Agenda Items For June 13, 2017 Council Meeting

The following are brief explanations of some of the items on the agenda:

ITEM 7: As we near the end of the Fiscal Year, Manager Leonard is requesting several transfers.

Suggested motions are as follows:

- A. I motion we transfer \$2,500.00 from Fixed Cost Street Sweeping account 800-40-120 to a reserve account to be created named Street/Drain Cleaning**
- B. I motion we transfer \$2,500.00 from Fixed Cost Drain Cleaning account 800-40-130 to a reserve account to be created named Street/Drain Cleaning.**
- C. I motion we transfer \$1,000.00 from the Fire Department Miscellaneous Revenue Account (300-1000) to the Fire Department EMS Equipment Account (300-60-073)**
- D. I motion we transfer \$12,000.00 from the Recreation Community Program account (500-40-093) to Tennis Court Maintenance account (30-3065-00).**
- E. I motion we transfer \$2,000.00 from Recreation Community Program account (500-40-093) to Veazie Days account (10-4060-00).**

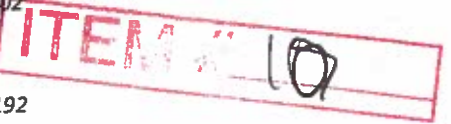

"Remember the Past and Hope for the Future," our theme for Domestic Violence Awareness Month this past October, carries us forward as we plan for 2017. The Town of Veazie has been an important partner in our work for many years. Your support has enabled us to:

I am writing today to request support from your community in the amount of \$100 for Maine Public for 2017.

Maine Public – yes, a new name! – remains committed to better serve, inform and entertain communities like yours across Maine. We focus on Maine stories and Maine people and are well aware that access to quality programs and information should have few barriers to individuals and families no matter where they reside in our state.

To that end, we continue to provide Maine Public Television, our primary television channel, and The CREATE Channel for free over the airwaves. This year we are especially excited to add another free over the air channel focused on kids and education called the PBS Kids Channel. Children and parents across Maine will have access to this channel and enjoy the safe and instructive content that PBS provides through its children's programming.

Access is also a theme of our radio signals. We have two now, Maine Public Radio and Maine Public Classical, that serve the state. In the case of Maine Public Classical, we are carefully building an entirely new network and with five transmitters currently in the fold, we can now reach over 500,000 Mainers with a terrestrial radio signal dedicated to classical music, jazz, and opera.

We remain focused on offering more in-depth coverage of events and issues in Maine and explore how national and international events might affect our state. Our reporters cover the entire state and their work is heard throughout the day on Maine Public Radio and on our website. Our afternoon call-in news show, *Maine Calling*, continues to grow a passionate audience as they touch on issues that affect all Mainers. And we are continuing to develop new programs that we think your community will really enjoy. We are about to launch a new program called the Maine High School Quiz Show that will feature students from schools across Maine competing in a battle of wits.

All of our work is only possible through support like the residents of Veazie have provided. We very much appreciate your past support and ask you once again to consider us this year.

Veazie Citizens:

We are truly LifeFlight of Maine: In fiscal year 2016, LifeFlight completed 1799 missions, the highest number yet, and the need for these services continues to increase each year. 1543 of those critical care patients were residents of 319 towns in Maine. Since 1998, we have completed more than 20,000 missions and have directly touched lives from all but 13 towns in the state.

LifeFlight was founded on the belief that every person in Maine should have access to critical care when and where needed, regardless of location or ability to pay. LifeFlight's charity care and bad debt is projected to be over \$2 million in fiscal year 2017, and we must fundraise for aircraft, medical equipment and infrastructure improvements.



Support from communities: 138 Maine municipalities, or over 30%, have now made voluntary donations in support of this work, and most do so each year, in amounts ranging from \$100 to \$2,500. We suggest a donation of \$1 per resident, but understand that town finances are challenging and appreciate support in any amount.

Direct impact: Through fundraising efforts, LifeFlight has added an airplane to the fleet that completes longer distance flights, and flies in inclement weather. In early 2017, we will put a third helicopter into service. The additional aircraft means a significant increase in LifeFlight's availability for Veazie residents, who may need transport to local hospitals or to Boston for specialized lifesaving procedures.

Please consider a donation of \$960 this year. Your gift goes to purchase aircraft and medical equipment, install helipads in communities, and upgrade weather and GPS systems around Maine that make the airspace safer for all flight. 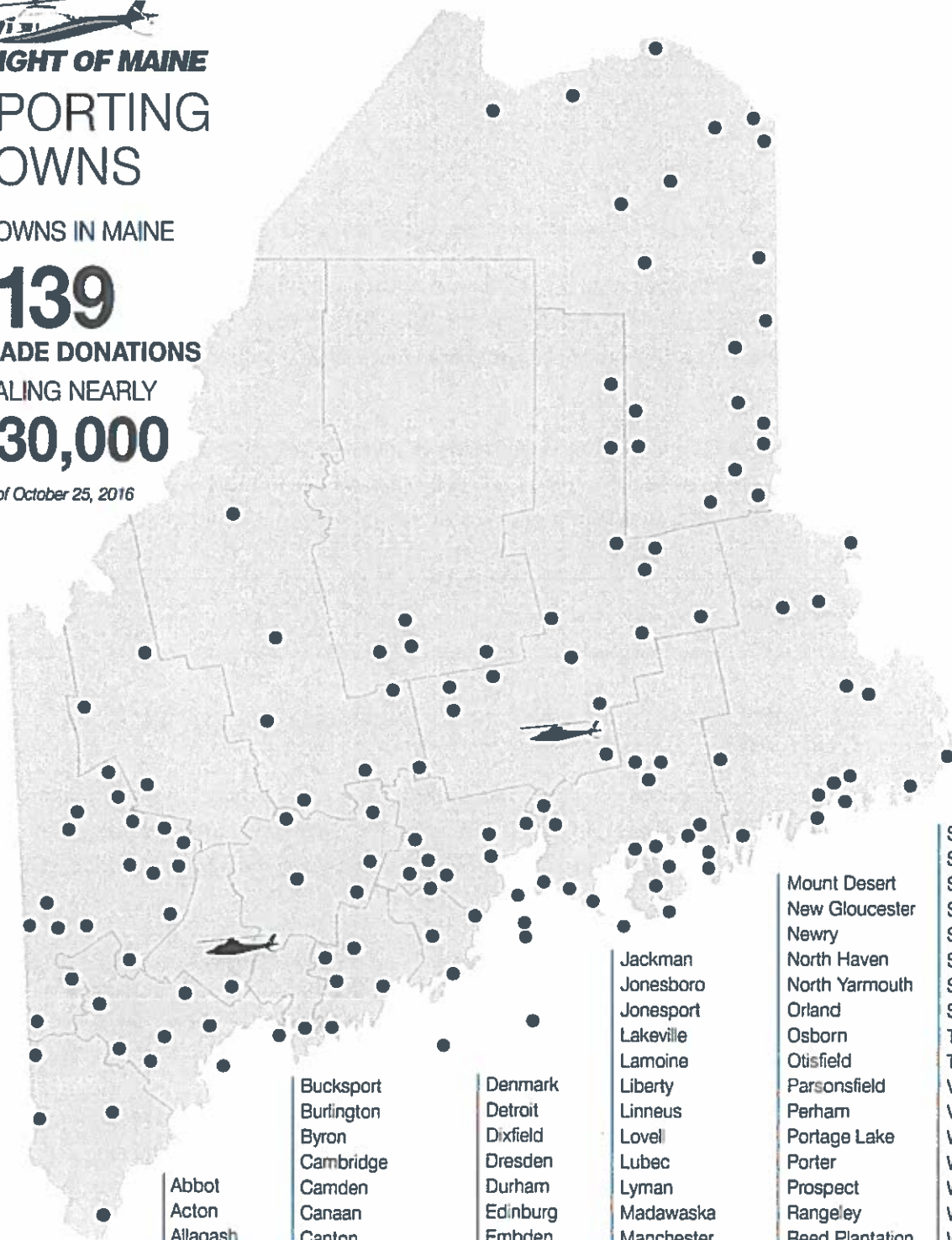

Who We Are

Community Health and Counseling Services is a private non-profit community mental health, home health and hospice agency that is Medicare/Medicaid certified. Our home health and hospice services are CHAP accredited. CHCS provides community-based treatment and rehabilitation services to children with emotional and behavioral problems, adults with chronic mental illness and home health services and end-of-life-care (hospice) to those with serious or terminal illnesses.

Southern Penobscot County Residents Served in 2016

CHCS serves the needs of children, adults and families in Southern Penobscot County within **27 communities** through its office located in Bangor.

143 residents of Southern Penobscot County are part of our caring staff.

CHCS provided support to more than **1,115 residents** in Southern Penobscot County through its services. CHCS community-based services allow residents to remain in their community.

Southern Penobscot received 29,251 health care visits from CHCS professionals and 6,204 days in residential care (child).

Services that Impact

This is done through services like home health, hospice, physical therapy, adult and child therapy, child treatment foster care, adult community integration services, adult and child medication management, and child residential programs.

Measurable Benefits

CHCS aggressively measures outcomes for its programs and services. Our home health and hospice services department is required to participate in an outcome measurement process called OASIS. OASIS is a national outcome data tool that is required throughout the home health industry.

All of the outcome data collected by CHCS and other entities demonstrates that CHCS is successful in improving the overall quality of lives of individuals who are experiencing significant health needs.

CHCS's Home Health and Hospice program received the 2014 HomeCare Compare distinction that recognizes the Top 500 Home Health Care agencies in the nation.

Providing Quality of Life to Individuals and Families in Southern Penobscot County

The mission of CHCS is to provide a comprehensive array of community health services that are needed and valued by the communities we serve. The very nature of the services provided by CHCS enables individuals to have improved lives. We all know the comfort that home and community brings during an illness. Our home health care services bring this care to an individual's home. Since our services are developed in partnership with the individual, treatment plans are developed which foster improvement for the individual.

CHCS Practices Good Stewardship

CHCS establishes a request amount for each county in which we provide service. After determining this request amount, each town's specific request is determined by the amount of services provided to residents in that town in relation to the total population served in the county.

CHCS understands that communities receive many well deserving requests. We attempt to keep our requests to a reasonable level. As such, CHCS caps the total request of any town at \$5,000. This year we are **requesting \$28,000 from Southern Penobscot County municipalities.**

Organizational overhead is 12.73%. All other costs are service delivery related. Flexible dollars are used to bridge the gap between reimbursement and the cost of service delivery.



I wanted to provide you a progress report on the Veazie Comprehensive Plan Update.

- Planning Board Public Hearing on Plan

- Department Review of Plan and Consistency Determination
- Response to State Review of Plan (additional information or changes may be necessary)
- Public Hearing on State Review and Comments
- Resubmission of Plan with Changes (if necessary)

Our next scheduled meeting is June 22, 2017. I anticipate having a draft of all plan sections for review and approval at that meeting. Target date for completed plan, ready for submission is August 1, 2017.

Manager's Report For June 13, 2017 Council Meeting

Since the last council meeting here are some things I've been working on as well as things occurring around Town.

I have met with Matt Polo from Polo Property Management on several projects I am looking to have completed after the approval of the budget. One item he will be completing prior to the end of this year is painting of the main entrance to the municipal building.

I attended the Maine Chiefs of Police training and meeting that was held in Bar Harbor. I have been chosen to be the regional representative for region 5 which is Penobscot and Piscataquis Counties on the Board of Directors for the Maine Chiefs. This is a position I have held for many years in the past.

I received and reviewed all the proposed ordinance changes for the planning board. These were presented at a public hearing and will now be presented to the Council for action.

I have met with Barney Silver on several occasions to review and go over current and future projects. These include under drain work on Buck Hill, storm drain work, Preparation for Davis Drive work and the installation of the water line for the sprinkler system at the Community Center. During the installation of the water line it was discovered an easement would be needed from the abutting land owner. I spoke with the abutters and ultimately Town legal and the abutter's attorneys have prepared the necessary legal documents and work will begin shortly.

I met with Maine Fire Protection and they had begun the installation of the sprinkler system but halted work when the easement issue was discovered. Now that has been resolved I believe work will restart shortly.

I have met with a representative from NESCOM on getting the Town's Public Access Channel back on line. He contacted Spectrum to confirm signal was being sent to the Municipal Building and since has been to Municipal building and inventoried what is needed for equipment. We will continue to work on this over the next few weeks and hopefully will have the channel back on line after many years of being off line.

I held another meeting with the Sewer District and the Water District to go over the Davis Drive road reconstruction. The meetings continue to be beneficial for planning purposes. Another meeting has been scheduled for June with a projected start date of late July.

I met with a representative from Bangor Health to discuss overdose prevention and ways we could partner to help those in need. Another meeting will be occurring where we are going to discuss the possibilities of a community meeting.

Manager's Report

Council Meeting

I received notice that the Fire Department was successful in a grant request they made to Maine Municipal Association for fire gear. The confirmation letter is attached for review.

The students of the Veazie Community School undertook two projects for the Town this year. One being the stenciling of the storm drains and stream cleanup. Both were a great success and a certificate of appreciation will be presented to them during the last day of school assembly.

I attended the pre-k thru second grade musical that was held at the school. The students and staff did a great job preparing and presenting this event.

I have met with Consultant Dean Bennett on the progress of the comprehensive plan rewrite which he reports is going well but is off schedule. He has prepared a memo with an updated time line which I will present to Council for discussion.

The Veazie Fire Department has met with and will be partnering with the Red Cross to install smoke detectors in homes located around town. A news story that was in the Bangor Daily news is attached for review.

VEAZIE – The American Red Cross of Maine and the Veazie Fire Department are teaming up to install free smoke alarms in residents' homes and teach people how to be prepared for home fires.

Residents can sign up for free smoke alarm installation by calling Ron Springel of the Red Cross at 874-1192, extension 113. The Veazie Fire Department will follow-up with the installation.

"Seven times a day someone in this country dies in a home fire and countless others suffer injuries," said Fire Chief Mark Leonard. "We want residents to be safe. Smoke alarms cut the risk of someone dying from a home fire in half, so we want to put them in as many homes as we can."

The effort is part of an ambitious national campaign launched by the Red Cross to cut home fire deaths and injuries by a quarter by 2020.

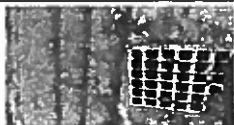

Section 1 Veazie PY4 Updates

MDEP/MS4 Stormwater Program

Veazie is a regulated MS4 Community

The current five-year MS4 Permit expires on June 30th, 2018

Permit Year four ends on June 30th, 2017

Each community must designate a priority watershed within their urbanized area (see **attachment 1**), where they will focus their efforts, The Town of Veazie has designated the watershed area southwest of the Chase Road that drains to Meadow Brook as the Town's priority watershed. Meadow Brook has been identified by MDEP as an impaired water body draining to the Penjajawoc Stream.

Each MS4 Community is also required to create and implement a MS4 Stormwater Management Plan (SMP), which must address each of six Minimum Control Measures (MCMs) (see **section 2**).



MS4 Program Audit

MDEP MS4 Program Audit

Veazie is likely due for a Maine Department of Environmental Protection (MDEP) MS4 program audit in the near future. The Town is well prepared for any future MS4 program audits due to:

- Maintaining an active role in BASWG;
- The Town's Stormwater Coordinator (Mark Leonard) and Stormwater Team continue their active involvement with all compliance related tasks; and
- Ongoing compliance assistance provided by SEE.



EPA/MDEP MS4 Program Update

In recent years, MDEP has ramped up their oversight and implementation of the MS4 Program to a "New Normal" which requires significantly more effort from regulated communities in order to maintain compliance with the MS4 permit. Veazie has responded accordingly to this and has maintained compliance with their MS4 permit requirements.

The EPA has recently issued (April 2016) a new MS4 Permit for both MA and NH, which will likely be used as a basis for MDEP in writing the next Maine MS4 permit. This permit will tentatively be issued on July 1, 2018.

Based on discussions with MDEP stormwater program staff, Maine's new five year general permit will have a much greater emphasis on Illicit Discharge Detection and Elimination (MCM III), as well as Construction Site Runoff Control (MCM IV). MDEP has stated that the MS4 permit is iterative and each subsequent permit will build on previous permit requirements.

MDEP is currently requesting initial comments from all regulated MS4 communities during an ongoing stakeholder process over the next year as they prepare a draft of the next MS4 Permit for 2018-2023. There have already been a series of statewide stakeholder meetings, with several more meetings anticipated in the next few months.

Section 2 Minimum Control Measures

Compliance Summary

In addition to activities identified in Veazie's SMP. Town staff and its consultant continue to be active in regional compliance activities, as a member of the Bangor Area Stormwater Group (BASWG). The following is a summary of compliance activities for each minimum control measure that have occurred during the current permit year, beginning July 1 , 2016 and ending June 30, 2017.

MCM 1 Public Education and Outreach

Municipal Outreach Plan

The BASWG assists the Town with meeting the requirements of MCM 1. Current group activities include improved branding and messaging for permit compliance. This includes new and innovative branding and messaging strategies in order to reach a wider audience. The group has improved its website (www.baswg.org), as well as developed other educational tools mentioned below in MCM 2.

Additional education and outreach efforts which the Town is involved in include:

- Stormwater Awareness Plan (Statewide): A coordinated statewide effort to educate the public about stormwater pollution and preventative measures.
- Stormwater Behavior Change Plan (Regional): a regional effort, focused on lawn and garden care, and coordinated by the BASWG, in order to educate the public about environmentally friendly lawn and garden practices.
- Municipal Outreach Plan (Town-specific): A Veazie specific plan for educating municipal personnel and officials about stormwater pollution and preventative measures.
- Targeted BMP Adoption Plan (Regional): A regional effort, focused on chloride reduction and coordinated by the BASWG, in order to reduce the use of chlorides during winter maintenance activities. Each municipality also develops and implements a Town specific chloride reduction plan.



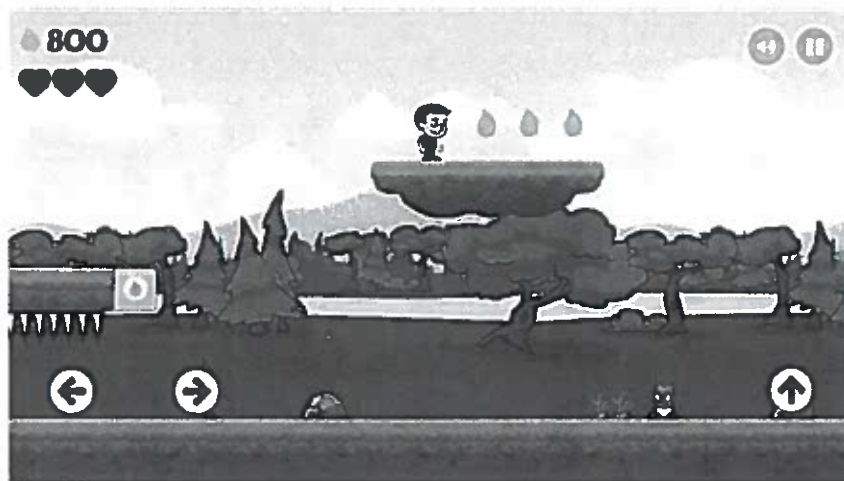


MCM 2 Public Involvement and Participation

Public Events

Veazie participated in the following public involvement events during the past permit year:

Maine Science Festival – Town staff participated in the Maine Science Festival in March of 2017, operating an education booth, which was updated by Pulse Marketing Agency to be more kid friendly. The new materials included a display board, an educational video, and an stormwater video. BASWG members also created an educational activity that allowed children to hold a Velcro raindrop, go down a driveway filled with felt pollutants, and crawl through a storm drain pipe into a pond. This demonstrates to kids how pollution can travel with stormwater to receiving waters. These new materials will continue to be used in subsequent permit years.





Annual Stream Cleanup – A stream cleanup was conducted in May of 2017 at the Veazie School. There were thirteen volunteers from the 8th grade class. The students cleaned up trash from the school grounds, near the river, and behind the town office. They collected four bags of trash.



Storm Drain Stenciling – The Town conducted a stenciling event in May of 2017, where 8 elementary school students, stenciled storm drains on Thompson Rd, Merrick Rd, Summer St, Rock St, and Olive St. Approximately 24 storm drains were stenciled, and about 100 door hangers with information about preventing stormwater pollution were distributed.





MCM 3 Illicit Discharge Detection and Elimination

Annual Storm Sewer System Inspections (May 2017)

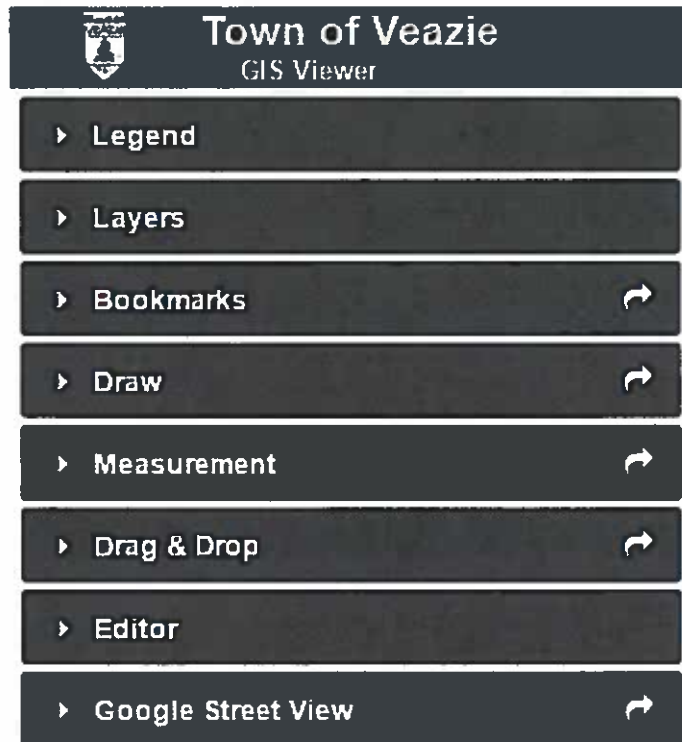
- 284 catch basins were inspected for sediment depth and subsequent maintenance.
- 58 open ditches were inspected for signs of illicit discharges.
- 36 outfalls inspected for signs of illicit discharges.

Storm Sewer System Map

Storm sewer mapping updates are currently in progress using mobile data collectors. The Town continues to improve infrastructure maps, as necessary, which is required by the MS4 permit. The Town relies on GIS based mapping for their stormwater system components.

Electronic Data Management

The Town maintains all annual storm sewer system inspection results in their electronic data management system. An example of the Town's GIS viewer is shown below.

BMP Inspection and Maintenance

There were no construction projects greater than one acre in size within the Town's urbanized area that met the MS4 Permit requirements of MCM 4 during PY4.

There are currently no post-construction BMPs within the Town's Urbanized area that meet the MS4 Permit requirements of MCM 5.

MCM 6 Pollution Prevention/Good Housekeeping for Municipal Operations

Annual Trainings

SEE provided required annual O&M trainings for Town staff and contractors in August of 2016.

Annual Cleaning Program Development and Implementation

Street Sweeping is performed annually, as soon as possible after snow melt and as needed thereafter.

Catch Basin Cleaning Program

Catch Basins are cleaned annually, during the summer, following annual catch basin inspections. If noted during annual catch basin inspections, excess accumulated sediment is removed from catch basin sumps. This minimizes the potential for pipe clogging, and the potential for the discharge of excess sediment to nearby waterways.

Repair and Upgrade Schedule Implementation

Contracted public works staff continue to repair the highest priority stormwater system infrastructure, based on the results of completed annual inspections.





Pollution Prevention and Good Housekeeping BMPs:

The Town has developed and implemented an Operation and Maintenance Plan (O & M) for all municipal facilities and activities that have the potential to impact stormwater runoff. Annual training for Town staff and contracted services is based on O&M topics. The following list includes a sample of O&M topics included in the plan:

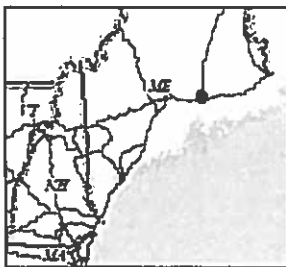
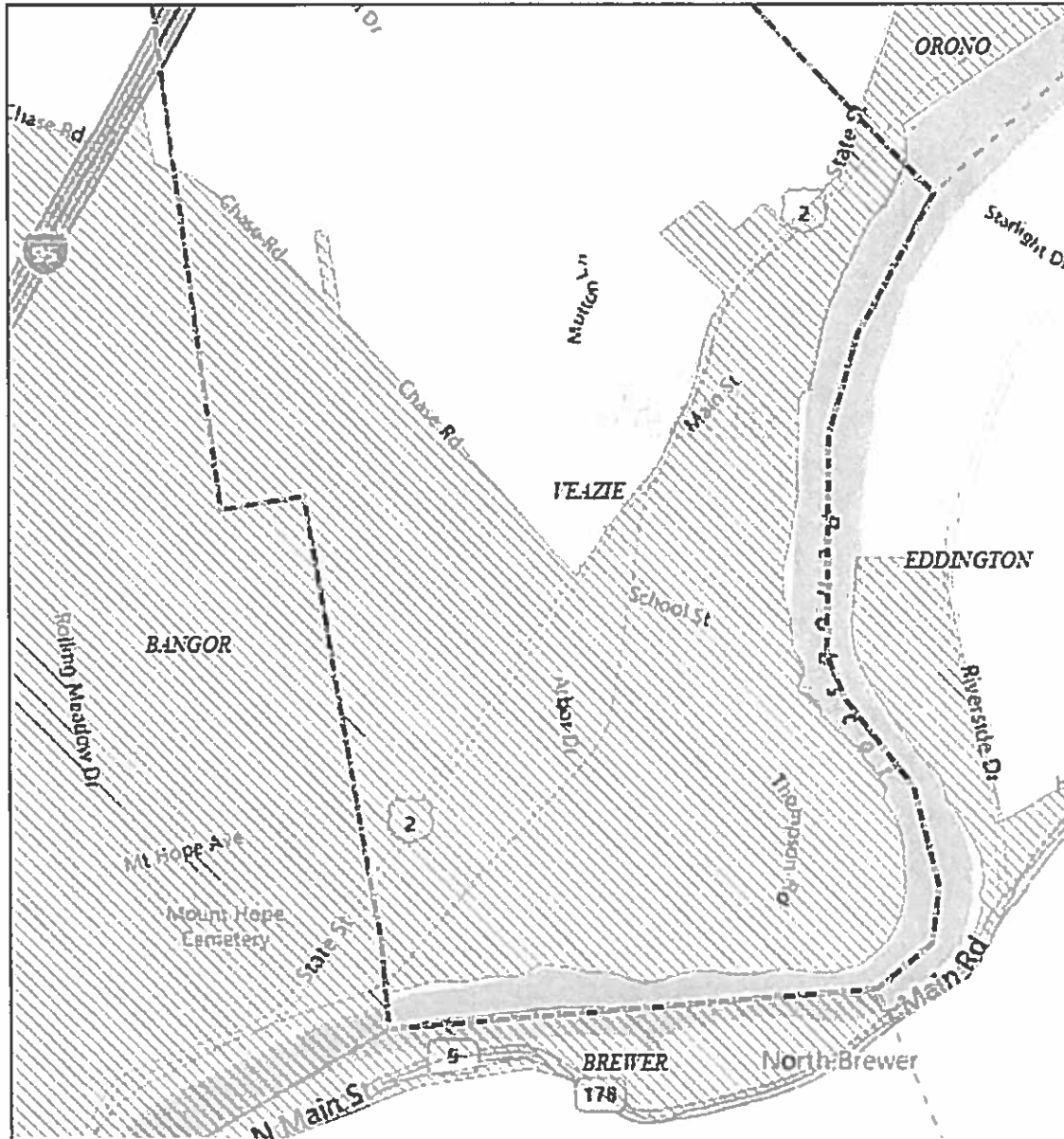

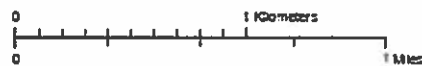
VEAZIE URBANIZED AREA MAP
