REPORT OF COMMITTEE ON LEWIS CEMETERY FUND.

The amount of the bequest of one hundred dollars was loaned to the town of Washington, the note bearing interest from April 19, 1899, at 3 per cent. As the bequest specifies that the income shall annually be expended between May 1 and November 1, we have appropriated only that part of the interest which had accrued at the latter date, which amounted to one dollar and fifty-nine cents (\$1.59). With this income we have re-set the monument on the Lewis plot and made some other trifling improvements on other parts of the cemetery.

Report of School Board.

Another school year has closed and the annual report of the School Board is again called for. The teachers have labored zealously for the improvement of their pupils and we think that the schools during the past year have been successful above the average. In looking over the work accomplished during the year we think it compares favorably with that of past years. The greatest hindrance to the prosperity and advancement of our schools is irregular attendance, which has been exceptionally noticeable the past year. The number of marks, absent and tardy, are more than usual. Irregular attendance is one of the greatest drawbacks in school work. We urge parents and scholars to co-operate and keep future registers as free from such marks as possible. Make an effort to have your children punctual and the regular attendance as perfect as possible. It is hoped that next year every pupil will strive to be represented on the roll of perfect attendance. In the summer term a large number of absences was caused by an epidemic of whooping cough and measles.

Of the nine teachers all but two had had more or less experience. Much credit is due the teachers for their untiring zeal, energy and fidelity in the discharge of their arduous duties.

No changes have been made in the text books used in this town. To keep up an interest in reading, however, it is necessary to make a change in readers, or use supplementary reading. A change of readers in the near future is suggested.

Considerable money was expended for repairs on the New Boston and Russell Mills school houses. The items of expense will be found in the school treasurer's report. In concluding this report we would express our thanks to the teachers, to the scholars and to the citizens of the town generally for the uniform kindness and respect shown us in our official duties during the past year.

The Fall term was taught by Miss Maud D. Mitchell of Goshen, who was graduated from Lowell High School and has had several terms experience as an educator.

Miss Mitchell labored untiringly for the advancement of her pupils. The order was good and like the Spring term a very profitable one.
