

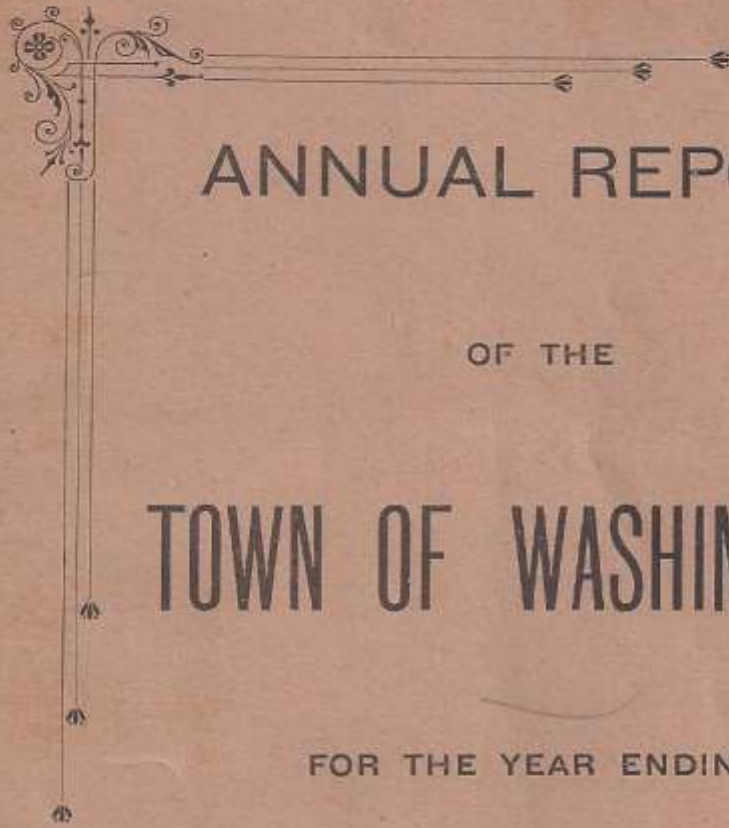

STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE.

To the Inhabitants of the town of Washington, qualified to vote in town affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at the town house in said town, on Tuesday, the 11th day of March, next, at ten of the clock in the forenoon, to act upon the following subjects:

1. To choose a Moderator to serve out the unexpired term of two years.
2. To choose all other necessary Town Officers, Agents and Committees for the ensuing year.
3. To see if the town will vote to instruct the Selectmen to divide the town into Highway Districts, and appoint such Road Agents or Surveyors as they deem necessary for the repair of the highways the ensuing year.
4. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise to repair highways and bridges the ensuing year.
5. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise to defray town charges the ensuing year.
6. To see if the town will vote to discontinue the following highways: 1st. Beginning at Wm. Book's house and extending to the building spot on the old Francis Fletcher farm; also the road leading from said highway to the Albah Davis building. 2d. Beginning at the highway near I. W. Woods' residence and extending to the buildings of Geo. A. Hoyt. 3d. Beginning at the buildings on the Justin Burbank place, so-called, and extending to the W. T. Thissell farm. 4th. Beginning at the highway near W. H. Hutchins' house and extending to the former residence of S. P. Gleason.
7. To see if the town will vote to exempt from taxation for a term of five years, provided he continues to do business there continuously during said time, the mill privilege and machinery of A. W. Stickney on Water street.
8. To see if the town will vote to raise twenty-five dollars for the observance of Old Home Day the ensuing year.
9. To see if the town will vote to raise anything for the observance of Memorial Day the ensuing year.
10. To see if the town will instruct the Selectmen to procure for each village a suitable hook and ladder truck, provided with pails, axes and implements necessary to be used in case of fire, and appropriate a sum of money for the purchase of the same.
11. To transact any other business legally coming before said meeting.

Report of School Board.

We look back at the close of this year to note the advancement along educational lines, and especially do we look in our own town and among our own schools for the progress we must have if we desire to keep abreast of the times in which we live.

We feel interested in our children that they may be qualified to perform the duties that come to them, nobly and well, conferring honor upon themselves, their parents, their town and country.

Home training is, or should be, the first help to the boy or girl in acquiring useful knowledge; the district school is the second and an essential factor; as such, it should be made as perfect as possible. As knowledge is a kingdom all must fight to possess it. Children should have encouragement from their parents and teachers and should early be taught the importance of a good education to fit them for their life work.

The past year has been one of progress, comparing favorably with former years. More interest has been manifested by parents and friends in our schools than in former years. This is a movement in the right direction, as kindly interest from parents is of vital importance.

We have introduced new spelling books in all the schools, the old ones being so worn as to be unfit for further use. Physiologies were also a necessity, as our schools were furnished with the chemistry grade only. Brand's Academic Physiology and Hygiene was introduced with gratifying results, the pupils showing very much more interest in this essential study. A limited number of Primers and

small Readers were also furnished, as they were much needed.

Changes have been made in some of the schools. The parents of children living in New Boston earnestly requested that they might occupy their own school house for the fall term. This was done, making the East Washington school they formerly attended, smaller by nine pupils.

The Turnpike school, which has gradually decreased, became so small it was thought best to send the one pupil to the Centre. After diligent search, no means of transportation could be found, unless a sum equal to the cost of a school was paid. A teacher was hired to teach the one pupil in her home.

In the Cherry Valley (Butterfield) Division most of the children were in or near the Mill settlement. In compliance with the request of the parents, an earnest effort was made to procure a school room near that place. The School Board being unable to obtain one, the school house was occupied during the spring term. For the fall term a room was rented, the price being three dollars per month.

The parents in the Wilcox Mill Division desired a fall term in their own school house. This very reasonable desire was granted as the number of pupils in this division has increased. Some of them are small children and the distance to the Farnsworth school formerly attended covers a long and lonely road.
