

# REMARKS.

In order that the voters may fully understand the condition of the financial affairs of the town and the sit nation in which your Selectmen have been placed the past year, a little note of explanation may be of interest. In the first place the valuation of the town which has been constantly decreasing from year to year, partly in consequence of the law passed at the last Legislature, and various other reasons, took a drop at our April assessment of \$10,026, which you will all see made our basis for assessment this year much less. The town at its annual meeting in March increased its appropriations from \$3291.03 in 1894 to \$4693.79, in 1895, consequently the per cent, must necessarily increase to meet this demand. The Savings Bank tax and Literary fund from the State also fell off more than \$300.00, from that of 1894, which sum has usually been quite a help in paying our town expenses. Then we have been unfortunately blessed with an extra amount of pauperism during the year, which has increased our expenses in this direction more than \$200.00 and leaves at the present time a burden of this kind on the town which, before disposed of, may be a heavy load for the town to carry. So we would suggest at the coming election that the voters be extremely careful in regard to fixing their appropriations if they wish their taxes kept within payable bounds.

# REPORT OF SCHOOL BOARD.

In compliance with the laws of the State of New Hampshire, the school board of the town of Washington, submit the following as their annual report for the school year 1895-96.

The great purpose and object of education is the development of the scholars, not only intellectually but morally and physically; to store the mind with useful knowledge, to fit the young for the various duties and vocations of life. It is the duty of parents to impress upon their children the importance of improving their time, and to do what they can in co-operating with the teacher in maintaining the dicipline of the school, to encourage their children to obey the teacher, and all necessary rules and regulations of the school-room.

It should be remembered that teachers as well as other people have their failings, and to suppose that they will not sometimes be guilty of triffling indiscretions in word or act, or trivial errors in their conduct, would be unreasonable.

There will be faults in government, faults in instruction, errors in management, but they ought not for a moment to shake our confidence in a teacher, unless of sufficient magnitude, totally to disqualify her for the discharge of her duties, or of such a nature that she can no longer claim our respect.

Many parents are too ready to listen to the complaints of their children against the teacher. She is too strict, or not strict enough, or something is the matter. Too often is the teacher made the subject of criticism and condemnation, and this in the presence of children, thus greatly diminishing that respect and consideration which should always be felt by scholars for their teacher, and rendering all her efforts for their improvement comparatively fruitless.

During the year five schools have been maintained, and teachers of competent ability have been secured, who have accomplished much in the line of raising the standard of common school education in the town. Some necessary changes have been made in text books during the year.

The Normal course of Readers, Maxwell's introductory lessons in English grammar, Metcalf and Bright's Language lessons, Eggleston's History of the United States, and the Normal Review system of writing books, have been introduced. All of the schools are now well furnished with books, and the necessary outlay in the future will be much smaller. The law in regard to Scientific Temperance Instruction has been very generally observed. During the year the school house at Cherry Valley has been repaired, the house was shingled, the high desks have been lowered, and new windows have taken the place of the old ones, which was very gratifying to both teacher and pupils, the school house at the center of the town needs painting, when this is done our school buildings will be in a very good condition.

We present brief reports of the several schools and a report of the treasurer.

# DIVISION No. 1. (Center.)

Miss Lisle M. Irving, taught the summer and fall terms. She brought to her aid a well-diciplined mind, an even temper, and a dignity which commanded the respect and obedience of her pupils.

The closing examination of the school showed excellent progress.

#### DIVISION No. 3.

The spring term was taught by Miss Myra M. Muzzey of Newbury, and the fall term by Miss Evis E. Farnsworth, of Washington. Both were inexperienced teachers, yet were desirous of establishing a reputation which should be of benefit, not only here but in future efforts, and their work was in a good degree satisfactory. The scholars in No. 7 were brought to this school, which with the addition of those recently moving to this part of the town, made this a very pleasant and interesting school. During the fall term the teacher and scholars gave an entertainment at which funds were raised sufficient to purchase a nice new flag for the school building.

#### DIVISION NO. 5.

The school for the year was taught by Miss Agnes Monohon of Cherryfield, Maine. She did very good work in the school room and won the love of her pupils to a degree far above the average teacher. The three terms seem to have been profitable ones, as the examination at the close of the year showed there had been much work accomplished. It was thought best to have the scholars in No. 8 attend this school rather than to have a school there. Conveyance was provided for them most of the time at

less expense than would have been required to support a school and we think it was much more to their advantage.

### DIVISION 6. (Turnpike.)

The summer and fall terms of school were under the instruction of Miss Katharine M. O'Brien of Lempster, who was not without experience, and a creditable record. Under her charge the school met the reasonable expectations of the committee. The order and good deportment of the scholars, the correct recitations were ample proof that both scholars and teacher had been faithful in the discharge of their duties.

### DIVISION No. 9. (Cherry Valley.)

Mrs. Addie F. Butterfield of Washington, had charge of this school during the year, and under her judicious care, and instruction, made good progress in all the branches taught.
