

### TOWN WARRANT.

### STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE.

To the Inhabitants of the Town of Washington qualified to vote in Town affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at the town house in said town on Tuesday, the 13th day of March, next, at ten of the clock in the forenoon, to act upon the following subjects:

- To choose all necessary Town Officers, Agents and Committees for the year ensuing.
- To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise to defray town charges for the year ensuing.
- To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise to repair highways and bridges for the year ensuing.
- 4. To see if the town will vote to raise the amount required by the state for the aid of permanent highways for the year ensuing.
- 5. To see if the town will vote to accept the bequest of the late Gardner Atwood, whereby he gives the town one hundred dollars, the income of which is to be used for the care of his lot in the cemetery perpetually.
- To see if the town will vote to raise anything for the observance of Memorial Day for the year ensuing.
- 7. To see if the town will vote to raise anything for the observance of Old Home Day for the year ensuing.
- To see if the town will vote to make Shedd Free Library self supporting according to the provision of the will.

 To transact any other business legally coming before said meeting.


