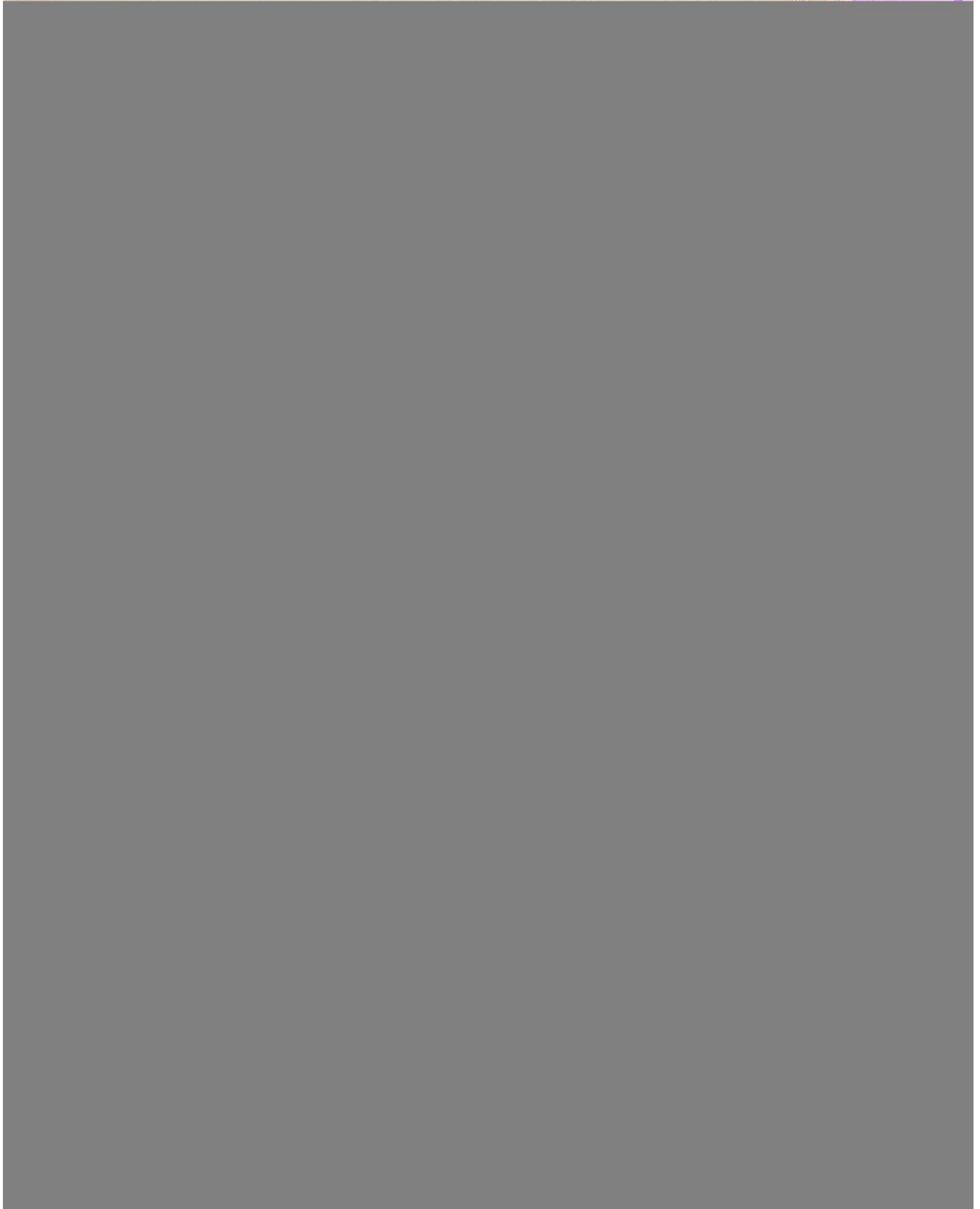

#### **District No. 5.**

The three terms in this district were taught by Miss Mary A. Crosby of Deering, who received such an excellent report in this school by the Superintendent last year. Her former reputation was fully sustained. No district in town takes a deeper interest in the welfare of their school than No. 5. The school-house has been repaired during the past year, and presents a neat and attractive appearance.

#### **District No. 6.**

First term taught by Miss Lois A. Hurd of Newport. Miss Hurd is a thorough, practical and efficient teacher, whose efforts were appreciated by parents and scholars, and the school was a decided success. Second term taught by Miss Elvira M. Thurber of Lempster.

Miss Thurber worked hard for the good of her scholars, but did not meet with that support of the district which is necessary to make a school highly successful.

#### **District No. 7.**

First term taught by Miss Flora B. Baker of Lempster. This was Miss Baker's first experience. As good advancement was made as could be expected in a term of only seven weeks. Miss Baker is a live and energetic teacher, and only needs experience to rank among the best of our instructors. Second term taught by Miss Cora E. Tandy of Washington. Miss Tandy has had previous experience in this district, and met with her usual success.

#### **District No. 8.**

First term taught by Miss Annie B. Hazen of Hillsboro'. This was Miss Hazen's first attempt at teaching. Good order and a profitable term. Second term taught by Miss Rosa N. Spaulding of Washington, another beginner in the art of teaching. The four scholars under her instruction advanced rapidly, but there was a lack of thoroughness. Third term taught by Miss Alma C. Hadley of Hillsborough, who gave excellent satisfaction.

**District No. 9.**

The one term in this district was taught by Miss Addie E. Hall of Unity. The scholars made excellent improvement and the closing exercises were quite satisfactory.

## REMARKS.

---

The schools in town for the past year have been successful to a very good degree. There has been no lack of interest on the part of teachers or scholars; but in most of the districts little or no interest has been shown by the patrons of the schools; and yet those who visit schools least, criticise most.

Harper's Geographies have been introduced in exchange for the variety of other Geographies, and there is now a uniform series of text books throughout the town, with the exception of Grammars.

To preserve this uniformity, allow no text-books aside from those already in use to be introduced by teachers or scholars without consulting the Superintendent. In order to complete the uniform series, your committee would recommend an exchange of Grammars.
