REPORT OF BOARD OF EDUCATION.

Schools have been provided the past year in the following localities: Center, East Washington, New Boston, Turnpike, Ball's Corner, Russell's Mill, Brooke's and Butterfield's. Owing to a lack of pupils, no school has been provided in the mountain district. The school year has consisted of nineteen weeks divided into two terms. Wherever the length of school did not equal nineteen weeks, pupils were allowed to attend neighboring schools, the intention being to give to all parts of the town, so far as possible, equal school privileges. In point of success, the schools this year compare favorably with those of former years. Faithful and, in most cases, experienced teachers have been secured, who have given good instruction to those under their care. Harmony, which we all recognize as one of the principal conditions of success, has prevailed throughout the town.

Nothing of importance has been done in the way of repairs to school buildings, and it is believed that no appropriation will be needed the ensuing year, as nearly all the school buildings in town are in comfortable condition. The attention of the town is called to the fact that the amount of school tax the ensuing year will probably be less than that of the past year by about one hundred dollars. The town should make an extra appropriation of that amount, as no sum less than is now provided will be sufficient to meet the requirements of our schools. During the past two years we have been obliged to draw considerably from the treasury to provide free text books as the law requires. The schools are now quite well provided with books, and the necessary outlay in the future will be much smaller.

We append a brief report of each school, and a report of the treasurer of the board.

SPECIAL REPORT BY SCHOOLS.

DIVISION NO. 1. (CENTER).

Summer term taught by Miss Agnes L. Barney of Washington, an experienced and thorough teacher. Discipline excellent and satisfactory school in every particular.

Fall term taught by Miss Jennie M. Carr of Washington, a teacher well and favorably known in connection with the schools of this town and the work accomplished was up to her previous high standard. Length of summer term, nine weeks. Length of fall term, ten weeks. Wages of teacher per month, including board, summer term \$26, fall term \$29. Number of scholars 31, number of visits of school board 4, whole number of visitors 106.

DIVISION NO. 3.

Two terms of school, both taught by Miss Addie R. Page of Washington, making four terms in succession that she has been employed for this school. She has a patient quiet manner of instructing and interesting small scholars and soon secures their good will and best endeavors. The school for the past year was profitable and highly satisfactory. Wages of teacher including board \$16. Length of school, summer nine weeks, fall ten weeks. Number of scholars 5. Visits of school board 4. Whole number of visitors 41.

DIVISION NO. 4.

One term of eight weeks was provided here in the fall with three scholars in attendance, Mrs. Jennie Safford of Washington, teacher. The scholars were too small in numbers and proportion to make the school interesting, yet the teacher worked as faithfully for the few as she could had there been many, and consequently theirs was a good opportunity. While the result showed that the time and money expended had not been wasted. Wages of teacher per month including board \$16. Length of school in weeks, 8. Number of scholars 3. Visits of school board 2. Whole number of visitors 4.

DIVISION NO. 5. (EAST WASHINGTON).

The summer term was taught by Miss Jennie M. Carr of East Washington. Too much cannot be said in praise of the school, and it was a matter of regret that she did not see fit to remain in the school throughout the year. The fall term was taught by Miss Kate L. Perkins of Marlow. She labored well and successfully for the school, and won the respect and love of her scholars to an uncommon degree. Wages of teachers including board, summer \$26, fall \$30. Length of school summer eight weeks, fall eleven weeks. Number of scholars 38. Visits of school board 5. Whole number of visitors 99.

DIVISION NO. 6. (TURNPIKE).

Both terms taught by Miss Hattie M. Holt of Mt. Sunapee. This school though small boasts some of the best scholars in town and Miss Holt may well feel proud of the results of her work in both scholarship and deportment. Wages of teacher per month including board \$20. Length of school 19 weeks. Number of scholars 6. Visits of school board 4. Whole number of visitors 31.

DIVISION NO. 7.

Spring and fall term. The former taught by Miss Cora F. Shepardson and the latter by Miss Mary I. Fay, both of Marlow. Miss Shepardson came here with past experience in this and other schools and fully maintained her former record as a successful teacher. The fall term, taught by Miss Fay, was her first attempt at teaching, yet she proved competent to fill the position and taught a good school, introducing into it some new features, among which were the practice of gymnastics, which were an interesting part of her examination program. Length of school, summer 8 weeks, fall term 10 weeks. Number of scholars 6. Visits by school board 4. Wages of teacher per month including board \$20. Whole number of visitors 52.

DIVISION NO. 8. (NEW BOSTON).

The first term was taught by Miss Gertrude F. Moulton of Manchester. Miss M. had taught this school previously and had established her reputation as a most excellent instructor. Emigration to another state prevented her from accepting an urgent invitation to remain throughout the year. The sec-

ond term was under the care of Miss Etta N. Ring of Bradford. This was Miss Ring's first experience in the school room, but it was an experience full of good results. The discipline and instruction were excellent. Wages of teacher including board, summer \$20, fall term \$18. Length of school, summer 8 weeks, fall 7 weeks. Number of scholars 10. Visits of school board 4. Whole number of visitors 20.

DIVISION NO. 9. (CHERRY VALLEY).

Two terms taught by Miss Gertie L. Heselton. This was Miss Heselton's first school, she worked hard for the good of her small school and gave good satisfaction. Wages of teacher per month including board \$16. Length of school, summer 9 weeks, fall—. Number of scholars 4. Visits of school board Whole number of visitors 10.
