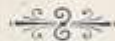

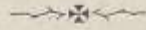

## REPORT OF SCHOOL BOARD.



## FELLOW CITIZENS:

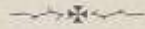
Another school year has closed, and its record comes to you in this annual report for your examination and approval. And while we, as your chosen officers are aware of the many disappointments encountered in striving to reach perfection in anything undertaken, yet we would ask you to be charitable in your criticisms of our demeanor, and endeavor to realize in the fullest sense the great care and responsibility imposed upon those who have the education of your children committed to their charge.

It has been our aim to manage for the best interest of the schools the past year, and while some of them have been small in numbers, yet the same opportunities have been given to these scholars as to those in our larger schools. During the year seven schools have been maintained, and in most cases teachers of experience have been secured and retained throughout the year. Could some of our smaller schools be united, or a small sum appropriated in addition to our school fund, and a winter term provided for all, making three terms for the year, of about eight weeks each; we think more benefit would be derived than from two long terms with so long a vacation for our scholars during the winter. During the past year the school house at East Washington has been thoroughly repaired, and all of our school buildings are at present in very good condition, and only a small sum will be required to be expended for some time for repairs.

Below we append a special report of each school, also a report of the treasurer of the Board, and a report from the Executive Committee of Tubbs' Union Academy.

## REPORT BY SCHOOLS.

Division No. 1. Centre.

Summer and fall terms, were under the instruction of Miss Hattie M. Holt, of Newbury, N. H., and we are pleased to say that her efforts to educate the pupils under her charge have been fully appreciated by the Committee and parents. Wages of teacher per month, including board, \$32. Length of school, summer, eight weeks, fall term, twelve weeks. Number of scholars, thirty-one. Visits of school board, six. Whole number of visitors, one hundred and two. Number of scholars attending to different studies, reading 33, spelling 33, penmanship 31, arithmetic 33, geography 33, grammar 19, composition 9, vocal music 33.

## Division No. 3. Ball's Corner.

The school for the year was under the instruction of Miss Mary E. Holt, of Newbury, who gave good satisfaction. Harmony and good will was the prevailing sentiment, and the result was very pleasing indeed.

Wages of teacher per month including board, \$20. Length of school, summer, nine weeks, fall, twelve weeks. Whole number scholars, nine. Visits of school board, three. Whole number of visitors, forty. Number of pupils for the year attending to different studies, reading 9, spelling 9, penmanship 9, arithmetic 9, geography 9, grammar 2, composition 2, vocal music 9.

No catalogues of this institution have been published for many years; and consequently no public report has been made.

At the suggestion of the School Board, we submit the following report:

The original fund of \$1500. is invested at six per cent, and secured by mortgages on real estate, giving a yearly income of \$90., which with \$10. received from the School Board, in consideration of free tuition for scholars in town, gave us \$100. to be expended. For this sum we have had a winter term of school, commencing Dec. 11, 1893, and continuing eleven weeks, under the instruction of Mr. Elmer E. Farnsworth, a thorough and efficient teacher, and the nineteen pupils who have attended have received excellent instruction. It is regretted that a larger number do not avail themselves of the privilege to obtain a higher education when it can be done at so trifling an expense. \*
