THE STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE.

To the Inhabitants of the Town of Washington, qualified to vote in town affairs :

You are hereby notified to meet at the town house in said town, on Tuesday, the 14th day of March, next, at 10 of the clock in the forenoon, to act upon the following subjects :

ARTICLE 1. To choose all necessary Town Officers, Agents and Committees for the year ensuing.

2. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise to repair highways and bridges for the year ensuing.

3. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise to defray town charges for the year ensuing.

4. To see if the town will vote to raise twenty-five dollars for the observance of Memorial day, for the year ensuing.

5. To see if the town will vote to abate the taxes remaining on Arthur H. Jaquith list for the year 1900.

6. To see if the town will vote to have a re-appraisal of the real estate, and appoint agents to do the same.

7. To transact any other business legally coming before said meeting.
