## REPORT OF BOARD OF EDUCATION.

In submitting our report for the year, we are satisfied that the progress of our schools for the past year has been equal to the usual standard. We have aimed to secure the services of good teachers, and in no instance have we been disappointed. Under the law for free textbooks all the schools are now well provided with books, and but a small sum yearly will be required to keep them supplied.

The school house at East Washington needs thorough repairing. The floor is in bad condition, and the seats and desks are of an ancient and uncomfortable style. As this is one of the largest schools in town, the school house should be put in good condition and supplied with modern desks and furniture, and an appropriation should be made for that purpose.

We append a report of each school, and a report of the treasurer of the Board.

### SPECIAL REPORT BY SCHOOLS.

#### Division No. 1. Centre.

Summer and fall terms, were both taught by Jennie M. Carr, of East Washington : a teacher of much experience, and one who always works hard for her school. On account of sickness we were unable to be present at the final examination, but judging from our previous knowledge of the school, and reports of visitors, good progress had been made. Wages of teacher, including board, \$30, per month. Length of school, summer, nine weeks, fall, eleven weeks. Number of scholars, thirtytwo. Visits of school board, three. Whole number of visitors, one hundred and eight. F. P. N.

#### Division No. 3. (Ball's Corner.)

Two terms; both taught by Miss Hattie N. Holt, of Newbury, N. H. Miss Holt is a practical instructor, and is destined to become one of our best teachers. She does not confine her scholars entirely to text books, but imparts to them many personal ideas, and much useful knowledge, which is of much more benefit to them than many of the long rules, and puzzling problems, found in their books. Wages of teachers per month, including board, \$20. Length of school, summer, ten weeks, fall, eleven weeks. Number of scholars, seven. Visits of school board, three. Whole number of visitors, forty-eight. S. N. B.

#### Division No. 4. Safford's.

A term of nine weeks, was taught here in the fall, by Mrs. Jennie Safford, at her residence. Althougthere were only two scholars in attendance, yet the committee thought best to give them the benefit of a term of school, in order, and to use some of the funds accumulating there, which is to be used especially for the scholars living in this division. Wages of teacher, per month, including board, \$16. Whole number of scholars, two. Visits of school board, two.

#### S. N. B.

#### Division No. 5. East Washington.

The spring term of nine weeks, and the fall term of eleven weeks, were taught by Miss Lena C. Maxfield, of Goshen, N. H. The school was characterized by an uncommonly harmonious spirit, which we all recognize as essential to success. We were not present at the final examination, but, judging from previous visits, conclude that the school was a profitable one. The interior of the school house in this division, is greatly in need of thorough repairs. An appropriation, with this end in view, should be made. Wages of teacher per month, including board, \$30. Length of school, summer, nine weeks, fall, eleven weeks. Number of scholars, first term, nineteen, second term, twenty-six. Visits of school board, four. Whole number of visits, fortynine. G. N. G.

#### Division No. 6. Turnpike.

The summer term of ten weeks was taught by Miss Lunetta V. Blanchard, of Washington, N. H. The fall term of eleven weeks, taught by Miss Maude E. Dole, also of Washington. Both teachers did their best for the good of the school, and the results were highly satisfactory. Wages of teachers, including board, summer term, \$16, per month, fall term, \$20. Length of school, summer, ten weeks, fall, eleven weeks. Number of scholars, seven. Visits by the school board, three. Whole number of visitors, thirty-nine.

#### Division No. 7. Farnsworth's Mill.

The spring term, was taught by Miss Mary J. Fay, of Marlow. N. H., who taught the same school in the fall of 1892, and gave general satisfaction. Her last attempt however, was marked with a little unpleasantness on the part of some of the scholars and parents, which had a tendency to mar the progress of the school. The fall term was under the instruction of Miss Gertrude Corey, of Stoddard, N. H., who taught a good school, satisfactory to all. Wages of teachers, per month, including board, \$20. Length of school, summer, ten weeks, fall, ten weeks. Number of scholars, six. Visits of school board, four. Whole number of visitors, thirty-nine. S. N. B.

#### Division No. 8. New Boston.

The spring term of eight weeks, was taught by Miss Gertrude L. Heselton, of Washington, N. H. The fall term of eleven weeks was under the care of Miss Jennie A. Hurd, also of Washington. Both teachers labored well for the school, and good progress was made by all the pupils. Wages of teachers, per month, including board, \$18. Length of school, summer, eight weeks. fall, eleven weeks. Number of scholars, first term six, second term, seven. Visits of school board, four. Whole number of visitors, thirty-three.

## 18 Division No. 9. Cherry Valley.

Summer and fall terms, both taught by Miss Mary E. Holt, of Mt. Sunapee, N. H. This was Miss Holt's first experience. The discipline and instruction were excellent, and we predict future success for Miss Holt as a teacher. Wages per month, including board, \$16. Length of school, summer, ten weeks, fall, eleven weeks. Number of scholars, five. Visits of school board three. Whole number of visitors thirteen. F. P. N.
