Report of School Board.

A great deal is said and written about the changes and improvements which the last century has brought. In nothing are they more marked than along educational lines. Even the last decade has brought great changes, which are reaching out from the cultured and populous centers to the sparsely inhabited and remote districts. We can not stop to argue whether all these changes are for the best, for we are the rush and whirl of busy American life.

Much more is required of the children of today than was a few years ago and in order that our children may not appear like Rip Van Winkle, when brought in contact with others, we must give them the same advantages which others are having. To do this our schools must be kept abreast of the times.

Much can be done toward accomplishing this if parents and guardians will co-operate with teachers and school boards in trying to make the most of our limited means. We must not be chary in the use of money to purchase necessary books and other things to make our school-rooms pleasant and the acquisition of knowledge as easy as possible. Above all it must be remembered that hard work, not native genius, is the price of a thorough education; and only those who are willing to study hard can hope to acquire it. Also let us remember that idle, listless scholars should not complain of limited advantages or incompetent teachers. We feel that some progress toward the desired goal has been made the last year. We have been fortunate in securing the services of well educated and competent teachers.

Five schools have been sustained and seven teachers employed. Two of the teachers were high school graduates, one had nearly completed the course and one was a college junior.

Some repairs have been made on school buildings, an account of which will be found in the treasurer's report.

The worn condition of the arithmetics made it necessary to purchase new ones. After examining several kinds and consulting advanced educators it was decided to introduce Wentworth's Practical and Elementary Arithmetic in place of Greenleaf's and Robinson's. Webster's Academic Dictionaries have been placed in three of the schools. The other two were already supplied.

We have again to deprecate the number of absent and tardy marks the registers show. We fear the parents in town are not alive to the fact that with twenty-three weeks town school and eleven weeks Tubbs Union Academy, we have nearly as many weeks for schooling as many towns where the pupils are fitted for college.

In closing this report we desire to thank the parents for the kindness and forbearance they have shown us and the support they have given our efforts to maintain good schools.
