FOR THE YEAR ENDING MARCH 1, 1891.

SPECIAL REPORT BY SCHOOLS.

DIVISION NO. 1.—[Center.]

Miss Cora F. Shepardson of Marlow, was employed both terms, and gave general satisfaction. Miss Shepardson is a live teacher and the scholars made good improvement. The work accomplished by the primary classes was especially commendable. Lack of punctuality and irregular attendance are the prevailing faults in this school, which should be corrected by the parents. Length of school, 22 weeks; number of scholars, 30; wages of teacher per month including board, \$26.00; visits by school board, 4; whole number of visitors, 49.

DIVISION NO. 3.—[Ball Corner.]

Miss Addie R. Page of Washington, teacher, both terms. Her first attempt at teaching. A small school, easily managed. Good progress made. The art of drawing especially com-

mendable at examination. Length of school, 21 weeks; number of scholars, 5; wages of teacher per month including board, \$16.00; visits by school board, 4; whole number of visitors, 33.

DIVISION NO. 5.—[East Washington.]

The school for the year was taught by Miss Jennie M. Carr of East Washington. Two terms, one of nine and the other of twelve weeks, were provided. The school throughout the year was prosperous, and good work was done in every particular. The attendance has been better than heretofore and the discipline of the school much improved. This school has been peculiarly fortunate in securing most excellent teachers for many years. Through the generosity of Mr. H. J. Gage, a fine new flag of the United States has been provided for this school, and will be put in position at the commencement of the next term. During the winter a private school under the instruction of Mrs. Charles F. Wellman, has been provided at this village, and quite a goodly number have availed themselves of its privileges. Length of school, 21 weeks; number of scholars, 36; wages of teacher per month including board, 26; visits by school board, 4; whole number of visitors, 102.

DIVISION NO. 6.—[Turnpike.]

Both terms taught by Miss Ada C. Blanchard of this town, a teacher favorably known in connection with several of our schools. This was a successful school, discipline and scholarship, excellent. Length of school, 21 weeks; number of scholars, 7; wages of teacher per month including board, \$20; visits by school board, 4; whole number of visitors, 10.

DIVISION NO. 7. [Russel's Mill.]

Two terms, both taught by Miss Eldora Farasworth of Washington, an experienced teacher, the right one in the right place, thorough and satisfactory work done. A commendable examination. Length of school, 21 weeks; number of scholars, 8; wages of teacher per month including board, \$20.00; visits by school board, 4; whole number of visitors, 61.

DIVISION NO. 8.—[New Boston.]

The summer term of nine weeks was taught by Miss Jennie S. Hill of Washington,—and the fall term of twelve weeks by



Miss Gertrude Moulton of Manchester. Both terms were entirely satisfactory, and though the school was small, good work was done and excellent progress made. Length of school, 21 weeks; number of scholars, 5; wages of teacher per month including board, \$16; visits by school board, 4; whole number of visitors, 21.

DIVISION NO. 2.—[Cherry Valley.]

The spring term of nine weeks was taught by Miss Maud E. Dole of Washington. This is the smallest school in town, and was Miss Dole's first attempt at teaching. She proved a good instructor and the result was satisfactory. Fall term of twelve weeks taught by Miss Hattie M. Holt of Sunapee, a thorough and skillful teacher. The scholars made decided improvement and the school was in every way satisfactory. Length of school, 21 weeks; number of scholars, 4; wages of teacher per month including board, \$16; visits by school board, 4, whole number of visitors, 11.

## GENERAL REPORT OF THE BOARD OF EDUCATION.

---

FELLOW CITIZENS:—In presenting our annual report to you for the school year just closed, we feel that we can do so with a good degree of satisfaction upon our part, for the success that has crowned our efforts in our official work in behalf of the schools during the year. Seven schools of two terms, amounting to twenty-one weeks each have been maintained during the year, and we were fortunate in securing for them a corps of instructors that were well suited for the different positions and circumstances in which they were placed. With one or two exceptions the same teacher has been retained for the year, which we believe is always advisable where it is evident that a fair degree of advancement has been made, and harmony and good will exist between teacher, scholars, and a majority of the parents, for it is much with a school as it is with a machine, one having learned to operate it can do more and better work than one who is not acquainted with it. So far as we know, not any disturbing element has entered one of our schools during the year nor anything transpired to shadow their prosperity or usefulness.

In complying with the recent law requiring towns to provide for free text-books and supplies, we have endeavored to be as



economical as possible in our purchases of the same. Two changes in text books only have been made, in which we have introduced "Harper's" readers, and "Greenleaf's" arithmetic, both of which we think have given universal satisfaction. We have also adopted to be introduced at the beginning of the next school year, "Appleton's" geographies to take the place of "Harper's" which have now been in use in our schools for some years.

We have expended the funds raise by the town for repairs, mostly in painting the "East Washington" and "Ball Corner" school buildings, and at present all our school property is in very good condition, and perhaps for the coming year will not need any very expensive outlay.

We think that the present method of running our schools is gaining in favor from year to year, and is now generally acknowledged to be a great advantage over the old district system. Thanking all those who have in any way aided us in trying to elevate the standard of our schools, we submit to you this report.
