### MINUTES OF MEETING OF WAREHAM FINANCE COMMITTEE

Date of Meeting: March 25, 2015

### I. CALL MEETING TO ORDER

The meeting was called to order at 6:31 P.M.

### III. CITIZENS PARTICIPATION

Article 3 - Compensation of Certain Appointed Officials

The FinCom reviewed the compensation for the Town Clerk, Registrar, & the Town Moderator.

MOTION: Mr. Cammarano moved Favorable Action on Article 3 of the 2015 Annual Town Meeting Warrant. Mr. Langan seconded.

VOTE: Unanimous (6-0-0)

1. Article 8 - Upper Cape Cod Regional Voc-Tech School.

Mr. Dutch proceeded to give a budget presentation for Upper Cape Cod Regional Voc-Tech School.

Mr. Dutch explained that every year Upper Cape has a theme. This year's theme is United Committed Team. He discussed members of the budget sub-committee.

Mr. Dutch & the FinCom members proceeded to review & discuss the following:

- 6. Total school district actual per pupil expenditures.
- 7. Per pupil spending increases FY07-FY13.
- 8. Net school spending over foundation.

Mr. Dutch distributed information to the FinCom re: FY16 Chapter 70 summary. (Attached as reference).

Mr. Dutch stated there is a five year plan w/ modest growth in out-building, program offerings, etc.

MOTION: Mr. Cammarano moved Favorable Action on Article 8 of the 2015 Annual Town Meeting Warrant (w/ Wareham's share to be \$2,836,635). Mr. Langan seconded.

### VOTE: (5-0-1) Mr. Cammarano abstained

### IV. TOWN ADMINISTRATOR'S REPORT

### A. Budget update.

Mr. Sullivan explained he is still working w/ the School Department on a mutual budget.

Ms. Cottuli stated she understands the School Committee already voted on their budget. Mr. Sullivan believes the School Committee will be coming back on April 8<sup>th</sup> w/ another version. Ms. Cottuli expressed concern w/ this date because this is the last day for the FinCom to vote on the budget before the Warrant goes to print.

Ms. Cottuli stated she does not understand the balanced budget provided vs. the school's fixed costs. Mr. Sullivan stated the Town & the School Department are still apart on several figures. He stated there is a requested budget & a balanced budget. He again stated he is still working w/ the School Department on the budget.

Ms. Cottuli stated the FinCom may have to move their April 8<sup>th</sup> meeting to Thursday, April 9<sup>th</sup> in order to get the final figures for the budget. She stated she doesn't want to vote on the budget at Town Meeting.

Article 11 - Supplementing Sewer Capital Stabilization Fund

MOTION: Mr. Cammarano moved to pass over Article 11 of the 2015 Annual Town Meeting Warrant. Mr. Bailey seconded.

VOTE: Unanimous (6-0-0)

Article 19 - Roof & Boiler for Decas School

Mr. Sullivan stated this would be a FY2017 expense. He explained the cost of the feasibility study would start after July 1<sup>st</sup>. He also explained the School Dept. is applying for SBAfunds. The Town would pay for the cost initially, then borrowing, then hopefully SBA funds. He explained the process more clearly. He stated there is no cost estimates currently. Discussion ensued re: the process.

MOTION: Mr. Cammarano moved Favorable Action on Article 19 of the 2015 Annual Town Meeting Warrant. Mr. Langan seconded.

VOTE: Unanimous (6-0-0)

B. Review & vote on articles for the 2015 Spring Special Town Meeting Warrant.

Article 1 – Line Item Transfer

Mr. Sullivan noted that the Veteran's Services will be requesting an additional \$68,000 in funding.

Article 2 – FY2015 Capital Plan

Mr. Sullivan stated there may be several items to purchase prior to July 1st.

Article 3 - Harbor Services Permit Receipts

Ms. Cottuli discussed the intent of the article & read the explanation into the record.

MOTION: Mr. Cammarano moved Favorable Action on Article 3 of the 2015 Spring Special Town Meeting Warrant. Mr. Bailey seconded.

VOTE: Unanimous (6-0-0)

Article 4 - Tax Title Collection Revolving Fund

Mr. Sullivan stated the maximum amount is \$100,000 for this fund. He stated this will also be added to the Revolving Account grid.

Mr. Sullivan discussed the reason for the Revolving Fund for tax title collection. He discussed rules for Revolving Funds.

MOTION: Mr. Cammarano moved Favorable Action on Article 4 of the Spring Special Town Meeting Warrant. Mr. Bailey seconded.

VOTE: Unanimous (6-0-0)

Article 5 - Health Insurance Trust Fund

Mr. Sullivan stated the Health Insurance audit will not be completed until mid-April. He stated most likely, the figure(s) won't be known until prior to Town Meeting.

Article 6 - Plymouth County OPEB Trust

Mr. Sullivan stated this is contingent upon the Health Insurance Trust audit.

Article 7 - Police Union

Mr. Sullivan stated the Police Union needs to vote on the agreement. He will get the figure when agreed upon.

Article 8 – Lots & Graves Account Article 9 – Agawam Cemetery

Mr. Sullivan stated the cemetery garage was not worked on & the Cemetery Commissioners feel it is more important to purchase the land (for Agawam Cemetery) first. Brief discussion ensued re: the land for sale.

MOTION: Mr. Cammarano moved Favorable Action on Article 8 of the Spring Special Town Meeting Warrant. Ms. Jordan seconded.

VOTE: (5-1-0) Mr. Worthen opposed

MOTION: Mr. Cammarano moved Favorable Action on Article 9 of the Spring Special Town Meeting Warrant. Ms. Jordan seconded for discussion.

Discussion ensued re: monies & other monies in the account.

VOTE: (4-2-0) Mr. Worthen & Mr. Bailey opposed

Article 10 - Additional Liquor License

Mr. Sullivan the establishment to receive this license is the old Stonebridge Inn. The establishment will be opening in April 2016.

MOTION: Mr. Worthen moved Favorable Action on Article 10 of the Spring Special Town Meeting Warrant. Mr. Langan seconded.

VOTE: Unanimous (6-0-0)

Article 12 - Rescind Prior Year Bond Authorizations

Mr. Sullivan discussed the intent of the article.

MOTION: Mr. Cammarano moved Favorable Action on Article 12 of the Spring Special Town Meeting Warrant. Mr. Bailey seconded.

VOTE: Unanimous (6-0-0)

Article 13 - Allen Street

Mr. Sullivan stated Allen Street is in the Swifts Beach area. He explained the intent of the article.

MOTION: Mr. Langan moved Favorable Action on Article 13 of the Spring Special Town Meeting Warrant. Mr. Cammarano seconded.

VOTE: Unanimous (6-0-0)

Article 14 - Generator

Discussion ensued re: the intent of the article. Mr. Sullivan explained the generator at the Multi-Service Center will aid the Police Station & a new generator will be purchased for the Multi-Service Center.

MOTION: Mr. Cammarano moved Favorable Action on Article 14 of the Spring Special Town Meeting Warrant. Ms. Jordan seconded.

VOTE: Unanimous (6-0-0)

Article 15 - Amendment to Junk Dealer Bylaw

Discussion ensued re: the intent of the article.

Mr. Langan stated he has several concerns re: this article. He stated one of his concerns is that it is a Bylaw change. He stated another concern he has is the locations of these licenses. His third concern is the amount of licenses being proposed to be added.

Mr. Langan discussed in depth his feelings on building up & developing the Town. He feels the Town has to decide what it wants to be & the Town has to watch what it does.

Ms. Cottuli feels the BOS need to come before the FinCom to explain this article. She will contact the BOS to have one or more BOS members come before the FinCom.

NOTE: Discussion went back to the 2015 Annual Town Meeting Warrant.

Article 20 - Petition Article - Adoption of MGL Chapter 148:26H

Ms. Cottuli stated she has not received information from the Building Inspector. She asked Mr. Sullivan if he could help obtain the information from the Building Inspector. She stated she will reach out to the Building Inspector again to see what his opinion is on this article. Brief discussion ensued.

- C. Set public hearing date for Annual & Special Town Meeting Warrants, including the budget.
  - 1. Discussion: Holding moc-Town Meeting at same time as public hearing.

Ms. Cottuli suggested the public hearing be held on April 22, 2015 as well as having the moc-Town Meeting on this date as well. The FinCom members concurred.
