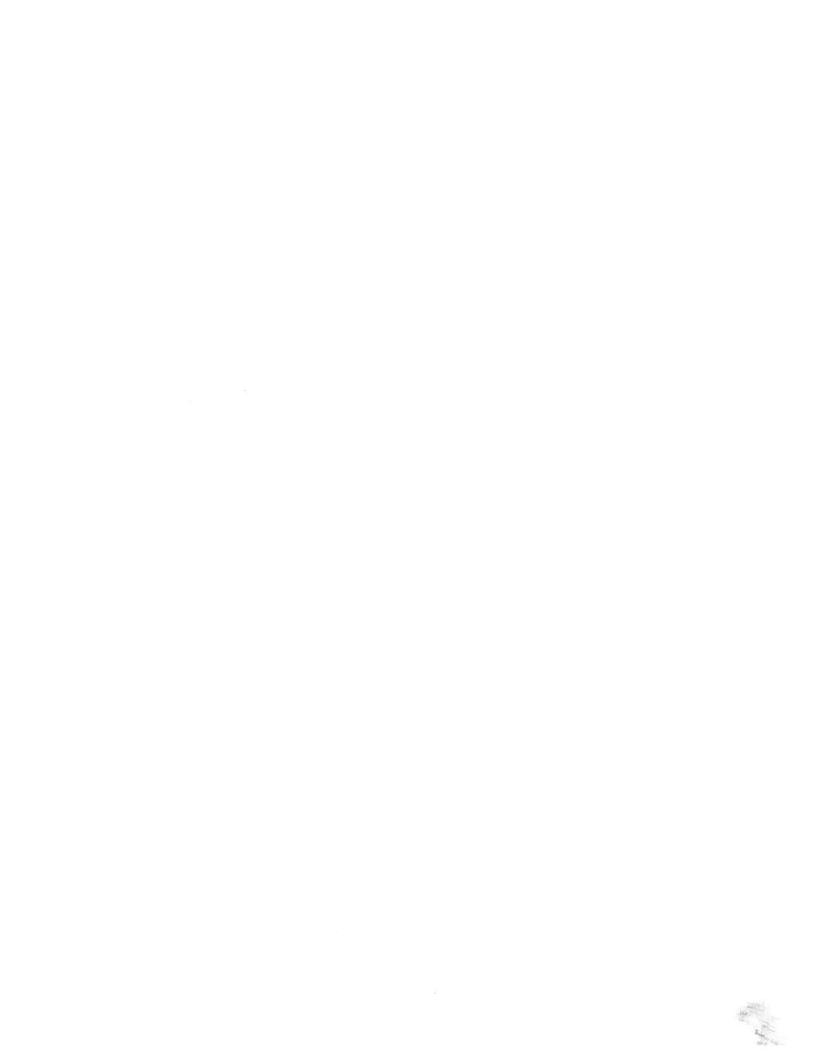

Highway Capital Paving Proposals

Below are budget numbers for suggested paving projects for FY 2016-2017. The suggested roads and pricing are as follows:

Old County Road: \$31,280.00

2. Prouty Drive to include Penobscot Circle: \$59,238.00

Highview Drive: \$29,900.00

4. Mt View: \$37,000.00

Chase Road from Mt View to Town Line: \$33,025.00

6. Brookside and Wood Lane: \$34,120.00

7. Jackson Drive from box 20 to intersection of Buck Hill Extension: \$28,086.00

Total: \$252,649.00

This is a very aggressive paving list but with the current paving prices I feel now is the time to take advantage of the pricing and tackle a large number of roads. This will not resolve all of our paving issues but it will bring us much closer than we were only a few years ago. To accomplish this I recommend that in addition to the \$150,000.00 we are requesting at the Town meeting, we transfer an additional \$100,000.00 from the undesignated account into the highway capital account. We currently have nearly \$700,000.00 in the undesignated account which doesn't include and potential carryover that may be added from FY 15/16.

As you will recall last year we purchased road maintenance software which I was working with this year until the program updated and did not reinstall last year's information as it was supposed to do. I will be working with the software vendor to re-populate the data, but at the time of this memo I'm unable to provide you with that information.

Attached is the proposed work and pricing schedule from both Lou Silver and Hopkins.

Veazie Community Center Redevelopment Advisory Committee

Summary Report on Potential First Floor Renovations

Executive Summary/Action Items

The Veazie Community Center Redevelopment Advisory Committee believes that making the first floor of the Community Center usable is feasible and would be a substantial benefit to the Town. We recommend a minimalist approach, using the existing modest footprint and structure, and requiring a minimum of investment. We recommend the following action items:

• Begin the renovations by bringing the first floor space up to code. This will enable an increase in community usage as rapidly as possible. These code improvements include installation of a sprinkler system in the entire building and accessibility improvements for the entrance and restrooms. The Fire Marshal has indicated the building must have a sprinkler system. Additionally, the building must be updated to meet ADA requirements. We have worked with WBRC to develop a plan which has identified the minimum improvements required to meet these requirements and open the building to the general public. Funding for this work would come from the Tax Increment Financing fund, and would not be paid by the residential taxpayer.

We recommend the lowest cost method to make the building usable. It is technically feasible to make the first floor into a high quality facility, but the cost is high. A minimalist approach serves several key functions: it adds value to the building; it allows the public into the building, to test the usage of the building; and the smaller scope will make it easier to contain costs.

Summary

The Veazie Community Center Redevelopment Advisory Committee was established to evaluate the renovation of the Community Center building. The Committee has held many meetings for the purpose of gathering public input, raising funds, and facilitating the renovation. Significant progress has been made. The Town has received five grants as well as both cash and in-kind donations for the building. Concept drawings have been developed, windows and doors replaced, the building insulated and heated with a new furnace. This report summarizes the history of the Committee and key activities and accomplishments, describes our major findings, and presents a feasible path forward for the Town.

The consensus of the Committee is that a modest Veazie community center would provide an improved quality of life for town residents. Many people have noted that Veazie lacks a town center, and an informal, public meeting space for adults and teens. In general, the ideas and comments provided by town residents reflect that the building should offer benefits to all age groups, and serve a variety of needs. Veazie residents have many ideas as to what uses the building might fulfill. In general, most people think the building ought to be multi-use, which is a blend of public and private use. Some ideas are pure recreation, while other ideas are a potential money-maker for the town. Many believe that a blend of the two would be best.

People are aware of the potential redevelopment costs, but they note that other towns have small community centers, libraries, or grange halls, or similar facilities. For many long time Veazie residents, they utilized the Community Center as children. They fondly remember the building, and they recognize that the renovation of the building will take time and money. Residents also want to minimize tax burden, which makes obtaining grant funding an attractive option. In general, many residents would support a building that roughly broke even, in terms of cost.

Various people and organizations have evaluated the building. The general consensus is that while it was initially well-constructed, significant portions of the building are obsolete. The building will require construction upgrades to bring it to the appropriate building code requirements. Better access, ADA compliant bathrooms and access, and a sprinkler system are among the primary needs. When the Committee was formed, the building was believed to have no value. Various entities had looked at the building, but the combination of small site footprint, substantial needed repairs, and non-compliance with various codes prevented sale of the building. It had languished for more than a decade. It was leased to the Eastern Maine School of Self Defense, partly as a way to keep the building functioning. Over the last few years, grant funds have improved the building, making it less costly to operate. Reduced operating costs, along with an increase in the lease rate paid by the tenant, mean that the building is now operating nearer to breakeven.

The Town Council requested that the Community Center Redevelopment Advisory Committee evaluate options for improving the first floor of the building. In order to evaluate different options, the committee worked with WBRC. In this report, we present two options to accomplish that goal. The first is the basic option, the minimalist approach which allows access to the first floor. The second is a high quality option to renovate the downstairs into a premium space.

Minimalist Approach

WBRC has recently provided an estimate for a minimalist approach for making the first floor usable to the general public. The total estimate to get the building usable is approximately \$72,000. Note that these funds could be available from the Tax Increment Financing fund, and would not be borne by Veazie's residential taxpayers. The scope of this minimalist approach includes installing a sprinkler system in the entire building and making accessibility improvements to the main entrance and restrooms. We note that there is currently roughly \$400,000 in the TIF fund, which will soon increase to nearly \$500,000. WBRC's estimate appears in Table 1. Note that the existing users have been grandfathered, but these upgrades are required for any new users of the building. The Fire Marshal has determined that the entire building must be served by a sprinkler. Additionally, the building must meet ADA and access requirements.

High Quality Renovation

WBRC recently provided an estimate to complete full renovation to most of the first floor to create a high quality space that would be inviting to any interested user. The estimated cost to complete this work is approximately \$450,000. The scope of this work includes installation of a building sprinkler system, complete gut of the ground floor except the kitchen, boiler room and stair well area. The improvements include new bathrooms, fully renovated meeting rooms, and commercial kitchen with exhaust hood; new walls and ceilings, electrical wiring, light fixtures and heating distribution.

Conclusion

The building is somewhat small, and limiting the renovations to the first floor using a minimalist approach would control renovation costs while allowing access and use of the building by the town. This will allow the townspeople to have a voice in determining the future direction of the redevelopment efforts by how they choose to use the facility once it is available. We recommend that the Town redevelop the building as a small, multi-use Community Center. The redevelopment process should occur at a reasonable pace and provide for a mix of revenue generating and recreational activities for everyone. Costs should be minimized through the use of grants, TIF funds, and by using volunteer assistance. Renovation will require perseverance, but there is no reason to believe that Veazie would be less successful than any other town in renovating an older building. Ongoing support and assistance will be required by town residents. Town residents are willing to volunteer their time, if they feel the project improves the community and the process will be productive and enjoyable.

Appendix A: Public Input

At the beginning of the process, the volunteer committee solicited public comment by holding four general public meetings as well as reaching out to the community's civic groups such as the Veazie PTO, senior group, garden club, recreation department, Eastern Maine School of Self Defense, Conservation commission, ski club, Old Town and Orono Recreation Departments, and the planning board. Additionally, an open forum was held to solicit input. What resulted was the solicitation of ideas from over 150 residents in a community of about 1,900 people.

The overwhelming sentiment of the residents was that the facility should be a multi-functional community center that included space for, among other uses: a farmer's market, a supervised teens and children study groups and activities, community dances, reception hall that residents can rent out for parties and other family functions, a book swap, clothing swap, theatre group, a drop in play group for small children and other like uses. The community also supported using the space upstairs to rent out for dance classes, yoga and other exercise classes. The general consensus was to serve the whole community, including seniors, other adults, and children. The specific ideas presented by town residents appears below.

We recognize that the Community Center is a small project in terms of the Town. The building itself is relatively small. The downstairs consists largely of two rooms and the kitchen. Additionally, the net cost from an ongoing operational perspective is small. Any net cost could be easily overcome by fundraising and potential exterior rental (e,g, yard sales, farmer's market).

In addition to the uses listed above, other ideas have surfaced during various meetings. For instance, one idea has been to use the parking area for a farmer's market. The Community Center is near the town garden area.

Another idea has been to use a room, or antechamber, to house historic items related to the Veazie Dam.

Finally, the siren on the top of the Community Center building has some history, and people have indicated it should be displayed downstairs.

We anticipate that more ideas will come forward as the building is renovated.

Appendix B: Financing

The Community Center Redevelopment Advisory Committee has been successful in securing initial financing. Initial fundraising has focused on improving the energy efficiency of the building, gathering input from the public, and developing initial drawings. Sources of funding include:

- 1) A \$3,000 grant from the Maine Community Foundation, which was used to develop the initial drawings, as well as to provide some assistance from EMDC with strategic planning.
- 2) An \$8,500 ARRA federal grant. This grant was originally administered by Maine Public Utilities Commission. It was pass-through from the American Recovery and Reinvestment Act of 2009. This was matched by roughly \$9,000 from the Community Center reserve account. The primary purpose of this grant was to improve energy efficiency of the building. This grant focused on replacement of nearly all the windows in the building as well as some lighting improvements.
- 3) A \$30,000 ARRA federal block grant. This grant was originally administered by Efficiency Maine. It was pass-through from the American Recovery and Reinvestment Act of 2009. The primary purpose of this grant was to replace the boiler and convert to propane, insulate the building, and replace doors.
- 4) Brownfield grant. This grant covered costs for consultants to examine the site and building for various sorts of contamination, such as lead paint and asbestos.
- 5) A \$2,500 grant from the Machais Savings Bank to paint the building.
- 6) Miscellaneous fundraising: The Community Center Committee and the Town of Veazie Recreation Department held a Veazie Days event in 2009. Events included a 5K, yard sale, pancake breakfast, pie baking contest, and a barbeque. Additionally, donations from local businesses were received. Total raised from these sources was in the range of \$925. Roughly \$500 of these funds were used for signage.
- 7) The Community Center was included as one item in the Second Amendment to and Restatement of the Casco Bay Energy Company, LLC Municipal Development and Tax Increment Financing Development Program. The TIF District was amended to include the most likely route of extending a natural gas line. Additionally, the TIF allowed for improvements to the Community Center building to generally improve the space available for leasing to those existing and future commercial enterprises. The TIF agreement includes funds for work at the Community Center site. Notably, none of these funds come from the residential taxpayer.
- 8) A variety of in-kind donations have been received. Donated time has been provided by Town of Veazie staff as well as numerous volunteers. Notably, WBRC in Bangor has provided more than \$3,000 in-kind match in developing building drawings.
- 9) A tax-deductible charitable donation account is believed to have been established by the Town of Veazie. The purpose of the account was to allow individuals to donate money for the purpose of renovating the Community Center, and receive an income tax-deduction for their donation. In the

past, the Town has occasionally received unsolicited donations. To the best of our knowledge, that account has never been utilized.

Manager's Report For May 23, 2016 Council Meeting

Since the last Council Meeting here are some things I've been working on as well as things occurring around Town.

I have completed the grant application to update/replace the video system at the School. The application will be reviewed during the first week of June by a local Review Committee and then will be forwarded to the State for final approval. The grant we are applying for will use homeland security monies that Penobscot County receives.

I met with Hopkins Paving regarding the proposed paving projects. They have submitted an updated quote and have agreed to drop the per ton price substantially from last year. Additionally, I met with Barney Silver who will also provide me with a quote in hopes we can make a final decision at the May 23rd Council Meeting at roads we will be paving for FY 16/17.

Following the last Council meeting I requested an updated invoice for Recreation and Library services received last year from the Town of Orono. I have confirmation from the Town Manager that a new invoice will be coming from the Orono Parks and Recreation Director.

I attended the Thriving in Place Meeting in which several topics were discussed and we were able to develop a Mission Statement for the group.

I had a meeting with Kathadin Trust Bank regarding the Town's Investment Accounts and the School banking accounts. They will put together a proposal to take over these accounts.

I continue to perform sign maintenance around Town as we look to replace older signs and posts. At this point, there has been no cost to the Town for the signs and post as they were previously awarded to us through a grant.

I assisted the Economic Development Committee in finalizing the plans for the Business Network Luncheon. The event was very well attended and they are in hopes of holding more meetings like this in the future.

I met with the Interim Fire Chief of the Maine Air National Guard Fire Department. He and I have been in contact since his appointment over a year ago regarding updating our Mutual Aid Agreement. The Agreement is now completed and waiting for final signatures from Base Officials. We have also discussed joint purchases and how our Fire Department can save by these agreements, i.e., ladder inspections, etc.

I have cleaned up the cemetery, trash etc., in preparation for the Cemetery Committee to put flags and flowers on lots prior to Memorial Day.

Maine's Secretary of State wishes to remind those who must file that they can do so quickly and easily using the Secretary of State's online filing system. To file online, click here. Payments can be made by Vísa, MasterCard, Discover, electronic check, or with a subscriber account.

The annual report fee is \$85 for domestic business entities, \$150 for foreign business entities, and \$35 for domestic or foreign nonprofit corporations. Entities that filed online in a previous year will be able to review the information provided at that time, and will simply need to update that information as necessary prior to filing this year's report.

For account subscribers, the online filing service includes additional functionality to assist with managing multiple annual report filings

U.S. Department of Transportation Expands and Accelerates Takata Air Bag Inflator Recall to Protect American Drivers and Passengers

The United States Department of Transportation's National Highway Traffic Safety Administration (NHTSA) is expanding and accelerating the recall of Takata air bag inflators. The decision follows the agency's confirmation of the root cause behind the inflators' propensity to rupture. Ruptures of the Takata inflators have been tied to ten deaths and more than 100 injuries in the United States.

Under the Amended Consent Order issued to Takata, the company is required to make a series of safety defect decisions that will support vehicle manufacturer recall campaigns of an additional estimated 35-40 million inflators, adding to the already 28.8 million inflators previously recalled. These expansions are planned to take place in phases between May 2016 and December 2019. The expansions mean that all Takata ammonium nitrate-based propellant driver and passenger frontal air bag inflators without a chemical drying agent, also known as a desiccant, will be recalled.

The five recall phases are based on prioritization of risk, determined by the age of the inflators and exposure to high humidity and fluctuating high temperatures that accelerate the degradation of the chemical propellant.

The NHTSA and its independent expert reviewed the findings of three independent investigations into the Takata air bag ruptures

and confirmed the findings on the root cause of inflator ruptures. A combination of time, environmental moisture, and fluctuating high temperatures contribute to the degradation of the ammonium nitrate propellant in the inflators. Such degradation can cause the propellant to burn too quickly, rupturing the inflator module and sending shrapnel through the air bag and into the vehicle occupants.

The NHTSA will also consult with affected vehicle manufacturers before revising the Coordinated Remedy Order that governs the accelerated program to obtain and install replacement inflators. The Coordinated Remedy Program will continue to ensure that replacement inflators will be made available to highest-risk vehicles first. The revised Coordinated Remedy Program, to be announced this summer, will detail the updated vehicle prioritization schedule and the schedule by which manufacturers are required to procure sufficient supply of replacement parts to conduct the required recall repairs.

This is the largest and most complex safety recall in U.S. history. Under the Coordinated Remedy Program, the NHTSA and manufacturers have committed to seek a 100 percent recall completion rate.

The recall expansion does not include inflators that include a chemical desiccant that absorbs moisture. There have been no reported ruptures of the desiccated inflators due to propellant degradation. Under the Amended Consent Order, Takata is required to redirect its research toward the safety of the desiccated inflators. Absent proof that the desiccated inflators are safe, Takata will be required to recall them under the November 2015 Consent Order.

In 2015, the NHTSA imposed the largest civil penalty in its history for Takata's violations of the Motor Vehicle Safety Act, and for the first time used its authority to accelerate recall repairs to millions of affected vehicles. The NHTSA also appointed an independent monitor to assess, track, and report the company's compliance with the Consent Order and to oversee the Coordinated Remedy Program.

Veazie taxpayers likely to see lighter load in 2016-17 (http://bangordailynews.com/2016/05/15/news/bangor/veazie-taxpayers-likely-to-see-lighter-load-in-2016-17/)

VEAZIE, Maine — Most, if not all, local property owners should see a slight decrease in their property taxes if the proposed municipal and school budgets are adopted as they stand.

Town Manager Mark Leonard and the town's Budget Committee have developed a \$5,751,855 budget for municipal operations in the year ahead. The total reflects an increase of about \$9,304, according to a May 11 budget summary Leonard prepared for town councilors.

Meanwhile, the proposed \$4,157,181 school budget is down \$61,569 from this year. Leonard said the \$2,828,754 local share for education will stay nearly the same as this year's \$2,828,823.

Last year's local share total was the result of a compromise between town and school officials after voters rejected (https://www.google.com/url? q=http%3A%2F%2Fbangordailynews.com%2F2015%2F07%2F13%2Fnews%2Fbangor%2Fnew-veazie-school-budget-would-raise-taxes-40-cents%2F&sa=D&ust=1463429889630000&usg=AFQjCNHMJG_i7nHMC2X17cuRWTugwON4nQ&ref=inline) an earlier version of the budget during last June's budget validation referendum. A slightly lower budget, however, was approved during a second referendum in August (https://www.google.com/url?q=http%3A%2F%2Fbangordailynews.com%2F2015%2F08%2F05%2Fnews%2Fpenobscot%2Fveazie-voters-ok-4-15-million-school-budget%2F&sa=D&ust=1463429889630000&usg=AFQjCNHTDbjPbdu2SZnl74UxdES7UC_n_A&ref=inline).

Both budgets have been reviewed and endorsed by the Veazie Budget Committee.

Leonard said that based on the municipal and school budget proposals and projected revenues, he and assessor Ben Birch are projecting that the town's property tax rate will decrease slightly from the current \$18.40 per \$1,000 in valuation to \$18.30 per thousand.

"With the decrease in mill rate and the new laws governing the the Homestead Exemptions (https://www.google.com/url? q=http://www.maine.gov/revenue/propertytax/lawchange_2015.html&sa=D&ust=1463429889632000&usg=AFQjCNGp1ucta-5VBNmOND8EMGHXjsvzGA) [which this year increase from \$10,000 to \$15,000 for eligible homeowners], it's projected that most, if not all property owners in Veazie will see a decrease in their taxes," Leonard said in his budget summary.

Budget Committee Chairman Judy Horten credited Leonard and Veazie Community School Principal Matthew Cyr for holding the line on property taxes, which was the mission given to them by town councilors.

"Both administrators worked diligently to make this complicated and often difficult process amicable, transparent and straightforward," she wrote earlier this month in a letter to councilors. "Both presented clear budget summaries and answered often difficult questions with great patience," she said, adding that the proposed budgets would maintain the current level of services.

This year's annual town meeting and school budget meeting will begin at 8 p.m. Tuesday, June 14, at Veazie Community School immediately after the polls close at the town office.

the year 2000, the local utility company supplied and delivered your electricity. The utility still delivers your electricity, but today, consumers can choose the company that provides their electricity supply (typically about half of a residential bill), and this decision can be challenging and confusing.

Consumers may choose from many competitive electricity suppliers (CEPs) that serve the Maine market. CEPs are licensed by the PUC and subject to certain PUC rules, but their prices are not regulated. Consumers that do not take service from a CEP will automatically receive Standard Offer Service. The prices for Standard Offer Service are determined by the PUC through periodic competitive bid processes. Current Standard Offer Service prices are available on the PUC Web page.

CEPs market their electricity supply services to consumers in a variety of ways, including advertising on television, direct mailing, and door-to-door sales. Consumers should be careful when making their choice about their electricity supply. Based on calls to the PUC's Consumer Assistance Hotline, the PUC has developed some helpful points for choosing an electricity supplier.

- Read the fine print: Every CEP is required to provide you with terms of service, which specify all aspects of the transaction between you and the CEP, including information about rates, renewals, fees for early termination of service with the CEP, how communications may be handled (e.g., by e-mail), etc. The terms of service are crucial to your understanding of what you will pay, as well as other important aspects of the CEPs service.
- Do your homework: Carefully read the terms of service and compare prices with other CEPs and with the Standard Offer Service. Compare other features that may be important to you, such as early termination fees, how communications will be sent to you, and the number of months or years in which you are enrolling.
- Beware of feeling pressured: Remember that you are in control of your choice! Particularly, if you have someone at the door, you may feel you need to make a decision right then, but you do not. You also do not have to let a salesperson into your home. If you do sign up, and later do not feel good about it, you have the right to rescind your

decision within five days. Making a record of when you called to rescind your choice may be useful if questions arise later.

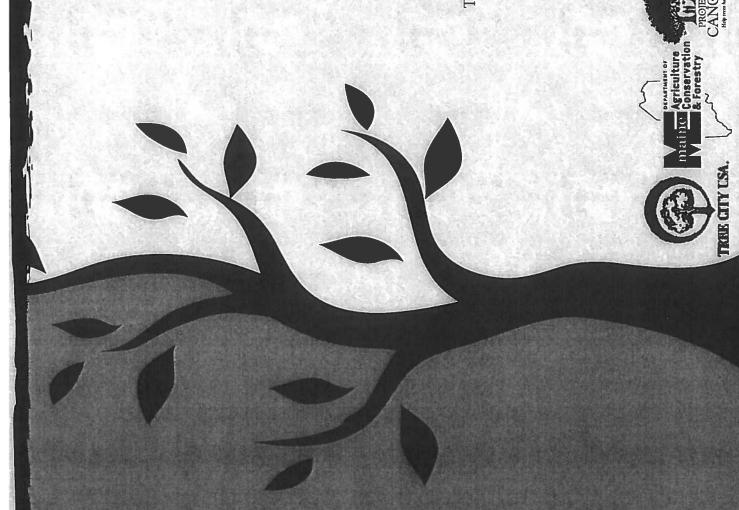
